

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



# Error In House Bill Results In Peculiar Situation

Hansford county may hold its scheduled county seat removal election August 6, it was ruled Tuesday by the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals. The last similar election was

held in that county in March, when Spearman failed by 15 votes of moving the county seat from Hansford. Gruver fought removal.

Under the old law, such an election could not be repeated until after five years. The Fortieth Legislature passed a new measure, however, applying to those counties in which the county seat is more than five miles from a railroad.

At the time the bill was voted, it was believed that the Legislature had made it possible to hold county seat removal elections every two years, in case the county government was located more than five miles from the railroad. 

tion to be made for the same purpose within five years thereafter. Provided that an application may be made and an election held to remove the county seat from a location more than five miles from a railroad operating as a common carrier, to a location on a railroad WITHIN two years thereafter.

"Within Means Wishin." Hansford county plaintiffs argued that the legislators intended to say "not less than two years," instead of "within two years." The Court of Civial Appeals ruled that "within means within," and that Hansford, er any other county, may hold an election "within two years" of the last similar election. Obviously, more than two elections could come within the ruling.

In those counties which held elections more than two years ago, and which cannot come under the "within two years" clause, the situation is no clearer than before yesterday's ruling. Indeed, it appeared to members of the Pampa Daily News staff today following telephonic conversation with members of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals, that Gray county is not affected by the Fortieth Legislature's House Bill 275, but under the old provision: namely, that elections cannot be held to remove the county seat more often than every five years, and that a two-thirds majority is required for removal.
