



PARIS (AP) - The French government urged today that the Vietnam peace conference resume without delay to reach a political saytion to the con-

Its appeal came after the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong demanded that the peace talks resume Thursday. In similar notes to the United States delegation to the peace talks, the Communists also insisted that Washington halt the bombing of North Vietnam.

The South Vietnamese delegation apparently acting in coordination with the American delegation-rejected the Communist demand for a new meeting Thursday. A South Vietnamese spokesman said the U.S. delegation would also refuse to meet.

In one of its rare public interventions into progress of the conference, to which it has been host for nearly four years, the French government "expressed the wish that the Paris conference resume its work without delay in order to reach a settlement which assures the security and independence of the Vietnamese populations.

The statement, issued after a Cabinet meeting with President George Pompidou, also said "The French government is more than ever convinced that the conflict must have a political solution and that such a solution remains possible.

The French move followed by five days a request by North Vietnam that France intervene with the United States to halt the bombing of the North. Cabinet spokesman Leo Hamon ot make it cle er the North Vietnamese note had led to the Cabinet state

The United States and South Vietnam have insisted that the talks cannot resume under military pressure from the Commu-







Lovell said he envisions the day when women will serve as astronauts. He said the Space Agency "honestly does not discriminate" against race, creed or sex in selecting its spacemen. But the women who have applied so far have not met the qualifications, he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The hot potato of who's to blame for rising beef prices landed first in the hands of cattlemen who quickly passed it to grocers who in turn tossed it to government statisticians.

That was the sequence Monday at the opening session of a House Agriculture subcommittee hearing on beef costs. Testimony continues today.

Spokesmen for farmers organizations insisted that current prices for beef on the hoof are not high at all and sug-gested that the blame falls at some point farther along in the

marketing process.

But the head of the National Association of Food Chains resisted the notion and pointed an accusing finger at government statisticians

Association President Clarence Adamy said current increases merely reflect shortterm fluctuations in supply and demand, rather than any inflationary trend.

He asserted that the government uses faulty methods to

measure food prices nationally. Both Adamy and the farm spokesmen turned aside suggestions that their constituencies should come under strict federal economic controls.





COLLEGE STATION-Per capita food consumption climbed one per cent in 1971. with meat and fruit consumption leading the way.

Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said there were small consumption gains posted for potatoes, vegetable oils, cereal products and eggs and well as the beans, peas and nuts group. Consumption of poultry and eggs as well as the beans, peas and nuts group. Consumption of poultry. vegetables, coffee, fish and animal fats and melons has declined.

Pork accounted for an estimated four per cent rise in red meats. Beef consumption was unchanged, according to the specialist.

Canned citrus fruit and dried fruits made major gains last year. Consumption of fresh citrus increased nearly two and a half per cent. Frozen orange concentrate increased slightly.

A small decline in fresh vegetable consumption about one per cent. A sharp increase in processed potato products accounted for a two per cent increase in the potato and sweet potato group. (This group increased faster in per capita consumption than any other group.)

Decreases in per capita consumption of coffee, yeal, lamb, mutton, and condensed and evaporated milk are consistent with patterns of recent years.

baseball players and club owners remained deadlocked today solely over make-up salaries after reaching a pension settlement which could have prevented the 12-day-old walkout ir the first place.

And at the heart of the lone remaining issue was a feeling among the players that the owners would try to cheat them salary-wise in rescheduling games lost to the strike, which has delayed the opening of the season more than a week.

With both sides making quick pitches throughout day-long meetings Tuesday and tossingand rejecting-proposals and counter-proposals back and forth faster than an aroundthehorn double play, this was the situation when matters ground to a halt in the wee hours this morning:

-Agreement was reached on allocating \$500,000 a year from the pension plan's huge surplus for retirement benefits, in addition to the owners' original offer of \$490,000 for health care on top of the \$5.4 million they contribute annually to the pen-

"If we had agreed on the \$500,000 last week there would have been no strike," said Marvin Miller, executive director of the Major League Baseball Flayers Association. "That's probably true." countered John Gaherin, the owners' negotiator, "but \$500,000 was not Mr. Miller's price for a settlement before the strike."

-The owners have offered to pay the players for lost games rescheduled on open dates or as part of a day-night double header, but not for games made up as part of a one-admission doubleheader.

The players rejected that and countered by offering to give up one day's pay (they are paid on a basis of 182 days rather than 162 games). The owners turned that down. Next, the players offered to play make-up games in one-admission twin bills for half pay. The owners rejected that, too.

In San Diego, Buzzie Bavasi. president of the Padres, said the team's player representative, Bob Barton, "told me the players seemed to think that the owners would try to cheat them by making up all the lost games as parts of doubleheaders and I explained to him why that's a false assumption.

"As an owner, I can assure you that a club always makes more money by playing two single games than by playing a doubleheader. On two dates, you get extra revenue from parking, programs and concessions that you don't get playing a doubleheader."

Bavasi said that if clubs reduce the originally scheduled number of home dates by scheduling more doubleheaders, they'll have to return some money to season ticket-holders.

'We haven't lost any home dates yet," he said, "but the Dodgers, Giants, Cardinals, Mets and Cubs have. All of them have large season ticket sales and I know they'll try to make up lost games on off days rather than play doubleheaders. If the players go along with our proposal, which I believe is more than fair. I'm sure they'll make up all, or nearly all, of the money called for in their contracts.



Granted that the seat beltbuzzer is a minor safety feature and may be nothing more than an annoyance to those who refuse to wear seat belts. But the fact that some people will actually go so far as to disconnect the device rather than simply buckle up and shut it off does underscore in a small way a point made by Franklin M. Kreml at the recent annual meeting of the Traffic Safety

Association of Detroit. The nation cannot rely on vehicle improvements alone to highway accident losses. he said

As a young man Kreml worked his way through law school as a traffic policeman. He joined Northwestern University in the 1930s and eventually established its renowned Transportation Center. In 1970, he served as chairman of the President's Task Force on Highway Safety.

Kreml argues that in addition to federally required vehicle regulations, a broad-based, balanced safety program must be carried on at the state and local level where the legal responsibility, authority and manpower are.

Among other things, he calls for greater emphasis on improved driver licensing to realistically test the true competence of applicants under real driving conditions. improvement of substandard roads and more uniform traffic

But how far, he asks, are the people willing to go in support of safety programs that might lead to widely restricted licensing? Are they willing to be stopped on the highway to submit to chemical breath tests for alcoholic intoxication? How much self-discipline are they willing and able to exercise?

He credits highway safety programs, supported by both the public and private sectors. with cutting the number of traffic deaths per 100 million miles of vehicle travel from more than 15 in 1936 to the present level of about five

He notes, however, that it has taken more than 10 years to reduce the rate from six to five and that the number of highway deaths in the same period has risen from an annual level of 40,000 to 55,000.

If the fatality rate is not substantially reduced and if the number of vehicles and miles driven increase as projected, he warns, more than 70,000 people will be killed annually by 1975

and 80,000 annually by 1980. Vietnam offers greater survivability from a given injury than do large areas of the United States," he says. There is a dire need, particularly in nonurban areas. for adequate systems of aid transport and

Kremlin Is Pushing Hanoi Hard

By RAY CROMLEY WASHINGTON (NEA) -Hanoi's current attack pattern in South Vietnam tastes

more of Moscow than of Hanoi. It likewise runs counter to very strong advice given by Mao Tse-tung's representatives in North Vietnam

The inevitable conclusion, backed by bits and pieces of other evidence, is that Hanoi is moving closer to the Soviet Union. And away from China.

This is further confirmed by the obviously great Soviet investment in North Vietnam over the past year-in tanks, modern antiaircraft weapons and efficient artillery.

All this has consequences for the United States, for Southeast Asia and for China.

The Soviet pattern here is similar to the Moscow involvement in the Middle East and in the India-Pakistan war-first, heavy quantities of military supplies, then Soviet promises of diplomatic backing and promises of more supplies and, finally, direct or indirect Soviet encouragement for strong military action.

If these North Vietnamese attacks are successful, even partially: they will strengthen Moscow's position throughout Indochina and in Burma. Malaysia and Indonesia.

Success would likewise push Moscow one step further along in its encirclement of China. On the contrary, if the North Vietnamese drive fails, Moscow has lost nothing

Traditionally, major Communist offensives of the type now being carried out in Vietnam are followed by a diplomatic move of considerable importance.

The political move is timed precisely with the high point of the military attacks. In the past, the Communists have been known to station their diplomats strategically, then send a wire from the military command post at the exact moment of triumph-however short lived. The object has been to strike politically at the hour of their greatest advantage.

The Vietnam military attacks are timed so closely to President Nixon's trip to Moscow it may well be the political ultimatum could be obliquely offered during Nixon's visit, It is understood North Vietnamese officials of considerable stature have arranged to be in Moscow ately before Mr. Nixon

arrives. Leonid I. Brezhnev would certainly be in a very strong position to say to President Nixon on his visit to the Soviet Union that if the United States wants peace in the world and a settlement of the Vietnam war. then he Mr. Nixon, must deal through the Kremlin.

The implications of all this for

the United States are serious. What is clear is that the Soviet Union in the Middle East, in South Asia and now in Southeast Asia has given clear signs that it is not about to enter any meaningful arrangement for cutting back the tensions around the world.

The Kremlin may agree to some form of strategic arms limitation, which could be a blessing whatever the Soviet intentions. But the indications now are that such an agreement would be intended merely to give the Soviet Union more leeway for fishing in troubled waters worldwide without fear of nuclear war at home.

South Viet Just About Do or Die

WASHINGTON (NEA) Stories are incorrect which say the Pentagon gave no warning that a North Vietnamese offensive might strike hard at South Vietnamese territory just below the so-called Demilitarized Zone.

Weeks ago a Pentagon official told me a principal fear of the U.S. military was that North Vietnamese regulars would execute a powerful sweep across the northernmost province which would carry them to the Gulf of Tonkin coast and possibly engulf two or three

sizable South Vietnamese cities. It is not true, as some prestigious newspapers are now saying, that the Pentagon has been focusing all its fears on the prospect of enemy assaults in South Vietnam's central

highlands (Military Region 2) Trouble has been expected there, of course, since this thinly populated area is the weakest element in that country's defenses. It is the one area where the otherwise

Millions more would come from non-capitalist and anti-capitalist nations if we had not raised our own legal barriers to slow down the immigration. This is the kind of "election" the Marxists never win. It is the kind we would

battered Viet Cong have retained a continuing strong presence and can provide North Vietnamese regulars with important field support.

What seems more puzzling from this distance is this:

If our military could perceive the danger to the northern provinces, it must be presumed that Saigon's commanders saw it, too. Why, then, would they put main reliance there on the relatively new. inexperienced 3rd Division?

It is that division which the North Vietnamese, storming across the DMZ with tanks and artillery, have cut up badly and driven from a host of defensive fire bases.

The deployment below the DMZ of a division formed only last year suggests a serious nervousness on the part of President Thieu's government about the military stability of the more populous regions of South Vietnam from a line above Saigon on down the southern Mekong River delta. Obviously, the most experienced troops are being

kept on station in those areas. To the extent any substantial portion of the better units is now committed to the northern battle, they will provide the acid test of the Vietnamization program. For if they, too, should be rolled back then the message would be plain: South Vietnam, left to its own combat ground forces, does not have the capacity to contain a really hard thrust from Hanoi.

The view all along the Pentagon has been more optimistic. It has been that North Vietnam could score some early ground gains in the north and in the central region, but that the cost in blood and arms would be heavy for Hanoi and eventually compel a halt tothe offensive

That conceivably still could be the outcome, though it is

much too early to say. Clearly Saigon is getting substantial air support from the United States in the effort to blunt the drive. Our calling into gulf waters of additional aircraft carriers is an indication we can no longer provide such assistance from in-country fighter-bombers. Only four squadrons of U.S. attack aircraft are left in South Vietnam. Saigon's own "air" is growing apace, but it does not and will not include our faster. more sophisticated planes nor any of the potent "gunships."

Nor can Saigon any longer look for big in-country ground combat from America. We have just seven "maneuver" battalions left there, against a high of 112 at the war's manpower peak. Their job is truly defensive. On the ground, Saigon is really alone.

Dear Dr. Lamb - I have had seizures since I was 11 or 12 years old, and I am now 32 and have them occasionally, but only at night after a nervous, exhausting day. My parents call them fainting spells and will not discuss this problem. My question is my husband feels should tell our 15-year-old daughter that her children will probably have epilepsy. Can the type of seizure have be inherited?

Dear Reader-There is no yes or no answer to your question. Unless your husband also has epilepsy, however, there isn't a real high probability that either your daughter or her children will have the problem. Actually only three to five per cent of the relatives of individuals with epilepsy also have the same problem. I am more concerned about your parents' attitude toward the problem and what it may have done to you.

Epilepsy is just another illness and a fairly frequent one at that. You certainly should be under medical supervision if you are not and a person with as infrequent episodes as your letter indicates is usually easily controlled with medicine

It is always disconcerting to see someone attach a stigma to a medical illness. Some of the most important figures in world history have also had epilepsy, which was why Julius Caesar had the falling sickness," and Alexander the Great is also reported by some authorities to have been an epileptic. The world would have been quite a different place without either of them

Dear Dr. Lamb-I am 77 and have high blood pressure with poor circulation. I am taking medicine from the doctor plus fluid pills for swelling in my legs and I can't sleep at night. A friend of mine told me wine was good for the circulation. Would you advise this?

Dear Reader-Unless you have liver damage, stomach ulcers, or other medical problems that cause you difficulties, there is no reason that you couldn't take a little bit of wine at night. Some people find this very useful in helping them sleep.

To the extent that the alcohol in the wine acts as a sedative and relaxes a person's nerves and helps them sleep it is probably bene-It doesn't, unfortuficial. nately, do anything else that is particularly good for the circulation. In truth the person who uses too much alcohol in any form can even damage the heart muscle, but this occurs only in individuals who take considerably more than a glass of wine with their meals or at bedtime. You could use any of the wines that you find in your local supermarkets or liquor stores. Most of the table wines and the dessert wines are approximately 19 per cent alcohol by volume.

Common Cause-Budgets More For Members Than for Cause

By ROBERTS. ALLEN

WASHINGTON - Common Cause, militant liberal self-styled "people's lobby," spent \$4,148,000 in pressure and propaganda operations last year, and is vigorously bent on doing the same or better this

The governing board has approved a \$4,500,000 budget-depending on income for the \$15 dues, contributions, gifts and responses to "special appeals.

In 1971, Common Cause had 230,000 dues-paying members. and derived \$582,600 in contributions and gifts, plus \$95,000 from so-called special appeals, largely newspaper ads, TV commercials and other soliciting literature. Of the gifts and contributions, \$251,500 was in amounts over \$500.

The aggressive lobbying organization wound up the year with a \$312.091 surplus. It collected a total of \$4,210,000; spent \$4,148,000.

Significantly, largest single expenditure was for what is melliflously described as 'nationwide membership building"-\$1,526,464. That is 36.8 per cent of Common Cause's 1971 income, and spells out to a \$5.51 cost for each new

"It was money well spent," emphatically declares John Gardner head of the organization and HEW secretary in the Johnson administration and previously president of Carnegie Foundation. Gardner claims he gets no salary, but reportedly his traveling and other

expenses exceeded \$35,000. Second to the more than one-third of funds that went for 'membership building" was 27.1 per cent for "legislative activities '-- that is high-pressure lobbying in Washington and state capitals, newsletters and other propaganda, and "phone banks" manned by volunteers and others. According to Common Cause, these

numbered more than 900. The remaining third of funds went for the following: 19.5 per cent for running "field offices" in New York, Boston, Denver and San Francisco: 10.6 per cent for a "data processing system" that computerizes a lot of information about members; 4.7 per cent for propagandizing and otherwise "communicating" with members; and 1.3 per cent for a special Colorado lobbying

project According to Common Cause's unpublicized balance sheet, it wound up 1971 with total assets comprising the following: cash \$192,100, investments (bank deposits collecting interest) \$200,000 advances (unexplained) \$3.865. prepaid expenses (unexplained) \$50,633, accounts receivable (unexplained) \$8,232: total \$454,831.



That is now costing considerably more than last

In the latter months of 1971. cost of wooing new members soared to \$18.29 per by direct mail and \$22.99 from ads. Officials are uncommunicative on how high costs are running this year.

But they are optimistically projecting a renewal rate of 50 per cent-an phenomenal level. but apparently with some semblance of substance. Accroding to them, the first two months of 1972 "reflected" a renewal figure of 67 per cent. But it is admitted (as a sort of afterthought) that this result is 'early and inconclusive.'


