Approximately 10,000 oil field workers and their families had filtered into the territory. Shacks popped up, like mushroom villages, overnight. Trucks, loaded with machinery worth thousands of dollars, thundered into the area almost unnoticed and preparation for the lifting of the restrictions went on almost unheeded by many of the

people living in the district. The restriction agreement, lifted today, was put into effect two years ago in the Maud and Mission pools, when the other fields of the greater Seminole area were running at their peak.

A few wells were drilled, but were shut down by agreement before production was reached, and firs territory has few weeks ago.

Two months ago eight or ten wells were drilled, in scattered locations, under special permits fr m the Sominole field umpire, and prediction found in these has led oil men to make highoptimistic estimates of the possible production of the two pools.

The area still is restricted, to a certain extent, as only two wells are to be permitted to each 40-acre tract.

The territory from which the drilling restriction was lifted extends from More Mad Dogs the northeast corner of the Mission area, in section 5-8-6, south and wes to within about three miles of Maud where the majority of the new wells are located.





From indications, Ralph Walker Cleburne, and Othol Martin, Jacksboro, will probably get the call at the wings, Saturday.


