"No individual has a right to determine what law shall be obeyed and what law shall not be enforced. If a law is wrong, its rigid enforcement is the surest guaranty of its repeal. If it is right, its enforcement is the quickest method of compelling respect for it."

Governor CIVIL SERVICE **AGAIN IS GIVEN**

Concentration of Texas Penal Structure Included

AUSTIN, April 22. (A)-Governor Moody added laws with reference to the handling of prisoners in the state prison and enactment of statutes to reform methods in which the district courts shall function to prison concentration, civil service and educational subjects in his message to the special session of the legislature.

The house and senate met promptly at 12 o'clock and a committee from the house notified the governor the session was ready for business. They found the chief executive adding the finishing touches to his message.

"It is my desire to first submit for your consideration subjects under which I believe legislation may be passed that will improve departmental conomy and efficiency," he said. Therefore, the following subjects are espectively submitted for your con-

"The enactment of laws providing for the concentration of the Texas





UNFIT OFFICERS TO BE YANKED

State and Local Officers to Be Used Under Plan

WASHINGTON, April 23. (A)-Presdent Hoover has swept state and local as well as federal enactments into the already broad compass of his law enforcement campaign.

In doing so he has stated the enforcement of those laws concern the president of the United States both as a citizen and as one upon whom rests the primary responsibility of leader ship for establishment of standards of law enforcement in the nation.

In employing this language in his address yesterday at the annual luncheon of the Associated Press in New York City, Mr. Hoover makes it clear that one of his purposes is to give assistance to crime commissions in the several states which long to have been studying methods of reducing crime. 

Clashes Expected Soon as Rebel **Army Is Neared**

MEXICO CITY, April 23. (A)-New was expected today of initial clashes near Masiaca, Sonosia, between the principal rebel army entrenched there and advancing federals.

Last reports from General Talaman tes, commanding 2,000 federal cavalry several miles in front of the main army said he had advanced as far as Luis 12 miles south of Masiaca, but had found no enemy.

He was advised to be careful of ambush and not to move too far ahead of the main army, lest the 6,000 or 7,000 rebels at Masiaca and San Antonio cui his horse to pieces before reinforce ments arrived

Moving of the principal federal column, containing more than 8,000 men with artillery and baggage was proving slow work, with further trouble on the newly constructed bridge over the Ric Fuerte, north of San Blas, Sinaloa causing some delay.

With the outposts of the two armie so close to each other, however, long delay in initiating the clash—in which General Calles hopes to repeat the devastating victory over the army of the north at La Forma, Chihuahua-was not believed probable.

General Juan Andreu Almazan, hero of La Forma, sent word to Chapulteped castle he was beginning the movement of his 10,000 troops through Pulpito Pass into Sonora, and would shortly be in a position to attack the rebel army


