

THE INSIDE OF CHICAGO GANGDOM

Investigations of Reporter Lingle's murder in Chicago are revealing what many must have guessed at the outset-that Lingle used his position and his influence for the benefit of gangsters, and for a price. Naturally, he could not serve the purposes of all gangs at once, and he was too dangerous a man to leave in the ranks of a rival outfit.

His work as a reporter, in common with newspaper practices in the larger cities, made it easy for him to deceive his paper. He was not a reporter in the real sense, but a scout, a fact gatherer. Because of his connections and his wide acquaintanceship he was valuable. Bruce Catton writes for NEA service the inside story

of the growth of Chicago racketeering. Pat Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney in Cook county, tells the tale. Says Catton:

'Official corruption is directly responsible for the of the gangster in Chicago. Chicago has been plaguwith gangs for the past ten years because of the perfetly obvious fact that if you have been taking money from a man for letting him run beer and whiskey, you cannot very consistently turn around and arrest him for murder. There isn't any mystery about it. Chicago's gangs got their influence and power because of crooked politics. The only thing that will ever make the gangs curl up and disappear is a restoration of simple, old-fashioned honesty in public office and political power."

Big Jim Colosimo, Roche told the interviewer, started as a street cleaner. Then he ran a string of disorderly houses, got rich, got the big head, organized a gang, and got shot for his trouble.

The ward politician really started the system how-ever. He undertook to run out all except certain businesses in his ward—and to collect from the remainder a sort of license or right to exist. The politician needed a strong-arm squad to enforce his edicts, so such a squad he formed. But the sluggers had much time to medi-They got to taking money that never reached the politician. They made bargains of which he knew nothing. They instilled fear in him, and thus the ward bosses became the victims of the gangs they had created. In deeply in graft, they could not squeal, so they did the hest they could, continuing to take some of the tribute from favored business houses. In turn they kept the police from raiding illegal joints.

Then came prohibition, and to the surprise of the racketeers they found it, to them, a blessing in disguise. Beer that could be made at \$1.50 a barrel could be peddled to thirsty Chicagoans for \$50 a barrel. The illicit







business commanded an annual revenue running far into Beer peddling and tribute gathering had the millions. become a system reaching far up into official life.

The strong-arm squads broke up into the groups, of which the Bugs Moran and Al Capone gangs are best known. The slayings are the result of territorial rivalry, personal hatred, and broken agreements. Capone, the killer, did much to start the warfare. The well established custom of taking traitors "for a ride" was inaugurated as a disciplinary measure. When the boss gangster marks a weak number for the "ride", Catton writes, the victim's best gangster friend is appointed to lead him to slaughter. The friend does or takes a similar fate. As late as yesterday a young hoodlum was found dead, a nickel in his hand. A "cheap" individual, he had broken the gangster traditions and the badge of cheapness was left in his cold hand.

It is a sad chapter in American life. The facts are well known. The gangster bosses are pictured in newspapers almost every day. There are few unsolved murders in Chicago, few that is, except those involving the Yet the law is so immeshed in corruption that "rides". the professional killer has less fear of the statutes than the peaceable motorist caught driving five miles above the speed limit.

Yet is Chicago's shame puzzling? No. There is no illegal system that is not, at bottom, rather simple. Chicagoans know very well what is the trouble. Some of them profit by it, and condone it; the rest are indifferent or are unable to do very much about it. The Association of Commerce recognizes the menace to the extent of organizing the Secret Five. Lingle's murder stirred up publicity and indignation and bad smelling facts. And the result thereof is uncertain, like so many of Chicago's nefarious dealings.
