> GREENVILLE IS DENIED COURT

Moody Unable to See Need for Appeals Body

AUSTIN, April 3. (A) Governor loody today vetoed the Sunday meving picture show bill and the measure which proposed to create a court of civil appeals at Greenville. The picture show bill would have repealed a portion of the Sunday blue laws. which have been on the statute books for many years, to allow showing of theatres on the Sabbath after 1 p. m Most cities are now disregarding the law, proponents of the repeal stated Another measure which would have permitted a co-insurance clause to be

inserted in policies on cotton, grain and other products in the process of hipping or storing also met with excutive disapproval and was vet ted. The governor said he thought the measure might undermine faith in fire

nsurance underwriters. The motion picture measure blue-penciled because he believed it invalid, the governor explained. He declared the measure, as written, would have legalized operation of theatres on Sundays in any incorporated town unless a city council by ordinance prohibited acts allowed by the bill. Citing statutes covering this phase, the governor maintained the legislature could not authorize a city ouncil to pass an ordinance suspend-

ing a general law. In refusing to sign the Greenville court bill, the chief executive said that he did not agree that the necessity existed for another court at the present

Parenthood is granted no masters degree by Mother Nature's undefiled nature. instincts bear the wisdom of the ages, but that wisdom is incompetent in the face of the complexities of modern life The parent may be equal to the task of rearing their child through infancy, but when he reaches the outer world problems arise thick and fast.

Th parents must be educated with the child if for no other reason than to be in a receptive mood for the instruction given them by the teachers and the school nurse and physicians. Moreover, the

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means fixed, methods used in the childhood of the parents are not those approved at the present.

The rigid continental education which made children act like miniature men and women with all the stiffness and unnatural repressions of adulthood, was broken by the experiments of Pestalozzi, Rousseau, and the more modern school of philosopher and teachers, but parents sometimes fall into the ancient practice of treating their children like grownups.

The proper education of the child in all ages is a highly scientific study, hence the parents who enter sympathetically into the teaching program and home cooperation have plenty to learn. The psychology of learning, of adolescence, and the ramifications of these subjects provide fascinating stu-

Furthermore, the P.-T. A. member finds much to do in helping with general school activities, such as providing yceums, entertainments by home talent, furnishing pic tures and playgound equip-ment, and enlisting general community support for school projects.
