Jimmie Brown Asserts Watchman Shot Him in Arm

**COMPANIONS** KILLED RICHEY

Dunwoody and Hall Are Accused of Being Slayers

BORGER, Jan. 3.(P)-A murder warrant was served on Jimmie Brown as he lay in a hospital bed here today for the fatal shooting of J. H. Richey, Hedley night watchman, Monday.

Brown had made a statement in which he admitted participation in connection with the robbery which precipitated a pistol fight, officers said.



OATMEAL COOKIES, FOUR DOZEN 1 cup fat, 2 cups dark brown sugar 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-3 cup sour milk, 1 cup chopped dates, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 1-2 cups oatmea) flakes, 2 1-2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda teaspoon baking powder.

Cream the fat and sugar thoroughly. Add the eggs, vanilla, spices, salt and the cost of advertisement. Proper nomilk and beat for three minutes. Add tice within the time provided by law the rest of the ingredients and break off small peices of the dough and flatten down, three inches apart on greased baking sheets. Bake in a moderate oven for 12 minutes.

To give a better flavor to oatmea! used in cookies, sprinkle it over shallow pan and brown in a moderate oven. To insure the oatmeal being mixed the milk may be placed on the patmeal and allowed to stand for five minutes before being added to the rest of the ingredients.

COCOANUT DIVINITY

2 1-2 cups sugar, 1-2 cup white corn syrup, 1-2 cup water, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten, I cup cocoanut, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Mix the sugar, corn syrup, water and salt. Blend thoroughly. Cook over a moderate fire, without stirring, until a small amount of syrup when poured in cold water "clicks" and forms a very hard ball. Pour into the egg whites and beat until thick, cold and creamy. Add the rest of the ingredients and pour on to a buttered plate. When

### FRUIT PASTE

1 cup chopped dates, 1 cup chopped raisins, 1 cup chopped figs, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons cream, 1cup powdered sugar.

Mix the fruits, nuts, salt, vanilla and cream. Form into a square shape. Sprinkle with the powdered sugar and roll up in waxed paper. Chill. When ready for use, cut in thin slices.
