Small Introduces **Bill to Prevent** 

tions

AUSTIN, Jan. 23. (A)-Senator Small of Wellington today proposed a bill providing for the disposal of the present Oklahoma lands which will become a part of Texas under a decision of the United States Supreme Court.

Senator Small's measure would pro vide for the extension eastward of the Texas Panhandle counties along their present limits and would give the pos sessors prior right to purchase.

Senator Small exhibited a letter from Washington which stated that 28,500 acres would be added to Texas if the Supreme Court validated the commission's location of the 100th meridian.

This land lies east of the present boundary between Oklahoma and th Texas Panhandle and west of the 100th meridian at last located.

The Wellington senator explained that since titles to these lands originally were obtained from the United States government instead of from Texas, these titles would be invalid if the territory should be made a part of this state.





survived by his wife and three grandchildren. His only daughter was buried in Ponca City several years ago.



Undoubtedly, it is the thought of the rules committee that public opinion will curb stalling,-that spectators will not pay to see actionless games.

This committee has done much to prevent stalling. The one-yard rule. the bulldogging or freezing the ball rule rule have contributed as an aid to curb stalling.

The one-yard rule declares that "as soon as an opponent takes a position close to (say a yard of) the player with the ball, the latter must get the ball into play." To date, I have seen some of the nation's best officials at work in the game, but I have not seen one of them call a single play of this kind. But the infraction has occured a score of times.

The rules committee has further decreed that there shall be no "bulldogging or freezing the ball." By this is ment that on a jump ball, the player may tap and catch the ball, but if he then holds it until another held ball is declared, he may not tap and catch it on the ensung jump ball. This rule if enforced, will aid in preventing stall-

## A New Mental Trick

In most situations of life, "the old order changeth, giving place to new." I am wondering as I write, if, before the basketball season is too old, these changes in the rules will be made effective. Officials have been calling the plays a long time under the old rules, and they seem a bit calloused to the progressive changes. Evidently, they have developed a habit-a reflex which will take time to replace. For instance, the play in this one-yard rule is such a rapid one that the refree's decision will require the development of a new mental track. Old grooves are worn deeply; and the men in charge of the game are not apt to develop new eyes and new tracks for a little while

Psychologically, in times of stress and excitement, we revert to habits and actions of the past. Thus, do our splendid and well-meaning officials overlook many of the new interpretations.


