Recidivism rates are at an all-time high. One out of every three ex offenders is returned to prison within five years of release. Who bears the blame for our nation's prisons being filled to capacity?
The break-down of the family unit and society's changing attitude The break-down of the family unit and society's changing attitude toward crime and punishm
from being the only ones.
The problem is an epidemic and will require the concerted efforts of all of society to control. Programs which address the social problems that oftentimes lead to prison are desperately needed. W must strengthen the programs all ready in place which encourage
reform. We must address the issues which face those newly released from prison. And, we must educate society as a whole; not least of which are the individuals who repeatedly return to a life of crime. "Get tough on crime" attitudes in the past five years have resulted in more offenders being incarcerated than ever before. However, what can be said of a society which locks up its children? Surely the
money being spent on incarcerated youthful offenders would be better spent on programs designed to counteract the problems which are destroying our nation's most precious natural resource. In recent years, it has become clear that rehabilitation within the
prison setting does not always work. The very atmosphere of prison prison setting does not always work. The very atmosphere of prison ber of society.
More rehabilitation should be done outside the prison environment through alternative sentencing which targets young law-
breakers who might benefit from rehabilitative efforts. breakers who might benefit from rehabilitative effrorts
Undoubtedly, responsible parents have the strongest influence on a child's development, but according to statistics, social influence is a
close second. close second.
Society must therefore produce more mentors, more role model
and more volunteers to participate in programs designed to and more volunteers to participate in programs designed to guide
youths who've gone astray. Locking our children up with hardened criminals who have nothing better to offer them than socially unacceptable behavior is not the answer. The children we are allowing to
slip through the cracks today are as much a part of our future as the slip through the cracks today are as much a part of our future as the No one expects prisons to compete with institutions of higher
learning, but there are serious flaws in the prison education system. Existing programs designed to prepare incarcerated offenders fo life in a free society are few and far between. Many of those which do exist are merely store-fronts propped in
place as a means of artificially boosting budget requirements. place as a means of artificially boosting budiget requirements. some programs with warm bodies than into their proper administration and operation.
Correctional facilities must do more of what their name suggests
