AUSTIN, Aug. 14 (AP)-Represent tive Bowlen Bond of Fairfield, chairman of a committee investigating the state education department, charged today the department had placed its own interpretation on laws with a resultant "inequitable distribution" of rural aid funds.

He said the committee, which will make a final report to the forthcoming special session of the legislature, had found that each of 24 deputy superintendents of education placed his own construction on regu-lations and that some schools not entitled to funds had received aid while others fully qualified had been denied assistance

Misuse Charged. "We found also that appropria-tions made by the legislature for specific purposes have been grossly misused," he said.

The chairman asserted that funds had been transferred from one division to another and the original legislative intent had been totally lisregarded.

Bond cited specifically the census division, asserting its cost of opera-tion had trebled in two years and some of its employes were paid out funds appropriated for rural aid. He said L. A. Woods, state super-intendent of education, had charged in public speeches that the legislature failed to appropriate sufficient funds for school buses next year.

(P)—A Chinese typhoon today
swallowed the war horrors of
Shanghai where Chinese air bombs
killed 580 civilians, including three
Americans, and injured at least 720 in this teeming international

Tension in the international quarter, scene of the worst carnage in Saturday's tragic aerial attack, seemed relieved as heavy wind and rain swept in from the sea. Extremely poor visibility seemed to allay fears of any immediate renewal of action by either contending Chinese or Japanese air forces.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 15 — (Sunday) —(P)—War at its worst caught and killed Americans and heaped up the dead and dying in Shanghai today.

Japanese and Chinese warplanes fought above an international city of three and a half million people. Hundreds of non-combatants, at least three of them Americans, died in a rain of Chinese bombs that missed their marks.

Two or more Americans were wounded in a Shanghai Saturday of suffering that drove scores of others from their homes. Every one of the 4,000 Americans in the bleeding international community was in

Destruction spread through Shanghai as Sunday dawn approached. At 2:30 a. m. (12:30 p. m. Saturday, CST) machine guns were chattering fiercely along the land battlefront on Shanghai's northern fringe and big guns of Japanese warships on the Whangpoo river fired steadily at land targets.

Fire Spreads Thru City. Fire Spreads Thru City.

Fires were increasing, noticeably in eastern Chapei, Chinese section, and apparently were eating into northern parts of the international settlement.

The Americans were drawn into the tragic vortex of the undeclared yet undisguised Chinese-Japanese war when the warbirds of the Chinese government, aroused at last, struck back at the Japanese foe. bombs plunged into densely packed street intersections of Shanghal's foreign areas. Apparently they were aimed at Japanese warships on the nearby Whangpoo river or Japanese

land concentrations.

But the victims of the resulting holocausts were mostly innocent Chinese civilians. Many other foreigners, besides the Americans, were killed or wounded.

Great Buildings Shattered. Great buildings, including two famous hotels, were shattered. Mounds of dead littered the pave-

The American dead were: Dr. Frank J. Rawlinson, 35 years, a missionary leader in China; H. S. Honigsberg, wealthy motorcar dealer who had made Shanghai his home more than 20 years; Dr. Robert K. Reischauer, member of the Prince ton university faculty, in Shanghai on a study tour.

The war in the air was only one phase—but deadly phase—of the battle of Shanghai between China and Japan. The conflict, in the second day of actual bloodshed, was fought from the air, on water, and on land along a front from Shang-

L**oan** Program IN FIVE STATES

AMARILLO, Aug. 14.—The Reset tlement Administration's loan program during 1937-1938 for the benefit of farmers in the five-state area embraced by Region X11, will be continued very much as it was in the past year, Regional Director L. H. Hauter announced today. "We shall continue to emphasize

the making of sound loans," Mr. Hauter said, "because we make only those loans which farmers may reasonably expect to repay, we are not placing them in a position where they can be rehabilitated, and thus we would fail to reach our ob-

Mindful of existing problems in the Southern High Plains Dust Bowl area, Hauter said special care will be taken to extend loans in order bring about a proper adjustment of land use and the establishment of economically sound land units. This is particularly true, he pointed out, in those areas where the moisture and physical conditions of the create a special problem.

Hauter said the Resettlement Administration has adopted a policy to withhold loans this fall for wheat production in those areas where insufficient moisture exists at seeding time, or where certain other factors create an added hazard.

"For this, or any other agency to loan farmers money with which to seed a crop from which no harvest is likely to result," he said, "will only result in getting the borrowers further in debt. We hope to avoid this. It is also thought advisable," he continued, "to encourage the de-struction of cover on land in the more seriously wind eroded areas unless there is a reasonable chance to get a good cover crop on the seeded land. Experience in the past several years has shown the wisdom of making crop loans only when conditions are satisfactory for pro-ducing a profitable crop. It is a wise policy and we shall continue it in the future."

FOR THE UNFORTUNATES

Aid to the needy blind and to dependent and destitute children of Texas are two services provided for in constitutional amendments which are being submitted to the people in the election August 23rd. These amendments will, if adopted, complete the Federal Social Security program in Texas, and will make for a rounded-out program of security for all of those groups of our citizens who are insecure. or potentially insecure.

Texas cannot afford to neglect her obligation to her unfortunates while other states of the Union are moving forward with the development of greatly needed social legislation. According to a release by the Social Security Board of July 13, 45 states and 3 territories have approved plans for assistance to the needy aged; 33 states for assistance to the needy blind, and 35 states for assistance to dependent children.

The amendment submitted for dependent children specifies that the state shall not appropriate more than a million and a half dollars per year for such service, and that the appropriation shall not exceed \$8 per month for one child, or \$12 per month for any one family. These figures represent the state's twothird's contribution toward this type of assistance, as provided for under the Social Security Act. The Federal government will then contribute the other one-third, which means that the amendment will provide a maximum of \$12 per month for one child in a family, and \$18 per month for a family with two or more children. The Federal government will also pay part of the administrative expense of this service. It is estimated that there is a minimum of 30,00 dependent and destitute children in the state. Surely Texas can do this much in providing the necessities of life for her needy children and in equipping them with physical and moral stamina to meet the responsibilities of life as the citizens

The amendment for the needy blind provides a maximum appropriation by the state of \$15 per month per person over 21 years of age, provided he or she is not being maintained in an institution. The Federal government will match the state dollar for dollar for this service, which means that the needy blind person over 21 years of age cannot receive under this amendment more than \$30 per months. The Federal Government also pays a part of the cost of administration of this service.

The ratification of these two amendments will meen a decided economic and social advantage to Texas. From a humanitarian viewpoint, it will mean that common justice will be done two groups of needy individuals in the state who are unable to do for themselves

Washington Letter

By PRESTON GROVER WASHINGTON—Senatorial races in sister states of the Old South will give the New Deal an interesting test next year.

In Alabama, Senator Hugo L. Black must defend himself against a charge that his determination to remain loyal to the administration has dimmed his sense of responsibility to the state he represents.

Conversely, Senator Walter F. George will be faced in next-door Georgia with the assertion that he has walked out on the party.

These two states represent the tradition of southern conservationism and southern loyalty of the Democratic party. Their people are much alike in thought and character.

Five years ago they eagerly joined the Roosevelt landslide. Their senators and representatives, either by conviction or expediency, accepted the New Deal without question. * * *

But the court bill brought a cry of protest from many southern lips. Then came the wagehour bill, a new housing program, another system of federal relief. State delegations split over this advanced legislation.

George, basically conservative, refused to accept the court plan, wage-hour legislation, housing or the new relief bill. Black remained doggedly loyal to whatever the President want-

Little was said back home about George, but his colleague came in for scathing criticism in Alabama, where lumbermen and others called protest meetings against the so-called "Little

* * * Enemies are saying, among other things, that Black, now a national figure, no longer represents Alabama.

Other Alabamians in congress have maintained a careful silence on their attitude toward Black himself, although most of them oppose his labor standards bill. How's Your Health?

PSYCHOLOGY OF OBESITY Some years ago a prize-winning French book was translated into English under the title "The Martyrdom of the Obese." While written in a rather humorous vein, the book presents an interesting study of the psychology of an obese man.

Many have suspected that obesity, though immediately due to excessive eating, is frequently traceable to some deep-rooted psychologic maladjustment. This theory has never been adequately explored, yet many recorded clinical and psychologic observations seem to bolster it.

There is no doubt that eating affords the individual a primitive pleasure. It is reasonable, therefore, to assume that individuals denied pleasure or gratification in other phases of life or activity, may seek to replace them by pleasures derived from eating

Ibsen, in his famous drama, "The Doll's House," plays about this motif. The heroine Nora, who is psychologically a badly adjusted character, cannot resist the temptation of indulging herself in bonbons, even though this proves a perpetual source of contention between her and her husband.

The high school or college girl who underrates her attractiveness, is quite likely to overindulge in sweets and, incidentally, also to "compensate" by being an especially conscientious student. Even young children who suffer from psychologic maladjustment are prone to overeat. As individuals age, they are likely to put on weight. How much of the gain in weight is due to a weakening in the endocrine system, especially affecting those glands which regulate metabolism is conjectural. It is interesting to inquire, however, how much of the weight gain is due to the temptation to "linger at the table," which in turn arises from the loss in

gratification derived from other phases of life and activity. Certainly where weight reduction required, thought should be given to the ways in which some of the "pleasure denial" involved in the reduction of food intake may be compensated for. Perhaps the development of a new hobby, of some interesting occupation or of some sport will render weight reduction less distressing and more effective. The happy and busy man, like the active and interested child, is more likely

Q. How many automobiles are junked in the United States in a year? G. I. S.

A. It is estimated that 2,500,000 cars were scrapped last year. About 86 per cent of them were passenger

Q. In what state are the most carbonated soft drinks made? P.

A. Texas leads, according to the Census Bureau, with 14,379,000 cases a year or 8 per cent of the aggre gate output for the United States. Q. What is the latest figure on the amount of the public debt, and what is the interest on this sum?

A. The latest unofficial estimate of the public debt is that of the National Economy League which states that as of June 30, 1937, the net debt was \$41,143,000,000. The annual interest on this unparalleled sum at the approximated rate of 21/4 per cent would be \$1,028,575,000. It amounts to \$2.818,013.69 per day, \$117,417.24 per hour, and \$1,956.95

Q. How large are the new army bombers? N. W. K.

A. The flying fortresses, which are said to be the world's largest bombing planes that have recently been acquired by the United States army, are 4,000 horse-power craft. The army has acquired 13 such bombers. A flying fortress weighs 16 tons, is 70 feet long, 15 feet high, and has a single spread of 105 feet. This type of plane is known as YB-17. It s armed with five machine guns designed to protect it against attack from any angle. The planes are equipped with four motors and carry more bombs than any other ships ever used by the army. They are capable of cruising over 250 miles an hour and have a non-stop radius of more than 3,000 miles. Q. What was the first modern

Son of an aristocratic German officer high in the councils of the . Kaiser during the World War, Steel fled to America because he saw only "dead past" in Germany and all Europe. He has taken out his first citizenship papers and announces that he's here to stay.

rancor, Steel Writing without paints a gloomy and sometimes terrifying picture of the present and future of all Central Europe. He recalls the defeat of the German army, the abdication of the Kaiser the days of inflation,

From these feverish scenes, Steel carries the reader with him as an agent of the German government selling second-hand war materials under the noses of the Allies. He was instrumental in forming a smuggling ring that provided German factories with an industrial outlet to Poland and from this he progressed to industrial sabotage and espionage. Steel, however, was unable to

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reconcile his own beliefs with the policies of Hitler's regime. At the crossroads of his carreer, he was arrested for throwing a challenge virtually into Hitler's teeth.

There is no melodrama, nothing heroic in Steel's recital. And the story is all the more forceful because of its compression and factual han-
