



during the last three years too pending MEXICO CITY, July 24.—(P)—A statement by Police Chief General Antonio Rios Zertuche was regarded to some quarters today as possibly the way for an official statement withdrawing the sting of the recent assertion that the Catholic clergy were Minimum Now to blame for the assassination of General Alvaro Obregon.

The statement said that the clergy were cooperating in investigation of the slaying. Last week General Zertuche announced that "responsibility for the crime lies with the Catholic clergy." It was thought today that this first assertion might be modified to apply to some individual or group instead of the clergy as a whole.
