Burning of Wooden Dormitory at Ohio Prison Kills 17 Convicts

Barred Windows Prevent Escape of Desperate Inmates

JUNCTION CITY, Ohio. Oct. 8 .-(A)-Seventeen convicts are believed to have burned to death while an equal number were injured when fire at 1 s. m., today swept the wooden dormitory at the state-owned brick plant near here. There were 275 prisners locked in the building when the fire broke out.

A check of the prisoners after the fire revealed 20 missing, but of these, officials believe three escaped from cusody of the guards during the confus-

FOUND NEARBY, WITH SMOKING REVOLVER LYING UNDER A

DEAD BODY OF CANDLE SELLER

Verdict of Inquest for Father De Simone Is Withheld Pending Developments In Mysterious Affair

BEAUMONT, Oct. 8 (AP) -A birth certificate clutched in the dead priest's hand, late today added another clue to those officers are following in an attempt to solve the slaying here today of Father Anthony De Simone of St. Joseph's Catholic church, and John Rose, a close friend, whose bodies were found in the priest's study.

The birth certificate was issued in New York by the Church of Our Lady, Count Carmel, and certified to the birth of Benjamin Ernesto Mario Federio D'Urso.

With this as a working basis, County Attorney Fred White assigned two of his crack investigators to the slaying. While these men worked, two persons who were among the first to see the bodies of the priest and his frind were called before the grand jury, now in session. The investigators said they were working on the theory that the slaying was done by some person other than the two men who were killed.
