

# City sales tax returns go up

Second month in a row

For the second month in a row, sales tax receipts for Pampa are over budget and higher than than collected during the same time period — January and February — last year.

"It's good news, said City Finance Director John Horst. "The February receipts are up almost 6.5 percent over last year."

Other good news, Horst said, is that during March the city made 24 new sewer hookups. The number includes both commercial and residential figures. He said sewer numbers are a better indicator than water connections because some water connections and disconnects are related to seasonal sprinkler systems.

Back on the sales tax front, the February numbers show collections of \$149,720 which is over the \$140,456 anticipated in the budget and higher than last year's actual collections of \$140,593.

Horst said fiscal-year-to-date numbers indicate the city will have a budget shortfall of about \$26,000 at the end of September. But, if the collection trend set in the past two reporting periods continue there will be no shortfall.

# Official: Pantex disaster would not harm Pampa

A disaster at Pantex would have little affect on Pampa and Gray County, a Pantex emergency planning official told Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) members Wednesday.

Brack serves as section manager of emergency plans and proce-

dures for Pantex Plant, the nation's nuclear weapons assembly/disassembly facility, 18 miles east of Amarillo.

Committee members expressed concerns to Brack about the affect of a disaster at the plant on Gray County, said Ken Hall,

Pampa/Gray County emergency management coordinator.

"Brack said that more than likely there wouldn't be any affect on Gray County," Hall said today. "He said they had looked at every

conceivable hazard that could happen and planned for that."

Hall said Pantex officials decided that any of the possible hazards would be contained within a 10-mile radius of the plant, an (See PANTEX, Page 2)

Officers estimated damage to the home at \$3,000. Jackson tried to stop the truck by putting the gear shift into park, officers said, when he was hit and drug by the vehicle.

# Trooper's 'gut' instinct proves to be right on

GROOM — Department of Public Safety Trooper Gary Davis had an uneasy feeling Sunday afternoon when an older yellow Ford Thunderbird passed him on 1-40 Sunday as he stood at the side of a truck on a traffic stop. He had no reason to stop the car, so he let it go.

The 20-odd year veteran trooper did notice the out-of-state license plates on the car as it passed by.

About 10 minutes later Davis heard the Gray County dispatcher put out a call in an attempt to locate a vehicle in connection with a burglary of the United Methodist Church in McLean. The description of the vehicle matched the older yellow T-Bird Davis had seen fly by minutes earlier.

The trooper was at the 87-mile marker which is about eight miles east of the Potter County-Carson County line when he received the report. He continued, looking for the car. When he spotted it, he flashed his lights to pull it over.

"As I was walking from my car to the yellow T-Bird I saw the reflection of the driver as he looked into the side mirror," said Davis. The trooper said the man's face revealed the image of a person who thought, "Oh, no. I'm caught."

As Davis searched the car, he said he knew he had the right person because a VCR and disc player was in the back seat, and both were clean as a whistle. "The rest of the car was trashed out," he said.

A search of the car also revealed a 32-caliber revolver in the glove box.

Driver of the vehicle was William Davis, 22, of Leland, Miss. He is no relation to DPS Trooper Davis.

Shortly after Trooper Davis made the traffic stop, another Davis arrived on the scene. He was Carson County Deputy Ray Davis. He is no relation to either Trooper Davis or the driver of the yellow T-Bird, William Davis.

Deputy Davis transported his prisoner, William Davis, to the Carson County jail in Panhandle.

The Mississippi man remained in the Carson County Jail until he was transported to Pampa where he remains in jail in lieu of \$5,000 bond in connection with the burglary of the McLean church. He was charged with burglary of a building in connection with the incident in McLean.

Also assisting with the apprehension was Gray County Deputy Larry Wallace. He said he was the only person involved in the pursuit and apprehension who wasn't named Davis.

I would like to encourage our pastors, church boards, committees, to work together. I would like to urge our congregations and pastoral staffs to become teams and to work together. That is a key word Ms. Clinton used here in her speech. If we have a vision, passion and "the will to do it together" [emphasis mine] much more can be accomplished, maybe those things we view as impossible right now? This is so biblical and proper. If

you read the Bible, I am sure you realize this.
One thing about prison chaplaincy is the perspective is so unique. I think all correctional chaplains would agree. We are somewhat removed from the traditional pastoral setting while still involved to the hilf in pastoral care. We are in a "field" that is removed on to the next church. Well, this is something field, this setting has a unique language, that is hurting us here in our town. I have unique culture and values, unique unreached

people group. Like a foreign field one needs a "passport" to come into this geographic area. One must have particular training and awareness to work here. It is not so difficult, but it is different, very different.

One "luxury" we cannot afford here in the chaplaincy departments of our prisons is "non-togetherness." This is because we are about trying to do the impossible every day. And we do have a passion for our work and

vision for what we are trying to accomplish. We invite local area churches and religious volunteers to partner with us in trying to complete the specific vision that we have. We do not have time to play. We are in the midst of a crisis that is right before us each day. Our volunteers know this. And we hold them accountable. The "luxury" the free world has of division and divisiveness is not present. We are "together" and pursuing a vision. Our passion is great for our work and ministry. But we know that only together can we accomplish this goal.

So I share this with you today. This column is called "Ministers Musings" and so I try to present is as if I was sitting and kind of musing. Ms. Clinton's statement just struck me so clearly. I see such a contrast in our religious volunteer group inside the prison and then outside in our church free world. I almost wish I could bring each pastor, church board and committee into the prison for a few weeks. In America, we are facing the impossible. If we can develop the caring passion, from the traditional setting. Like a mission the no-holds-barred vision and be together in our ministry, we can do the impossible, we can be a team.







Bradley was surprised the incident escalated.

"I hit him with an elbow and he hit me with a punch," Bradley said. "After I went to the locker room, I wanted to talk to Walt. I apologized for the elbow and said it never should have happened. I was surprised that he punched me, but it's all over with now and we can move on."

With the Harvesters down 5-3 the bases were loaded with two outs and it was crunch time in the bottom of the fourth. The right-handed hitting second baseman lined a ball deep into center. The fielder went back and appeared to have a line on the ball. Then, he dropped his shoulders and turned around to run as the ball sailed over his head and bounced off the wall.






