

# A one-man urban renewal project **Innovator** turns store into home

Pampa's newest home builder

is downtown on Cuyler Street. Harold Snell came from Central Texas and fell in love with Pampa. Needing a place to live, he took a look at the empty store fronts on Cuyler and has now become a one-man urban renewal project.

"You don't have lawn maintenance," Snell said. "In fact, it took me 15 seconds the other day to pull a weed out of the area back by the garage."

Snell's new home used to be an appliance store just up Cuyler from the White Deer Land Museum.

While taking a break from his restoration project, Snell said that the buildings along Pampa's main street are naturals for what he's doing - turning them into large, comfortable living spaces.

Outside, he has erected gates along the sidewalk. They will eventually be replaced with that will go across. Then there

something more permanent. "These are just temporary gates here," he said. "I've got coming up from Bustamente, Mexico, some bronze, 10-foot high, really decorative ironwork

blustery winds of winter.

"In the back, I have two bedrooms, two baths and a garage,' he said. He also has another room

that's about 25 by 20 feet that he's not sure what it will be yet. His living and dining area fill

the huge space that was once a showroom. A kitchen is tucked in one corner.

Snell plans on putting book' shelves on either side of the entry and a sleeping loft overhead. He found a sliding ladder from a Penney's department store to go with it. He found it in an old J.C. Penney's shoe depart-

ment. The front door came from a house that Snell owned in Hannibal, Mo. The Dutch door is about 90 years old.

"I have the history of it," he said. "Samuel Clements went

through that door." Samuel Clements, of course, is better known as American author Mark Twain.

The building in Pampa is about 85 years old and solidly

Snell plans on cleaning the five-foot square cement slabs that form the floor, staining and sealing them.

Snell said he's going to leave the bricks showing through in places on the plaster walls. "When its finished, that really

adds to it," Snell said. "It has a nice look.

He's put up most of the fixtures. An antique fan hangs from the high tinned ceiling that forms his living area.

# Appraisal District reduce '01 budget

Gray County Appraisal District's (GCAD) board of directors decided to take out a 2.8 percent increase proposed for the 2001 budget at its meeting this week.

The move reduces the budget from \$466,709 to \$453,707, the same amount set for last year,

said Chief Appraiser Pat Bagley. "The taxing units are having a hard time and the board felt that in light of that it was good faith move not to increase the budget this year," Bagley said.

No one appeared for a public hearing prior to the board's vote on the budget. Tom Grantham, CPA, present-

ed commissioners with the results of the appraisal district's 1999 audit.

"We were given a clean bill of health," Bagley said, adding that a management letter outlining

any problems with financial procedures that is usually included in the audit was not needed this

Board members met with attorney Ken Fields in a 20minute executive session concerning litigation. Following the closed meeting, the board reconvened and agreed to pay consultant Gary Phillips of Lubbock for services related to the legal matters.

The board approved an Internet policy that one member termed as "the most extensive

"My intent was to design a policy that would comply with the requirements for the use of any public property," Bagley explained. "That is, it's not for personal use.' Bagley said he feels the policy

protects the appraisal district from any misuse of Internet ser-

# County sees light tu board decides to for public hearing on

A public hearing in the Gray County Courtroom Friday morning on a possible tax increase brought out a few Gray County citizens.

Gene Hall, owner of Minco Oil and Gas, told the commission he was not nearly as knowledge-able about the current county business as he should be, but he intended to inform himself so he would understand the budget process next

He said he had served as outside auditor of the county many years ago and knew many things had changed. He observed that he thought the advent of computers would reduce the number of employees in the business world, but that didn't seem to be what has happened.

Hall commented that it was difficult to understand why justices of the peace, and other county offices, did all their office work by hand before computers and didn't have secretaries several

years ago. "I know courthouse restoration is important to the county," said Hall's son, Steve, who manages the family ranch. However, he told the commission he was more affected by the road maintenance. He said the quality had gone down the past couple of years.

Darlene Birkes said her biggest concern was the courthouse restoration project. The county

received \$3.8 million from the state for the g but must also put up funds for the project. 



## Meeting health care needs in rural areas

■ It's easy to make the case that more needs to be done to strengthen rural health care. The challenge is getting anybody to listen.

Seeing a doctor for a broken bone ... Taking a child in for an annual physical ... Getting your prescription updated ... For many people around the country, having access to this kind of medical care is something they've come to expect.

But for many people who live in rural areas, simply being able to be treated locally without having to travel long distances for care is something they can't take for granted and something they can't afford to lose.

I can think of few other issues more pressing for our area than to fix some of the problems facing rural healthcare. Simply put, I have a real concern that a lot of hospitals will not survive unless Washington comes up with some real relief. Last year, Congress got the president to agree to put some more money into rural health care. But clearly, more

I've been working as one of six steering committee members of the Rural Health Care Coalition in the House of Representatives on these and other priorities and remain hopeful that we'll get a vote on a relief package before the end of the year. It's easy to make the case that more needs to be done to strengthen rural health care. The challenge is getting anybody to listen.

It's all the more difficult when you consider that fewer and fewer members of Congress are coming from rural areas. That's why it's more important than ever that those of us from rural areas speak with one voice when it comes to making sure health care remains accessible and affordable.



#### Wasting tax dollars on inferior products

A large portion of the \$30,000-plus dollars it takes per year to sustain each offender in Texas prisons is spent on food. That's why it is so baffling that Jordan Unit officials would squander part of its precious budget on inferior or spoiled products.

For the past six months, the offender population has been plagued with sour syrup. Since pancakes and French toast are served more than any other breakfast, we're being served this potentially dangerous substance three- to four-times a week. The stuff actually smells like rotting sorghum.

When I've complained to kitchen officials they've been unconcerned. Getting a replacement syrup is no problem, but not only is it likely to be sour, the staff insists that the syrup has "simply fermented" and that it won't hurt us.

Well, I have a problem with that. In 48 years of eating syrups, I've never known an unopened factory-sealed packet to "simply ferment." Especially not one that boasts as many preservatives as this product.

The fact that the syrup seems to be going bad in the package leads me to speculate that it may have been contaminated in some way during or before packaging. It is basically for this reason that I disagree with kitchen officials' claim that the stuff is harmless. How could they possibly know if or how this product was contaminated?

Repeated written requests for administrative officials and the safety department to do something about the problem have gone unanswered. An attempt to contact the company whose name is printed on the packets failed after my letter was returned stamped, "insufficient address." In the meantime, the problem seems to get worse.

Rather than convince unit officials to correct the problem, this article may well result in pancakes with no syrup at all. And of course when offenders complain they'll have this article to blame for their inconvenience. Well, I'll just have to take the chance because my main concerns here are long-term health risks.

Since becoming ill on the stuff, I refuse to eat it and suggest the same to others until it has been tested and we're provided with specific information about what's wrong with it and how it will affect us. Still, hundreds of offenders do ingest the sour syrup in spite of numerous complaints of cramps, upset stomach, diarrhea and dizzi-

I resent the fact that this potentially harmful product is being peddled to the state and I'm appalled that it's still being served despite all the complaints. But I'm sure some readers will think, "convicts deserve whatever they get." And that's all well and good but ask yourself this: Who profited from the deal with the syrup's vendor? And if everyone is clean, why are your tax dollars being wasted on spoiled products? If it turns out to be just one of those things then why are we being forced to eat the stuff rather than the vendor being forced to make it good?

There is no way that this product is fit for human consumption. Even if it just turns out to be past its expiration date and pose no long- .rm health threats, it's still sour. We're not animals and the citizens of Texas don't spend billions in taxes for us to be fed as if In the past, I've been labeled as an alarmist because of the public

complaints I've lodged against this administration. But when unit officials routinely fail to respond to their I-60's, the system's basic

I've done everything short of filing a lawsuit in an attempt to get this problem resolved, but I am limited as to what I can get done from behind these walls. Anyone who truly believes that the pen is mightier than the sword has never been locked up in a Texas prison.





## Boys Scouts makes lasting impression on youngsters

I had a good Scouting experience when I was a teenager. I was a Law Enforcement Explorer on the Davis Monthon AFB in Tucson, Ariz. I wanted the same thing for my son. When my son first asked if he could join the Scouts, he was too young, but when he was in second grade, he again asked to join the Scouts. I felt he was ready and he joined pack 400.

Along with my son, six other boys joined the pack. The parent participation was slim and there was no money for uniforms,

books, camp or other activities. By the middle of 1997, the pack was on the verge of dying. Several boys quit and the parents began to drop their boys off and not attend the meetings.

When Cubmaster resigned, I knew that if I wanted my son and the rest of the boys to continue to participate in the pack, I would have to do something. I took over as Cubmaster. It was a sacrifice, but now I'm sure it was worthwhile. My son has learned how to respect others, tie knots, per-

form a flag ceremony, and most importantly, moral values. My son has been able to attend both Webelos Camp in Amarillo and Cub Scout Day Camp near Wheeler. The pack continues to grow and more parents have grown interested in what their child is learning and doing. Without the United Way's help, this pack

would have died out long ago.

My son has been with the pack for several years. He, along with many other Webelos, has learned what it takes to earn the "Arrow of Life," the highest award that can be earned as a Cub Scout.

I know that this is only a small part of what the United Way has done for Scouts, but without its help, some packs, including Pack 400, would not exist.

The fall enrollment at Clarendon College-Pampa Center increased by 84 students, with a total of 242 enrolled. "We are really seeing the result of the new building," said Joe Kyle Reeve, dean of CCPC. The number of Pampa High School students working toward a dual high school-college credit increased from 94 this spring to 148 this fall.

Reeve added that another factor probably benefiting the increase in enrollment was the decrease in fees from \$156 per three-hour course to \$114. "We have structured to pro-rate across the board, with those using the classroom more, paying more," he said.

The type of enrollee has also changed with a decided increase in the number of freshmen attending this fall. Students are taking either six hours or going full-time, with few taking only three hours. "That may be because the computer courses filled first,"

The Interactive Televideo Conferencing is delayed until additional parts arrive. "We hope to have a professional development day early this fall using this system," said Reeve.

The ApTech program with instructor Phil Grant has five students. Four more are traveling from Borger for night classes.



But the real hero to the 17,500 frenzied fans at the Olympic aquatic center was Australia's teen idol, Ian Thorpe: Three times he swam, three times he broke records.

Thorpe set an Olympic mark in the prelims of the 400-meter freestyle and a world record in the final. Then he came back a few minutes later and anchored the men's 400 relay team, edging out the dogged American team and setting a world record of 3:13.67.

Thorpe's teammate, Michael Klim, broke the individual world record for 100 meters on the first leg of the relay. The United States had never lost a men's 400 free relay in Olympic or world competition.

Individually, Thorpe ripped through the finals of the 400 in school level, the Pampa girls Hernandez (ninth place), Gina 3:40.59, breaking the record of 3:41.33 he set in the same pool last May. Fans chanted "Thorpey! Thorpey!" Among those in the stands was Australian Prime Minister John Howard.
