ALL WERE NEAR BURNING STOVE

Fresh Air Revives the Victims Last Night

WHITE DEER, Jan. 15. (Special)-Six persons are recovering today from effects of near-asphyxiation last night. Those affected were Mr. and Mrs. J W. Everly, Jack Henderson, E. F. Tubbs H. W. Waters, and J. D. Perkins.

Mr. Everly fainted while sitting by a gas stove in the Everly-Tubbs Furni ture store. He was revived, but a few minutes later Mrs. Everly, sitting nearby, succumbed. Soon afterward, Mr. Everly again lost consciousness. By this time several persons had entered, and several of them were overcome. Henderson helped Mr. Tubbs out into the street before collapsing, and summoned help.

The gas was turned off, windows vived. Lack of ventilation was believed to have caused the fainting. As far as could be determined, there was no carbon monoxide gas involved.






