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

Chief: Officers have new, 'reliable weapon'

Pampa police officers spent this week qualifying to carry a SIG Sauer P226 as the department's official sidearm.

The Swiss/German-made 9mm handguns replace the department's previous weapon, the Smith & Wesson Signa, that after less than six years of use began to fall apart. The polymer Signa was designed to be competitive with the popular Glock 9mm handgun.

Pampa City Commissioners recently approved the purchase of 28 SIG Sauers for the city's police officers.

"We feel good about the SIG Sauers," said Chief Charlie Morris. "They've already been proven effective by the DPS (Department of Public Safety) and other law enforcement agencies that have had them for a number of years.

Morris said the department's



new semi-automatic pistols are an aluminum frame construction compared to the polymer Signa. The pistol also has double action and a visible hammer. The police chief said his officers have reported the guns are well-balanced and easy to use.

Col. Terry Young said the department was able to purchase the SIG Sauers for \$635 each

with a trade-in of \$170 per gun which lowered the total cost by one-fourth to \$12,850.

The police chief said they could not warranty the Signas with Smith & Wesson because of the length of time that had passed since the weapons were bought.

Survey: Many parents fail to teach kids about money

WASHINGTON (AP) — Zach Landau, 13, gets a weekly allowance of \$6.50. He spends some on crickets and fleas as food for his menagerie of lizards, salamanders, tree frogs and other creatures. Some of it he saves.

His parents don't plan to give him or his siblings credit cards despite peer pressure.

Nationwide, too many parents don't make that decision, according to a survey of American parents, released Thursday. Drowning in credit card debt themselves, they set bad examples and fail to teach their children how to manage and save money, the survey said.



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

question popping up: "So what's the deal with your mother's makeup?

When your mom is Tammy Faye Bakker Messner, the heavily primped and painted former Christian television icon, that's to be expected.

He's fine with it, though, keenly aware of her place in pop culture and that most people are more interested in her grooming habits than what happened when his parents' ministry crumbled under scandal in the late 1980s.

Bakker, 25, is fine with most things these days. He lives in Atlanta with Amanda, his wife of two years, and makes a living ministering to the young, downtrodden and misunderstood.

With studs in his ears, a gold loop through his lower lip and both of his arms sleeved in bold tattoos, he doesn't look like a man of God. And that's just the point. He's part of what he calls the "disillusioned subculture."

Bakker is reeling a bit from the intense media interest in his book, "Son of Preacher Man," which came out in January. It chronicles his life growing up in his parents' "Praise the Lord," or PTL, empire, their fall from grace and his own turmoil. He battled drugs and alcohol as he struggled to cope with his father's imprisonment and with being a mem-ber of the country's most ridiculed family.

"It's been healing, but it's been really hard to constantly relive, relive and relive the past,' Bakker admits over lunch at a downtown restaurant. Slight of build, he wears blue work pants, a black T-shirt, a denim jacket and black sneakers. His dark hair is cropped short, and he wears a neatly trimmed goatee and side-burns that reach the bottom of his

Every year, 600,000 copies of his school picture were mailed out to ministry supporters.

All that crashed down in 1987 when Jim Bakker's dalliance with Jessica Hahn became public, and Bakker was sent to federal prison for overselling lodging guaran-tees at Heritage USA and diverting millions in ministry money.

Jay, 13 at the time, was already drinking. Soon he was smoking marijuana and tripping on acid. He fell deeper still when his mother divorced his father in 1992 and married family friend Roe Messner.

While struggling to get sober in 1996, Bakker hooked up with the Rev. Philip Bray, a former drug dealer who runs the Safehouse shelter for the homeless in the shadow of downtown Atlanta's Ritz-Carlton.

Bray offered to give Bakker a place to live, office space and a salary to start Revolution, a progressive ministry offering punk-rock music and unconditional acceptance for the skateboarders, goths, drug addicts and other outcasts who come to the Bible studies and Friday concerts.

During the week now, Bakker can be found ministering in and around the tattoo and piercing studios in the Little Five Points neighborhood, where the people he wants to reach congregate.


Gymnastics of Pampa student Lanie Bishop recently participated in the Level State Championships in Houston.




