# Greatest Pampa Field Well Is Flowing This

## **DELANEY TEST HITS FOR 7.200 BARRELS DAIL**

Bit Strikes the Granite Wash at 2,980-4 Feet

#### **LOCATION IS IN SECTION 88**

#### Storage Full and Oil Going Into Second Slush Pit

Pampa oil field's greatest well is in!

The Delaney et al No. Jackson is making close to 300 barrels an hour, or 7,200 barrels a day, from the granite wash at \$2,980 to 2,984 feet. P. J. Sines and Floyd Ward are associate contractors.

This sensational gusher unleashed its liquid gold at 2 a. m. Saturday after breaking through a red shale, topped by blue shale. It located in the NW corner of the 1-2 of the SW of section 88, block B-2, about 9 1-2 miles south Pampa.

The oil is of 44.8 gravity, the highest yet found in the entire Panhandle field. Scores of people went to the great well today, while sleepy-eyed scouts who had been watching developments for two days declared it a "real well" and came to Pampa to file reports.

The bit struck the soft granite wash and dropped about 4 feet, drillers estimate, before the flow started. The initial production was 235 barrels an hour, but the well increased steadily during the morning, reaching 300 barrels at noon, when two 500-barrel tanks were Il the Sinclair S-inch nineline was carrying a capacity load, and a heavy flow was running into a slush pit. Originally classified as a 5,000 barrel well, the No. 1 Jackson soon passed that figure. #### Vehicle Is Built to Meet Special Need of Pampa

An Austin motor pick-up weeper, weighing more than 5 tons and costing \$6,800, was purchased by the city council Monday from the Austin-Western Road Machinery company of Chicago.

The purchase followed weeks of investigation of sweeper types, and was conditional upon the satisfac tory performance over a five-day pe riod here.

The big machine will be construct ed at the factory especially for Pampa needs, and will be given a rigor ous three-day factory test before shipment. Its arrival is expected about October 15.

A 2-inch rotary gutter reared and adjustable, will operate long the curb. The rotary pick-up broom, 36 inches in diameter, will frive all kinds of trash into a selfcleansing elevator, which convey the material to a dirt carrier having capacity of two cubic yards. This arrier dumps through double doors The sweeper can be set at any height so as to handle caked mud without damaging the asphalt on the brick. It is claimed that the machine wil



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

'Outside of banditry, and a few other forms of crime, crime in general has decreased under prohibition by one-half, according to the Federal census report. The effect of prohibition upon efficiency is indicated by the result of a survey among twenty-one of the basic industries which revealed the fact that on an average the per man production has increased 34 per cent. The increase of production enables the employers to pay higher wages. For forty years before the coming of national prohibition when wages increased the expenses of living usually increased in proportion, but immediately upon American going upon A soher basis wages increased 28 per cent faster than the cost of living until today the American people are enjoying the highest standard of living ever known.

"Dr. Irving Fisher estimates that the economic results of prohibition at the lowest calculation amounts to \$6,000,000,000 a year. This means \$52 each per annum for every man, woman and child in America.

"This comes as a result of national prohibition, in obtaining which the Anti-Saloon League took a very large part.

Generally, judging by the abuse it receives, it is accorded with responsibility for winning the fight. The league made this fight on a fund that amounted to just 33c for each man woman and child covering a period of thirty years. It was the best investment the good people of America ever made.

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
