## Texans Backs MacArthur For Presidency

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. (AP)—The American people "should demand that the Republican party nominate General Douglas MacArthur for the presidency," J. E. McDonald, Texas commissioner of agriculture, said here yesterday.

The "gravity of the present situation demands the leadership of a man who has fully demonstrated his ability as an outstanding soldier, statesman and leader," McDonald said in a statement.

McDonald, here on business, also said:

"As a native Texas, I'm a Democrat in politics. In this struggle between communism, democracy and Christianity, I'm an American ready to join hands with every other American to defend our American way of life."

"During recent months I have been in many states from New York to California. I have found a strong and growing sentiment that General MacArthur be our next president. ... In Japan, he has eliminated the communistic threat, brought order, peace and liberty to these people."

## BARGAIN DAY FOR MARRIAGE

NANKING, Oct. 10. (AP)—This was bargain day for Chinese planning marriage, and 255 couples took advantage of it. The average wedding in inflation-ridden China these days costs about 30,000,000 Chinese dollars (\$375 U. S.) but couples participating in the government-sponsored mass marriage ceremony at Nanking today—birth-date of the Chinese republic—only had to pay 100,000 Chinese dollars—about \$1.25 U. S.

## Texas Seeks To End Auto Law Agreement

AUSTIN, Oct. 10. (AP)—New Mexico's imposition of a road mileage tax on commercial motor vehicles from Texas has caused Texas to ask termination of a six-year reciprocity agreement on Oct. 31, state Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said today.

The agreement has proved "very unsatisfactory to Texas truck operators," Greer said. He noted that Texas allows New Mexico vehicles to use Texas highways without registering in this state and without imposition of any other fees or taxes.

New Mexico motor vehicle authorities have been unwilling to execute a new agreement which would waive the road mileage tax, despite authorization by the New Mexico legislature for what appears to be a much broader form of reciprocity, Greer added.

Cancellation of the agreement will force New Mexico commercial vehicles to register upon entering this state.

## Oil Leaders Plan Meet

HOUSTON, Oct. 10. (AP)—Postwar problems of the petroleum industry will be the theme of the two-day convention of the Mid-continent Oil and Gas Association next Thursday and Friday in San Antonio.

Among the speakers will be Robert G. Dunlap, president of Sun Oil Company, Philadelphia; Sidney A. Swensrud, executive vice president, Gulf Oil Corporation; W. P. Gage, vice president and director of Shell Chemical Corporation, and H. A. Murray of the technical and research division of the Texas Company.

The controversial tidelands issue will be the subject of an address by Gov. Millard F. Caldwell of Florida. He will be introduced by Gov. Beauford Jester.

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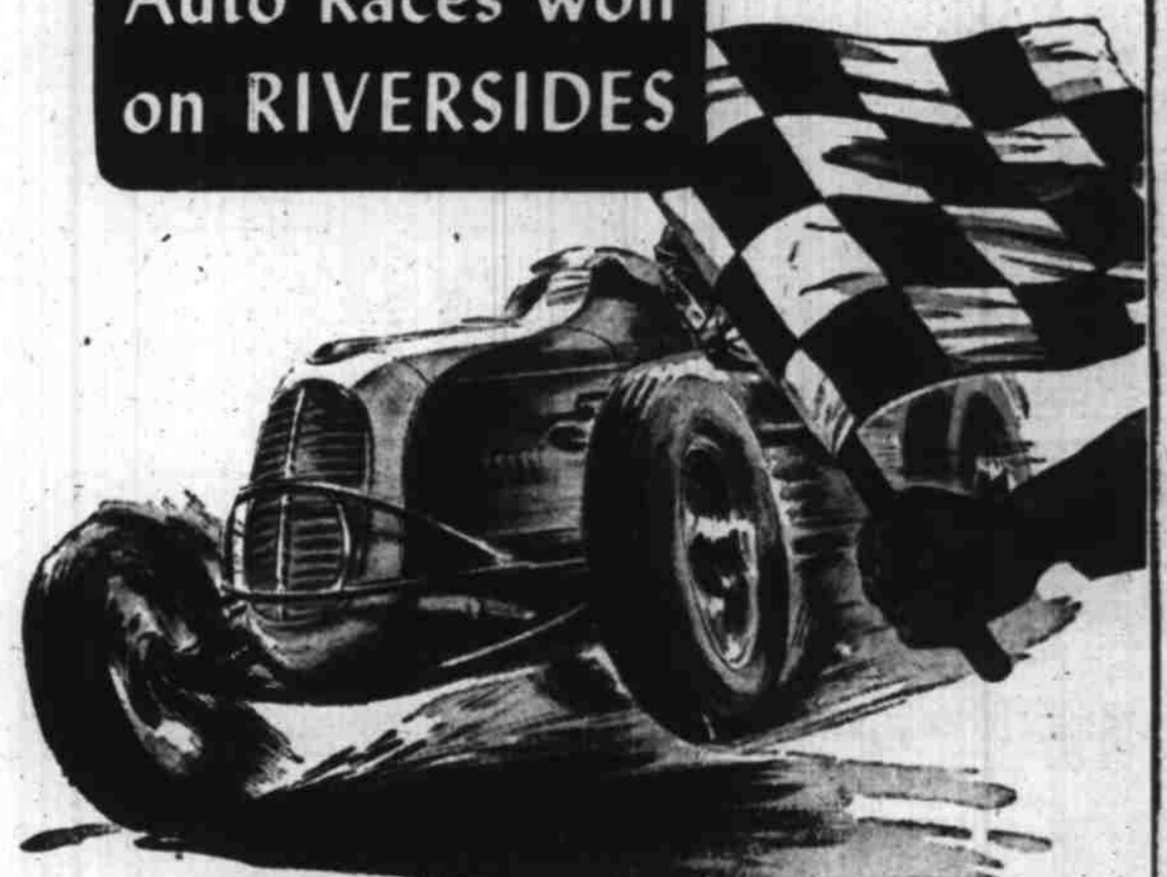

**COAL, OIL NEEDED**  
**Leader Declares Argentina Is**  
**Able To Feed Starving Europe**

BUENOSA AIRES, Oct. 10. (U.P.)—Miguel Miranda, president of the Argentine national economic council, said today that Argentina was producing plenty of food for hungry Europe and could increase the output if she were able to obtain needed coal and petroleum from abroad.

Miranda declared in an interview that the solution of the problem of feeding the people of Europe was "simple."

"We have cereals and the ships to transport them," he said, "but other countries have to help us by sending us coal, petroleum, oil well machinery and railway transport—all of which are necessary if we are to move present crops and increase plantings."

Miranda said that Argentine was negotiating with the United States for petroleum, as well as machinery to help his country develop its own oil fields.

Argentina produces about 52 per cent of her "normal" petroleum requirements, but now needs 75 per cent more crude oil than she did before the war, because of the greater number of automobiles and other vehicles.

Miranda said he told a U. S. military mission, here to see about obtaining corn for the American occupation areas in Europe, that Argentina has not contracted all the grain she has available for sale and could produce more. But, he said, she was prevented from doing so by "short-sighted persons who refuse to sell us the necessary elements to get crops off the farm on the train and to the dock."

Miranda estimated that there were 8,375,000 tons of grains now available in the country—including wheat, maize and linseed fodder. The U. S. mission is reportedly interested in having Argentina boost future plantings—especially maize—but Miranda said he was not going to ask that of farmers who already have crops rotting due to inadequate transport.

# Colorado River Water Group Schedules Meet At Big Spring

A meeting of the Colorado River Municipal Water Association will be held in Big Spring on Oct. 17, officials announced today.

The session has been called by M. C. Ulmer, Midland, association president, and Joe H. Smoot, Colorado City, secretary-treasurer.

Special reports are to be heard from US Engineers and from the engineering firm of Freeze and Nichols, which has been retained by the association. E. V. Spence, chairman of the state board of water engineers is scheduled to sit in on the session.

The meeting will begin with a noon luncheon, which is being arranged by C. S. Blomshield.

The association was organized here on June 20, 1946, by representatives of five cities interested in developing a joint water supply. Preliminary engineering data indicated that a dam located on the Colorado River at a site five miles northwest of Colorado City would impound enough water for a net supply of some 26,000,000 gallons daily.

The Texas and Pacific railway offered free right-of-way for 100 miles of pipeline, which would be used in connection with the project.

On Oct. 14 the State Board of Water Engineers granted the association an application for water rights on that portion of the Colorado River which they sought.

The idea was first conceived by J. B. Thomas, president of the Texas Electric Service Co., and shortly after the idea was advanced, delegates from Snyder, Colorado City, Midland, Odessa and Big Spring met and formally organized the association.

Subsequent work has consisted chiefly of engineering studies, and reports on their development will be heard at the meeting here.

Peter W. (Buddy) Agnell, son of Mrs. Della K. Agnell, 311 W. 6th Street, Big Spring, was among the last group of men nominated today by President Truman for recess appointment as commissioned officers in the regular Army and Air Force.

He was one of around 5,900 chosen from 85,000 officers and former officers of the national guard, reserve and U. S. Army who applied for commissions under the second regular army integration program. Except for a small group of medical department officers, these will be the last increment of officers into the regular army under provision of public law 281 which expires Dec. 21.
