Work To Last Six Months Starting Soon

A civic project of wide scope and application was launched this morning when City Manager F. M. Gwin, acting on the authority of the city commission, signed a contract with Montgomery and Ward of Wichita Falls for a thorough city planning survey of

Pampa. The survey will start within two weeks and will last about six months

The cost will be \$4.500. The consulting engineers will be here, with surveying crew, for practically the entire time, and they will compile data and maps affecting the future growth of the city along every line. Their study will in clude parks and playgrounds, land-scaping of all public grounds, plans for a municipal swimming pool plans for handling and routing traffic, placing of all mains of public utility and municipal services, drainage, sewer system,, zoning, building codes, lighting, airport, city beautification, and legal details of enforcing the ordinances to be adopt-

After the preliminary surveys are made, hearings will be held for the public, with the engineers explaining details. When the voluminous reports, maps and plans have been approved by the ctiy commission. they will be bound in leather volumes and placed on file here.

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




