## Mules Play Consolation In Tourney

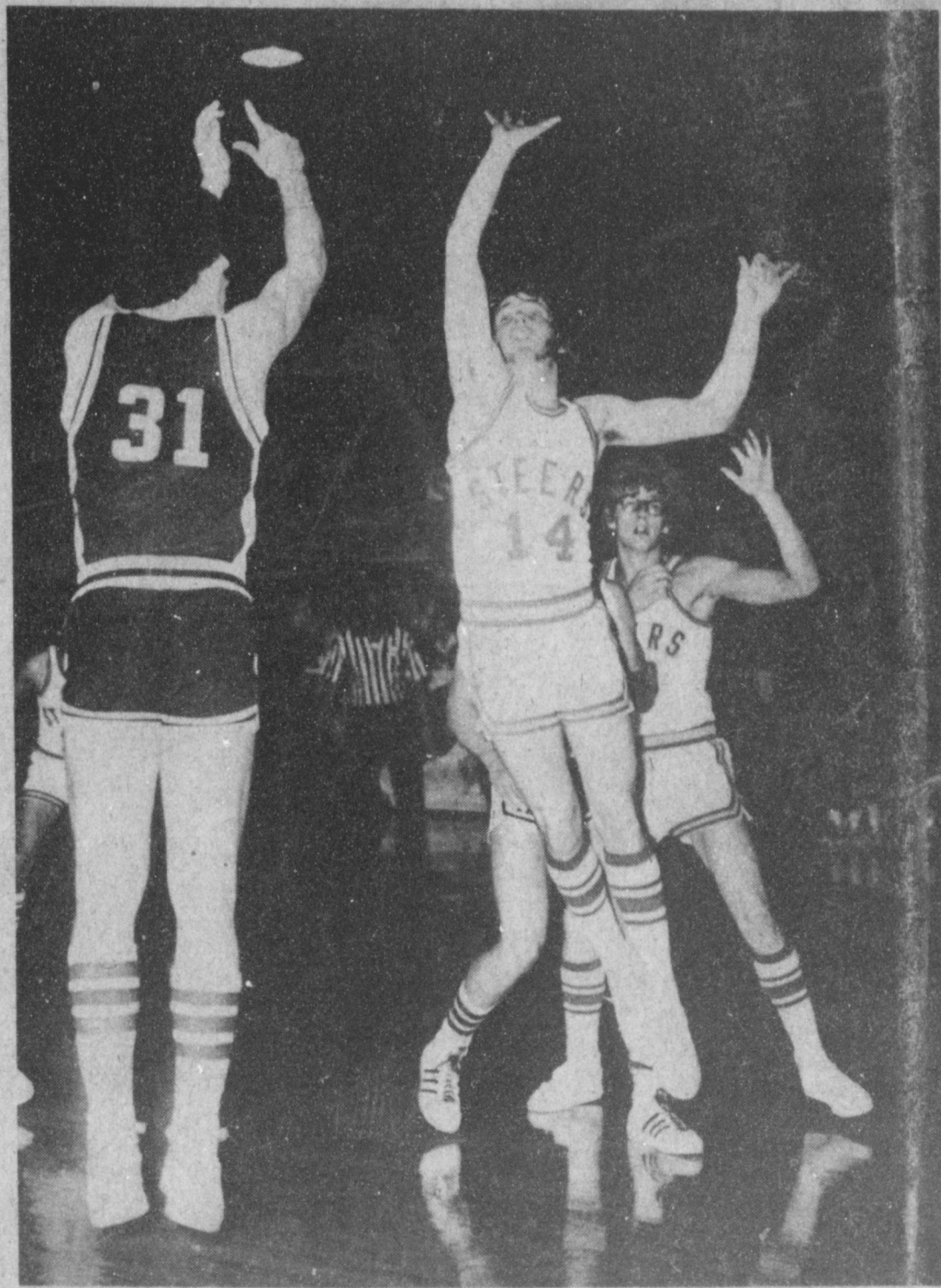
Muleshoe's Mules were to play Friona for consolation Saturday afternoon at 3:30 after dropping one game and winning one in the Vega Tournament.

In their first game, the Mules fell to Groom by a score of 46-45.

In the first quarter, the Mules trailed Groom 14-10, a lead that narrowed to 21-22 by halftime. As the close of the third quarter showed on the clock, the Mules still trailed, 31-40, before losing out by one at the end of the game.

## Electronics Industry Looking At Muleshoe

Beginning this week, the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation and the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will be conducting an intensive survey in the Muleshoe area.

The survey is being conducted to determine the number of potential workers for a new industry which is considering Muleshoe as one of the possible sites for a new plant.

Before the company can reach a decision, they will need to know the number of workers who will be

available. This company is 80 years old, did over \$100 million in business last year, and their stock is traded on the New York Stock Exchange.

They will offer wages and a fringe benefit package that would be at least average for the same type of work in this area. A profit-sharing plan is also a possibility, according to a spokesman for the company.

Types of jobs which would be available if the company decides to locate in this area include Bench-type electronics assembly; sewing machine operators; quality control inspectors; general maintenance workers and laborers.

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## Defense Approved; Sites Disapproved

## Director Election Set For County

Bailey County residents within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's service area will go to the polls on January 17 to elect four representatives, including a District Director for Precinct Three (Bailey, Castro and Parmer Counties) and three Bailey County committeemen.

Bailey County's secretary, Doris Wedel, is now accepting Application-Affidavits at the district office in Muleshoe from candidates who are eligible to serve as district committeemen. Any individual who is 18 years of age and who has resided within the district's election boundaries for six months preceding the January 17, 1981 election date,

is eligible to serve.

A committeeman may served two consecutive four year terms under the by-laws of the district. Directors are not restricted in the number of terms they may serve.

## Brucellosis Meet Set Here Soon

Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer Tanksley said a countywide meeting is scheduled to discuss the new Texas Brucellosis Laws and Regulations. He said the meeting will be Tuesday, December 16 at 7 p.m. in the district courtroom of the Bailey County courthouse.

According to the county agent, Dr. John McNeill will be the special guest speaker giving a general explanation of the new brucellosis laws. Dr. McNeill is area Extension livestock specialist from Amarillo.

Other speakers will include local veterinarians, Dr. Jerry Gleason, Dr. Barry Cowart, and Dr. Steve Lewis.

The three local veterinarians will give the program as to how it will affect Bailey County and the assistance they can provide a producer in helping to eradicate brucellosis from their herds.

Tanksley said he would like to encourage especially all beef producers, but also all interested persons to attend this educational program

If any positive comments were made by many of the estimated 1,400-1,500 persons attending an MX Missile briefing in Clovis Wednesday night, it was unanimous, "We want the system, and see the need for the MX Missile system, but not here."

Conducting the hearing at Marshall Auditorium in Clovis were Col. Bill Sims, USAF; Col. Ken Van Dillen USAF; Major Dick Bryan, USAF and Robert Van Tassel.

Much of the crowd appeared to be farmers and ranchers who were concerned about their possible future in farming and what would happen to farm and ranch lands if the MX Missile System should be located in Eastern New Mexico and the Southern High Plains in Texas.

Both Col. Sims and Col. Van Dillen emphasized the Air Force is still opting for the Utah-Nevada proposed location, but added fierce competition from the states who say they don't want the system is forcing the government to also look at the alternative site, which would affect Bailey County as well as a large portion of New Mexico and Texas.

If a decision is made to locate all of the system in this area, Col. Sims explained that 1,400 families will be displaced by the system. However, if it goes to split-basing, with a portion of the system in Nevada-Utah, and the other portion in the Texas-New Mexico area, only 141 families would be displaced.

When asked how many families would be displaced by constructing the network of concrete structures entirely in Nevada-Utah, Col. Sims commented, "zero."

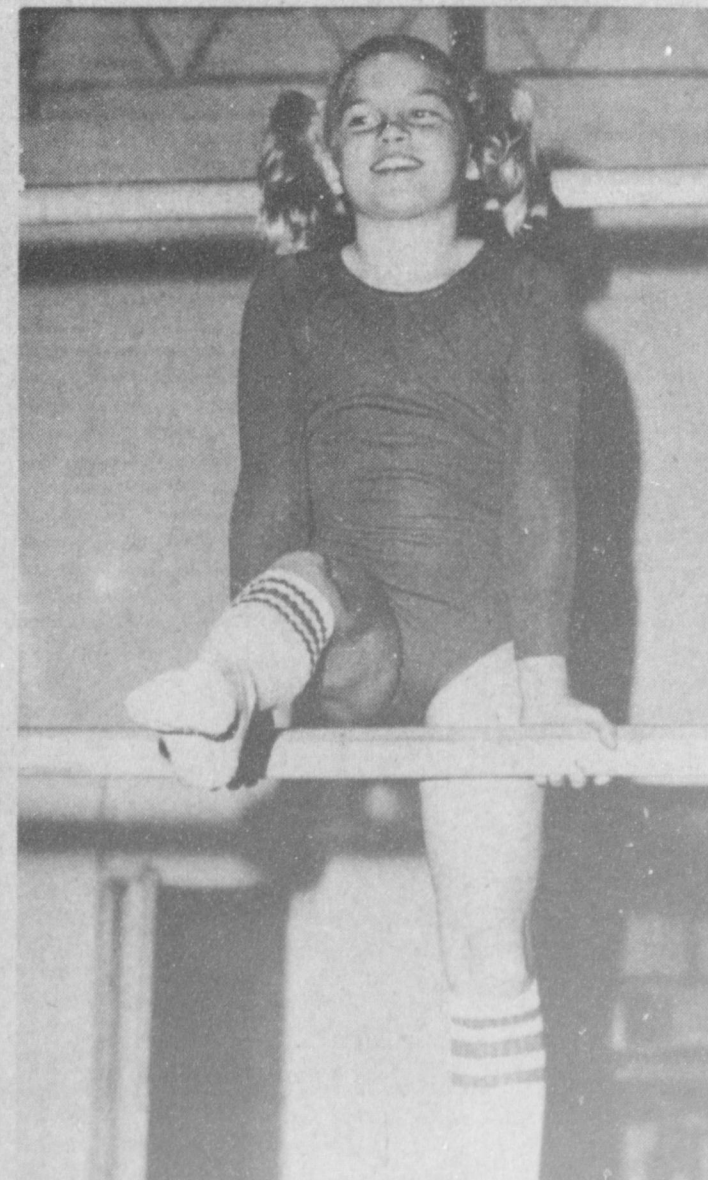
Also, if it is decided to construct the system in the western states, no land purchases would be required, as the system would be built entirely on land already owned by the federal government. One young man asked, "Why should we sell more land to the government. They already own 50 percent of New Mexico."

Prepared statements were read by several persons after Col. Sims asked for persons to go ahead with prepared statements before the question and answer session started. However, other persons who spoke appeared to 'ad lib' from notes. One man, who identified himself as Dr. Joe Scozzafava, a public health physician from Ft. Sumner, read a prepared statement which was ill-received by the large crowd.

During a dissertation on the opposition to the concept of the MX Missile System, he said, "I am one of the co-founders of the Seventh Direction and Citizens for Peace, based in Boston."

According to the man who said he was a doctor, one reason for opposition was the cost, up to \$100 billion; another was the necessity of the MX Missile System; but the main reason Scozzafava said he was against the system was because it is based "upon the insane philosophy of the entire nuclear war industry." He advocated taking money used for defense and use the money to help feed and clothe the poor people.

As he continued, many persons in the audience told him to 'shut-up and sit down'. Following a brief Cont. Page 6, Col. 5



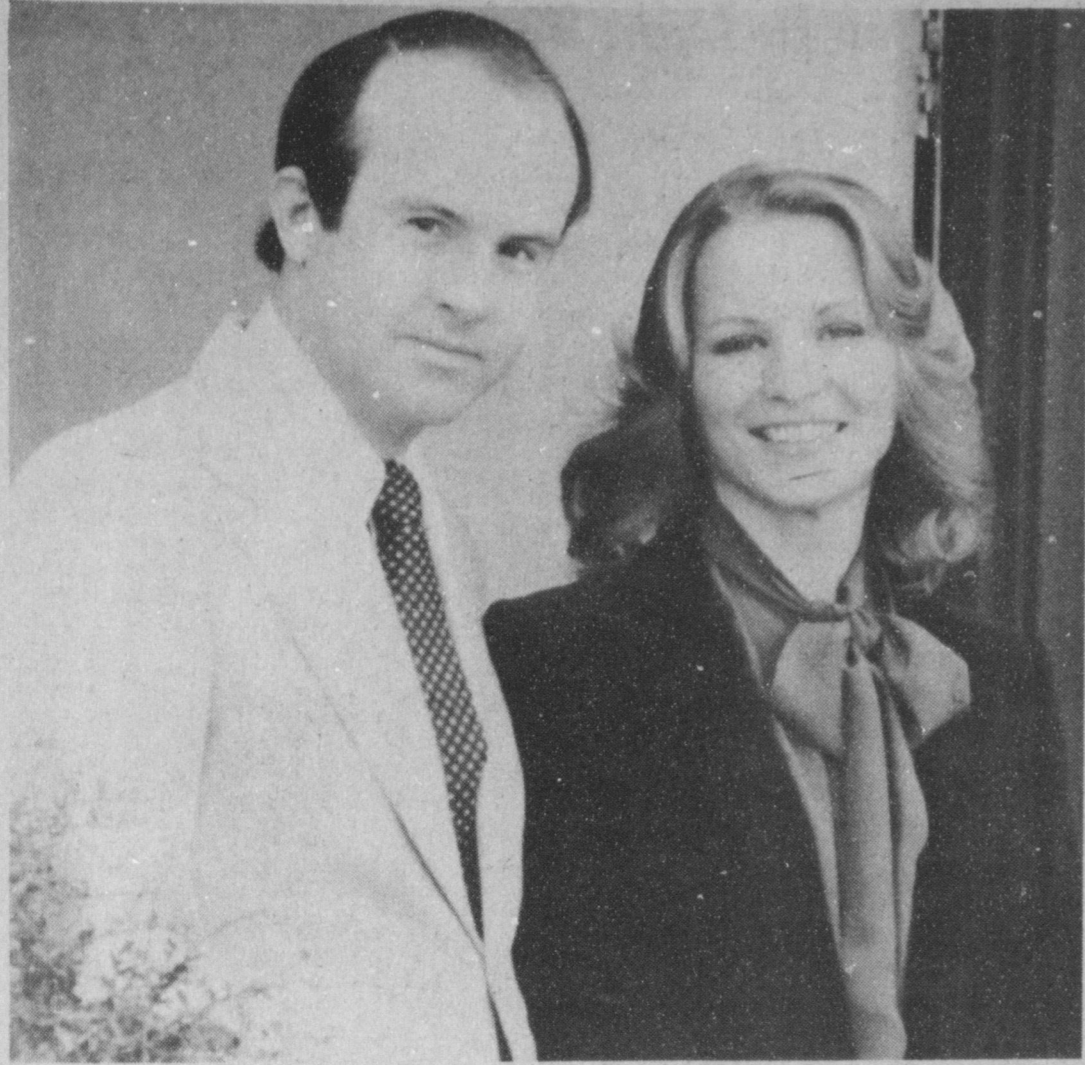

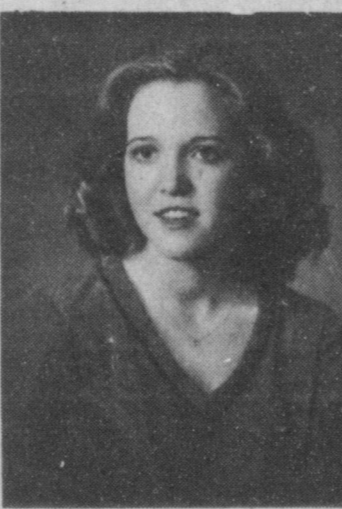
### AAUW Girl Of Month

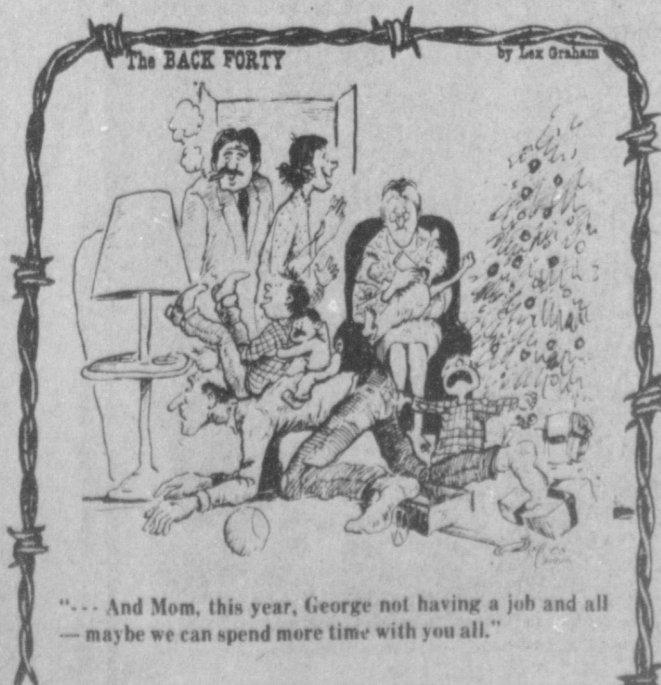

### Sweet Can Be Light With Egnog Pie

Throughout its early years, eggnog has been known by many other names: egg-pop, custard posset, syllabub, milk punch, flip, one yard of flannel and auld man's milk. Instructions for making it appeared in diaries and travel notes. Eggs, milk, ale or sack, a dry wine, are standard eggnog ingredients.

For a fluffy finale to a sumptuous holiday dinner, Eggnog Chiffon Pie provides that airy yet sweet touch with which people like to top off a meal.

The dessert can be made with several variations: regular pie crust with part of the custard mixture flavored with melted chocolate, black-bottom-style, or with a crust of graham cracker or chocolate cookie crumbs. Traditional custard flavors include rum and brandy, coffee and peppermint.

Easy is the tip-off, whatever the pie, since smooth and creamy dairy eggnog, gelatin and whipped cream form the custard. This fool proof dessert should be made the day before to allow thorough chilling for easy slicing.

Black-Bottom Eggnog Chiffon Pie  
Yield: one 9 inch pie

1 baked pie shell, 9 inch  
Filling  
3 tablespoons water  
2 tablespoons rum  
2 tablespoons brandy  
1 1/2 envelopes unflavored gelatin  
2 1/2 cups dairy eggnog  
1/4 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 squares (2 oz.) semi sweet chocolate  
1 cup whipping cream  
Whipped cream, if desired  
Chocolate curls, if desired

For filling, combine water, rum and brandy in a small bowl. Sprinkle gelatin on mixture to soften. Combine 1 1/4 cups eggnog, sugar and salt in a small saucepan; heat only to the boiling point. Add softened gelatin; stir until gelatin is dissolved. Remove from heat. Add remaining 1/4 cups eggnog. Pour 1 cup eggnog mixture into heavy saucepan. Pour remaining eggnog mixture in a bowl; cover and refrigerate until partially set, about 50 minutes. Add chocolate to eggnog in pan; stir and heat until well blended. Pour into a bowl and chill until partially set, about 40 minutes. When chocolate mixture is nearly set, beat until smooth. Spread in bottom of pie shell; re-

frigerate until set. Whip cream until stiff. Fold into plain eggnog mixture. Turn into pie shell on top of chocolate mixture. Allow to set, then cover and chill 4 hours or overnight. Serve garnished with whipped cream and chocolate curls.

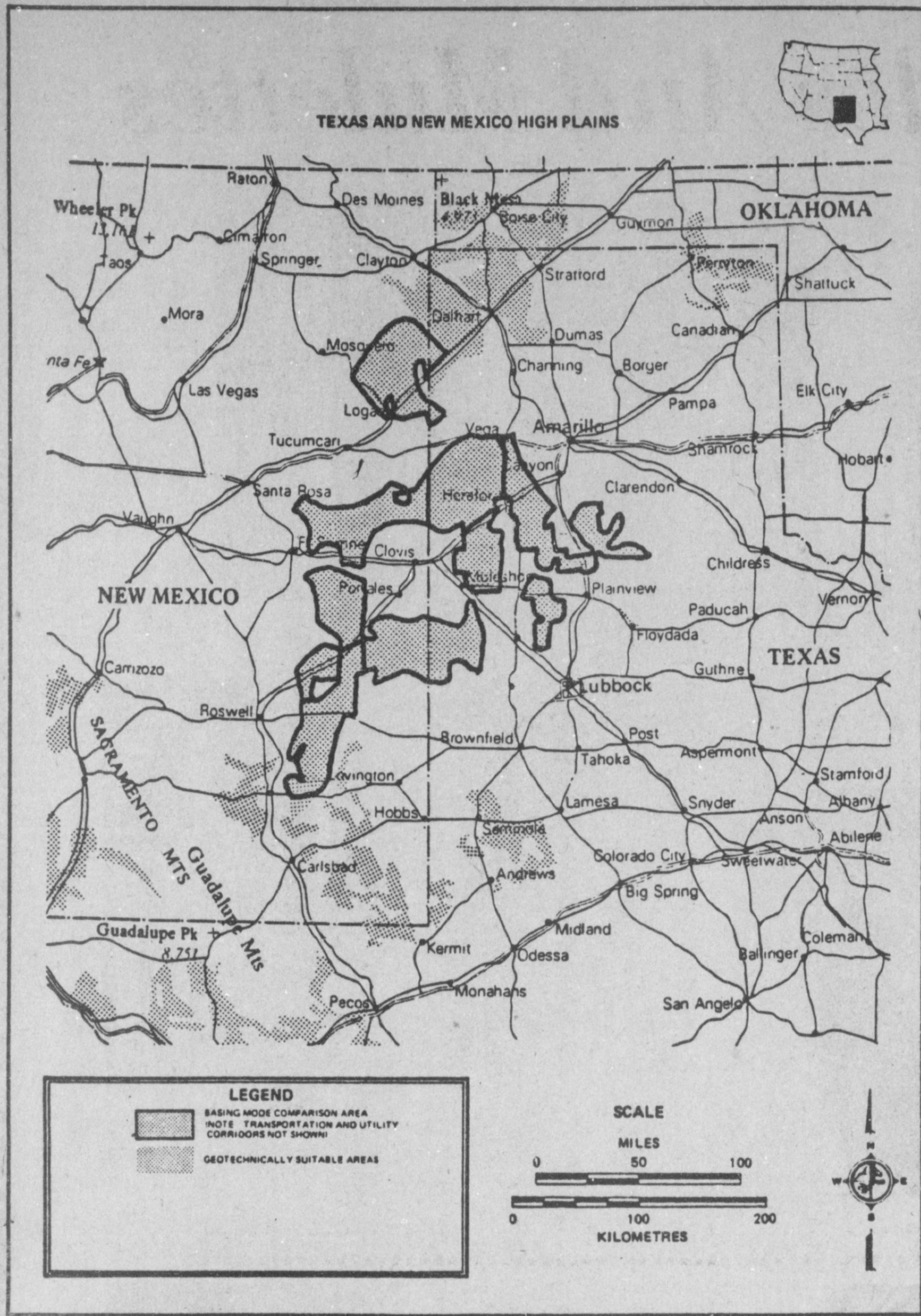

lull, during which time most of the audience voiced their disapproval of the man's statements, Col. Sims restored order for Scozzafava's closing comments.

Much concern was exhibited on the depleting water supplies, and the amount of water which would be necessary not only for construction, but to operate the massive system once it is completed.

In response to one question, Col. Sims said the government would assure adequate water supplies, and indicated that water importation which has been sought for the last several years would be speeded up.

Concerned farmers and ranchers were assured by the Air Force officers that should construction be instituted, only 7.5 acres of land would be secured during the construction stages, and only 2.5 acres would be fenced off into a security area.

Also, following the construction, normal farming and ranching operations could be conducted on all except the fenced off missile sites.

In the event a family must be displaced, as no one can reside within a 3,000 foot safety from the missile sites, they will be compensated and relocated according to the officers. Also, each shelter will be a mile apart, and as portions of the proposed site are in southern and northeastern Bailey County, questions were raised about losing some of the prime farm land in the area.

Water consumption during the 10 year construction stage is expected to be 21,000 acre feet per year, dropping to 12,000 for operations per year once complete.

In 1981, the site selection will be announced, with physical construction scheduled to begin in 1982. Col. Sims said section lines will be used as much as possible for the 9,000 miles of roads. The easements for the roads will be 100 feet wide, and the roads will be constructed and maintained by the Corp of Engineers. The roads will

be all-weather unpaved roads.

During construction, wages will be near the wages currently paid in this area, although only about 20 percent of the estimated work force will be chosen from among local residents. Population of the area is expected to grow by 40,000 - 50,000 people for the 10 year construction period.

If constructed in Texas-New Mexico, the size of Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis will be increased to accommodate the additional military personnel required, as CAFB will be the headquarters of the MX Missile System.

As far as security during construction stages, only on site or point security is being considered at this time.

Another hearing will be conducted following release of the first study in mid-December 1980.

Col. Sims explained that in order to acquire necessary land, if the system is constructed in this area, will be to use federal guidelines to acquire the necessary acreage. The Corp of Engineers will be determining compensation for land to be used, and for relocation of families who may be displaced.

As the four hour meeting drew to a close, the unanimous consensus appeared to be that the people attending the meeting, a cross-section of the population, was not against the system, "but, put it somewhere else, not on my land, or near me."

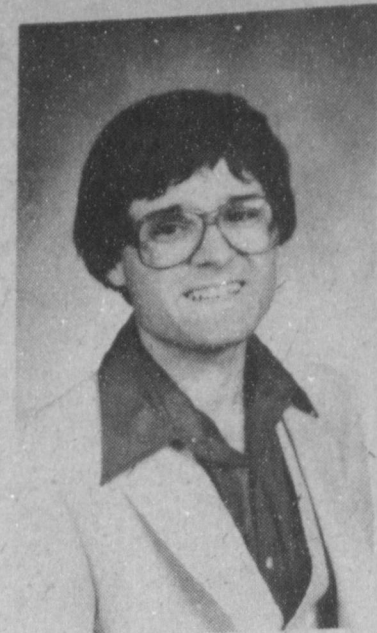

## Bentsen Opposes Limits On Cotton Acreage

Senator Lloyd Bentsen on Wednesday warned that any decision by the U.S. Department of Agriculture to tightly restrict cotton acreage in 1981 would deal a severe blow to drought-stricken Texas farmers.

"A strict requirement that farmers plant within their historical Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) which is based on 1977, would cause severe damage," said Bentsen in a letter to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland.

The USDA shortly will announce its 1981 cotton program containing the limit which farmers must plant within to qualify for government agriculture benefits.

"Texas cotton acreage has expanded dramatically

since 1977, particularly in West Texas. This cotton has been produced in response to market demand, and it has made large contributions to our balance of payments while expanding our export markets as well as supplying domestic markets," Senator Bentsen said.

"These Texas farmers are in a free market which is now telling them through high prices, that there is a demand for their cotton."

"I am opposed to the imposition of a historical NCA requirement which would impose tight acreage restrictions. I believe that either there should be no NCA requirement for cotton, or that the individual farm NCA's should be up-

dated to reflect current planted acreage," Bentsen said.

"The market is now saying that we need more cotton, and I believe that our farmers should not be barred from meeting this market demand," Senator Bentsen said.

## Veterans Educational Assistance Program

Starting December 1, 1980, Army recruiters will be offering a new, free version of the Veteran's Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) which, up to now, has required the service member to contribute \$50 to \$75 monthly toward a future education fund.

"Under the new VEAP," says Lieutenant Colonel Thomas Schatzman commander of Army recruiting activities in New Mexico and West Texas, "there is no service member's contribution, and the total possible package now ranges from \$7,400 for a two year enlistment to \$18,100 for a four year enlistment. The new offer is open to high school graduates who score in the top half of the Armed Forces Qualifications Test and volunteer for a critical skill.

The Army program differs from the other services through a unique two year enlistment and "Super VEAP" kickers or extra bonuses of \$2,000, \$4,000 and \$6,000 for two, three and four year enlistments respectively.

Critical skills are those fields involving high technology requirements such as electronic intelligence, radar applications, critical equipment repair, and the vital combat arms skills. "These critical job areas, except for direct combat roles," said Schatzman, "are open to women."

How does the new offer work? If a physically and mentally qualified high school graduate scores 50 or higher, chooses a critical skill which pays a \$4,000 bonus, and elects a four year enlistment, he receives the \$4,000 cash bonus, a \$6,000 kicker and the free, non-contributory \$8,100 VEAP fund for a total of \$18,100.

Even though restricted from the combat arms, a woman may still get the \$18,100 by enlisting for four years as a Korean linguist in an electronic warfare job. Many other critical technical fields are also open to women with bonuses up to \$3,000.

**Severe Peanut Shortage Brings Higher Prices**

AUSTIN—Texas peanuts are bringing record high prices because of severe crop shortages and other problems in major producing states, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

"The government price support is \$455 per ton, and buyers are paying bonuses of \$450 and up just to get peanuts to satisfy contracts. Texas growers have never seen \$700 to \$900 a ton peanuts," Brown said. "In a few cases, the price has reached \$1100 a ton."

The Texas harvest is expected to be 48 percent below last year with 275 million pounds. The total U. S. crop is projected to be 42 percent below the 1979 crop at 2.3 billion pounds.

"There just aren't enough

peanuts around to satisfy the demand. Storage peanuts have all been committed. So farmers with peanuts to sell can just about set their price," Brown said.

The Commissioner alerted consumers that now is the time to stock up on peanut butter. Texas peanuts are used mainly in peanut butter, candies, and baked goods.

The drought is mainly responsible for the short crop in Texas. Poor growing conditions in the Southeast, coupled with unusually high aflatoxin problems there, have created the shortage.

Texas has had a very low rate of aflatoxin in graded peanuts, currently averaging only 1.2 percent of the harvested crop. Southeastern states have had rates ranging from 10 to 35 percent.



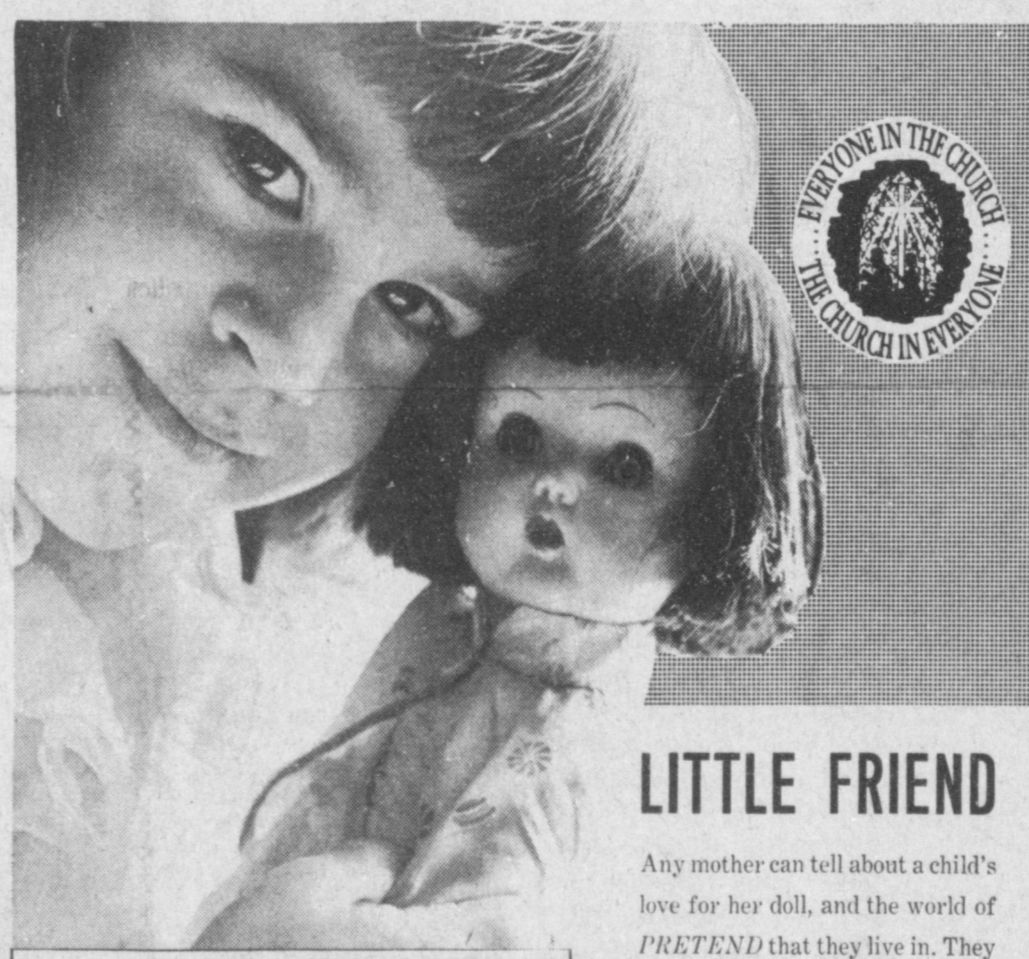
