DALLAS, May 27.-The stage wizardy which three times has brought to Dallas the Belasco cup is to be revealed to Little Theatre enthusiastists by Oliver Hinsdell, director of the Dallas Little Theatre.

Following the close of his fourth successful season, Hinsdell will direct the laboratory school of the Little Theatre, wherein will be taught the craft which makes little theatres successful.

The school will start here June 13 and will last four weeks, continuing through July 10.

Organization, management, play casting and producing, scenic design and stage craft will be covered from the practical standpoint and the laboratory method will be used, whereby the student will have opportunity to put into actual practice theories relative to the selection of plays, casting, directing, acting, building of scenery, lighting and makeup.

All work will be personally directed by Hinsdell. He will be assisted by Lester Lang and Louise Britton, also of the Dallas Little Theatre, who will conduct classes in designing, construction, decoration of scenery and publicity.

Mr. Hinsdell is one of the pioneers in Little Theatre work in the United States. He was for two years director of Le Petit Theatre du Vieux Carre in New Orleans. For the last four years he has been ditimes national champions.




## Turkish Teacher Is Peace Advocate





In three trips to America in the ast few years, twice to compete in the Penn relays and the other time with the combined Oxford-Cambridge track and field team, Lord Burghley has impressed critics with his steady development as a timber topper. He is the present British champion at both high and low hurdles, has more than held his own in competition on this side, losing only one race in a half dozen, and figures to be a keen rival for America's best talent in Hol-

Yankee hurdlers have dominated the Olympics since their revival in 1896. They have lost only one race over either the high or the low sticks. That was in 1920, when Earl Thomson, the famous Canadian, who is still holder of the world's records flew home first in the 110 meter high hurdles. But Thompson, although he wore the maple leaf in Olympic competition, was a Dartmouth College student, developed by Harry Hillman, American coach and former Olympic title holder. Thompson is now an as sistant coach at Yale.
