# EVIDENCE OF G. O. P. PATRONAGE PLAN IN TEXAS UNFOLDED

Method of Raising Its Funds Defended by Secretary

**TEXAN ATTACKS CREAGER TODAY** 

Asserts Protection Is Given Against Dry Raids

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29. (A)-Charges that R. B. Creager, Republican national committeeman for Texas, several years ago "protected" some Texas hotels from dry raiders were made before the Senate committee investigating disposition of patronage in Texas today by Lloyd Hill of Fort Worth.

Hill, who was an unsuccessful candidate for postmaster at Fort Worth in 1921 told the committee it was "generally assumed" that candidates for postmasterships were expected to pay 10 per cent of their salary to republican organizations.

He said a bell boy at the Adolphus hotel in Dallas told him that Creager protected a place where drinks could obtained. He also said he understood that the Metropolitan hotel in Fort Worth received "protection."

After he had received endorsement that city every year for shipment for the postmastership appointment, Hill said he attended a meeting of republican organization workers at which pledge blanks were distributed.

"Everybody who wanted an office and who was at the meeting was expected to contribute," he said " signed a note for \$1,200 with an agreement for a refund, but half of the pledge which I paid was not re-

The plaintiffs maintain they have received little remuneration from this well, and that the Texas company has not "produced oil or gas in paying quantities' from the land, and that therefore the defendant forfeited the lease.




