But
no similar restrictions are imposed on children working on their families' farms, nor are there limits on the number of hours that they may work there.
"No other hazardous industry allows anyone under 18 years old
even onsite, but because this also happens to be a place where people live, they're there," said Malcolm Legault, a research associate for agricultural safety at Penn State University.
