Gray County's New Wells Send Production Upward 1,620 Barrels

CARSON COUNTY SHOWS SLOWING

Panhandle Area Boost Is 1,105 Barrels for Week Daily

Augmented by three new producers and an increase in one brought in more than a week ago, Gray county's daily production jumped 1,620 barrels during the last week. Gray was the only county in the Panhandle to show a daily gain.

Gray county's increase was due to the bringing in of the Texas company's No. 7 Saunders, in section 4, block 1, in the LeFors area; the Plains Drilling company's No. 2 Saunders, in the same section, and the George Ray and Plains Drilling company's No. 1 Chapincrease in the Gulf Production company's No. 6-A Bowers, in section 89,

GRAY COUNTY'S gas sources are tremendous, but over a period of years the terrific demands made upon the subterranean stores will lead to gradual exhaustion.

A bill likely will be voted upon by the legislature to limit sales of gas outside the state. Such proposals have often been heard in the past. Restrictions placed upon use of natural gas have effects of far consequence.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19. (A)-It was a nip and tuck race for grain market leadership today between wheat and Temporarily wheat was foremost, and the July delivery of wheat went above any former high price record this season. At the end of the day's trading, however, corn was dominating, and as a result of free profittaking and because of rain reports from the drought district in Argentina both corn and wheat finished unsettled and lower.

Closing quotations on wheat and corn alike were nervous, wheat at 1-4c to 5-8c net decline, corn 13-8c to 13-4c down, oats 1-8c to 11-8c off, and provisions varying from 7c setback to a rise of 5c.

Evidence of a decided increase of interest in wheat trading became manifest shortly after business opened. Active buying for some of the largest houses here was in progress, and was said to come from interests that were outspoken in asserting that price advances for all grain would be limited only by the size of speculative demand.

FORT WORTH, Jan. 19. (A)-It only took a very short session today to clear the livestock yards here of the few cattle and hogs offered. It was strictly a clean-up affair and generally lacking in quality.

A load of light steers that arrived late yesterday sold this morning at \$10.25. The other cattle represented by less than half a dozen loads of mixed classes that sold about in line with yesterday's offering.
