Roughly speaking, administration policymakers tend to divide into two groups at this time.

One is a fiscal group which bets on steadily increasing production, bigger profits and rising federal revenue

The other group, including many of the more liberal New Deal economists, believes that mass purchasing power has been and still is the key to recovery, and fears that the rising price level, spurred by the profit urge and made possible by accelerated 100 each. business activity, is now endangering purchasing power and hence the upswing of business recovery.

* * *

Big profits are necessary to carry the budget, the fiscal group figures. It also believes that with expansion of the capital goods industry, a forecast of 60 per cent more building this year and other favorable factors, federal expenditures for stimulation of industry may now practically stop.

Various government policies are conditioned by the fiscal group's theories. One postulate is that government should be careful to do nothing to interfere with the continuing upturn-"Don't rock the boat!" * * *

The other group is primarily anxious for action which will keep the cost of living curve on the economists' charts below the curve denoting average earnings for workers.

The fiscal group doesn't seem to mind, holding that the profits will be well skimmed for taxes. But the other group says that if prices get ahead of purchasing power the goose which has been laying the golden egg will be killed.

Consequently, it urges brakes on prices and a curb on monopolies which control prices, while favoring any measures which will tend to increase wages and purchasing power, to the end that all factors making for recovery may be kept in even balance.



SIT - DOWN MANEUVER IS SUCCESSFUL EXPERIMENT

DETROIT, Feb. 11 (AP)-The automobile industry's "contest of the century" was a struggle of more than 40 days, marked by more apprehension than violence, more threats than action and a marathon of conferences.

In the lists as opposing gladiators were the automotive giant, the bil-lion dollar General Motors corporation, and the United Auto-mobile Workers of America, lusty infant of John L .Lewis' Commit-tee for Industrial Organization.

Unique in that it was the first great strike in the industry as well as the first widespread and cor-related use of the "sit-down" maneuver in this country, the dispute involved through a single corporation nearly half the nation's automobile production.

.The cost was far up in the millions. Approximately 135,000 employes of General Motors and subsidiaries missed pay checks. The daily loss in wages was estimated at \$1.000.000.

Effects of the strike paralyzed at times 40 plants in 35 cities and 14 states from New Jersey to California. Flint, Mich., with 38,600 of its 165,000 residents thrown into idleness, became the strike capital. The daily loss in wages there was estimated at \$300,000, and the city's economic life was seriously impaired The issues were obscured at times by flurries of statements from both

Briefly, they were: The demand of the United Automobile Workers of America for recognition as the sole bargaining agency for General Motors employes; abolition of piecework in favor of straight hourly rates; A 30-hour week and 6-hour day, with time and a half for overtime and a "minimum rate of pay mensurate with an American standard of living:" seniority rights ased on length of service; reinstatement of all employes who had been "unjustly discharged"; mutual agreement on "speed of production." One issue appeared transcendant -the union's demand for recognition as the sole bargaining agency. There stood as an obstacle in the

path to negotiations General Motors' rigid demand that the plants be evacuated before it would arbitrate, while the union was steadfast in its insistence on recognition. Violence was near a minimum.

Only two serious outbursts occurred, both at Flint. In the first 27 per-sons were hurt. A dozen persons were injured in the second

The story of the strike goes back to August, 1935, when the United Automobile Workers union was organized at an American Federation of Labor convention in Detroit. More than a year before, President Roosevelt had averted serious trouble in the industry by direct intervention and out of that came the short-lived National Automobile


