WASHINGTON-One way or another, the average resident of the District of Columbia is always getting it in the neck.

He's the poor dog on which all sorts of experiments, many of them painful indeed, are first tried out.

His afflictions range from some of the most awful imaginable theatrical productions which die after a few days here without ever seeing New York to the incessant badgerings of the theater man's worst enemies, the Blue Law advocates.

Whenever a citizen or group of citizens wake up in the middle of the night with a new scheme for improving the human race through further regulation he—or they—collect money for train fare and dash off to Washington to put the scheme into operation.

The theory is that because Congress governs the District of Columbia without any help Washingtonians, the people here can be made to stand for more than other folks. Reform waves spread quicker if they can dig their toes in these sacred precincts and once Congress passes a law for the district it's much easier to get it to pass a similar law for the rest of the

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

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
