#### The Proposed Highway Program

A number of very able Texans are giving serious consideration to proposed highway legislation which will be designed to overcome some objections to the present policies of highway construction. Most of the suggestions made public thus far in one way or another propose state bond issues, based on gasoline and motor license fees. As a part of this. proposal it is suggested that counties be relieved of all burden for the purpose of highway construction. This provision to be retroactive to counties that have already issued bonds for highway construc-
