Every fire tends to raise the cost of every commodity, since losses determine the insurance rates and the ultimate cost of doing business.

Sixty-five per cent of deaths by fire are in residences, and most of these highly inflammable dwellings were not equipped with any kind of fire extinguishers. A draft from an open door or broken window brings the house down almost before the fire department can arrive. There are few absolutely fire proof buildings. Even a steel-frame and stonework building will collapse if the contents of a few rooms burn and heat the steel to a red glow, at which it will lose half its tensile strength.

Firefighting is an exact science, machinery is highly efficient, and skilled men are kept for no other purpose, yet all of this is from the negative standpoint-the idea of Fire Prevention week is to give firemen a permanent rest. It remains a shameful fact that between the years of 1920 and 1927 there was an annual fire loss of \$500,000,000 in this Getting action for country. fire prevention is harder than collecting money for foreign
