NEW TRIAL IS ASKED OF COURT

Grand Jury Goes Into Session Following Recess

After hearing his plea of guilty, a jury in 84th district cour this afternoon took just 25 minutes to give Edwin C. Mack, who had been charged with theft of an automobile, a sentence of two years in the penitentiary. His plea for a suspended sentence was denied.

In many cases this litigation is nothing short of property confiscation by legal means While the state as a whole is given hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of "recovered" property, much of this has

The perfection of titles has a legitimate place in legal affairs of the state, but damage to residents who have bought their land in good faith and lived upon it is deplorable, and justly arouses the ire of those affected and those interested in square dealings.

NO RECENT WAR cloud has received more publicity and aroused more magazine exposition than that hovering over Bolivia and Paraguay.

With the foreign departments of every nation striving toward bringing about peaceful relations, the cause of amicable settlement of such disputes is well furthered.

For instance, even Mexico, unhappily the victim of internal wars for decades, has offered to mediate and has received cordial replies from both coun-

Bolivia and Paraguay are furnishing a good exercise in the principles of war prevention. Not the least important by any means is the ordinary newspaper reporting being done in connection with the events of our south. The British foreign secretary has been moved to remark:

"The implications of a pact of peace are not alone for the ministers or the press; they are for every individual citizen in every country to the pact. They should demand information, good news, fair news, sympathetic news from other countries."

It is not too much to hope that, when this country is involved in a dispute, the peoples of other lands will learn in a similarly fair manner the true facts involved. In no other country in the world are so many foreign news stories, without bias, published.

War is a miserable business. Brave young men go forth to the blare of drums and the fluttering of handkerchiefsand come back minus hands, arms, legs and health. The cry in Bolivia, "We want war. Mr. President, we want war!" is the cry of the mob, the utterance of the uncouth. There is no individual quarrel between individuals living across boundry line. The disputes between state departments can be solved best by impartial judges. War is not a judge, but an executioner.


