SCHOOLS WILL STAGE PARADE HERE FRIDAY

Processions to Meet At Foster and Turn West

PUPILS WILL CARRY BANNERS

Policemen Will Clear Street For Fire Observance

School children of Pampa, bearing flags and banners, will form the principal part of the Fire Prevention Week parade here Friday afternoon, according to W. C. Montgomery, chairman of local observances.

Pupils of the Central schools will leave the main campus at 3 p. m. They will proceed to Cuyler and turn south. A similar parade of B. M. Baker school pupils will start at the same time on Craven street, proceeding to Cuyler and thence northward.

The two bodies will meet at the intersection of Cuyler and Foster, and converge, marching abreast westward to Frost street. At Frost street the Central school pupils will turn north to Kingsmill, then east on Kingsmill to the post office, where they will "fall out." Baker school pupils, after reaching Frost, will turn south to Atchison and then east to the sheriff's office, where the group will disband.

City Marshal John Andrews will have twelve policemen on duty at the intersections to direct traffic away from the parade. The fire truck will join the procession at Foster, and lead the march for two blocks.

LAD RAN INTO CUYLER STREET

Physician Discovers Slight Concussion of Brain

A boy and his dog figured in an accident on South Cuyler street this morning, and the dog was crushed to death by an automobile which also struck the lad a glancing blow.

The boy, a companion, and the dog were playing beside the street. During its frolics, the dog ran into the street, and was followed by the 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Kein, South Pampa residents.

Boy and dog ran directly in front of the automobile driven by A. B. Stafford, oil man. Mr. Stafford turned sharply twice as the dog and boy hesitated and dodged, and almost missed the lad. The dog was struck and killed, however.

Mr. Stafford rushed the injured boy to a local physician, whose examination showed a slight concussion of the brain, and minor bruises.

Negro Held in Killing of Deputy at Fort Worth
