Bad News, Boys -The Chief Warns **About Fireworks**

Four boys of the "Peck's-Bad-Boy" type, who had strong convictions that July 4 should begin a week before Independence day with skyrockets and Roman candles and should end a week later with heavy artillery, learned yesterday that the City of Pampa has an ordinance against "shootin' off fireworks." They were informed of that fact at the city jail where they were taken by police, who asserted that there is a warning in the incident for other boys. One of the youngsters had hurled a firecracker in the mustache of an irate gentle-

Police advice to those who must shoot fireworks is: "Don't shoot 'em in the alleys because there is danger of starting a fire. Be reasonable. Don't keep your neighbors awake all night. If they make a complaint, we'll have to arrest you. Don't start in at Gaylight on July 4 and fire skyrockets and firecrackers all day. Use discretion. If you must make a continuous noise go to the country. Think of your neighbors. See if explosions make them nervous and if they do, move your fireworks."
