

## COUNTY SEAT VOTE IS POSSIBLE

### BIG WELLS TO BOOST TOTALS IN GRAY AREA

Texas and Gulf Have 3,000 Barrels From Heavy Pay

### OIL IN EACH OF .44 GRAVITY

Guernsey Oil Company Will Shoot Its No. 1 McKinney

The Texas company has another gusher in the Bowers pool of the South Pampa field. It is making a steady 146 barrels an hour after coming in Tuesday for 200 barrels an hour, which it held until near morning. The Gulf Production company also has a gusher in the same pool, which is making 150 barrels an hour today.

The Texas company's No. 1 Bowers in the southwest corner of the southeast half of section 89, block B-2, began flowing 200 barrels an hour at 11 o'clock Monday at 2,890 feet after striking big pay. It continues to flow 146 barrels an hour today.

It made 2,200 barrels the first 24 hours, mostly from first pay.

The Gulf Production company's No. 3, Bowers in the southeast corner of the west half of section 89, block B-2, began flowing 135 barrels an hour from granite wash pay at 2,918 feet. It made more than 3,200 barrels the first 24 hours and then increased its flow to 145 barrels, which it is still flowing.

This well is an offset to the Danciger Oil and Refining company's No. 5, Jackson in section 83, block B-2, and is about one quarter of a mile from the same company's first well in the territory.

Both these wells are making .44 gravity oil.

Preparations are being made to shoot the Guernsey Oil company's No. 1 McKinney in section 163, block 3, about four miles west of Pampa. The well is alternately flowing and spraying from 3,161 to 3,276 feet. The total depth is 3,350 feet.

Twenty million cubic feet of gas was bradenheaded off, but the well is making about 6,000,000 feet from the six-inch casing.

The shot will be placed Thursday officials of the company say.

The Phillips Petroleum company is ready to commence drilling on its No. 4, A. Reiley in section 88, block B12.

The same company has location to drill in section 87, block B-2, on the Bowers lease.

### One Family to Mail Box, Postal Rules Provide

Postmaster W. A. Crawford wishes it to be known by box users in Pampa that only one family can use a postoffice box according to law, and that if anyone is allowing other persons to receive mail in his box it must be stopped at once.

He is trying to check up on the number of boxes needed and the size of the extension to the building, but with several families getting mail in the same box he has no way of doing so. He is continually receiving complaints of persons not getting mail in their boxes, and when an investigation is made it is found that the complainant has no right to get mail in that particular box.

If that practice does not cease, Mr. Crawford says he will be compelled to close the boxes.

The rule of only one family getting mail in a box does not apply to business houses where the employees get mail in their employer's box. It applies to private boxes only, Mr. Crawford states.

### Spring Drilling in Gray County Being Outlined

Panhandle production dropped to 74,625 barrels daily last week, averaging 1,945 barrels less than last week.

Of seventeen locations in the Panhandle field recently, fourteen were in Gray.

Spring drilling activities in the Gray county field apparently opened last week as fourteen new locations were made by various companies, with the intention of immediate drilling.

The Empire Fuel and Gas company led the field with six new locations. Other companies are drilling offsets and semi-wildcat tests.

The Empire Fuel and Gas company has spudded in its No. 1 Bender, in the southeast corner, of section 164, block 3, and is down more than 100 feet.

The cellar is being dug for the Empire Fuel and Gas company's No. 1 Bell in the center of the southeast quarter of section 134, block 3.

Material is arriving for the Empire Fuel and Gas company's No. 1 Barrett in the center of the southeast quarter of section 132, block 3.

The cellar has been dug for the Empire Fuel and Gas company's No. 1 Case in the center of the east half of section 180 block B-2.

The Texas company has made a location to drill in section 64, block 25, on the S. A. Cobb lease.

The cellar is being dug for the Texas company's No. 1 Henry Thut in the northeast corner of section 1, about a half mile northeast of the LeFors townsite well. This location joins the Thut pre-emption on the east.

Robertson et al have made a location to drill in the northwest corner of section 203, block 3, Carson county, on the Bednorz lease.

Hende-shot et al will drill a well in the southwest corner of section 14, block 4, Carson county, on the Barnard lease.

### Empire Officials Move to Pampa To Be Near Oil

Following the completion of more office buildings at its location two miles west of Pampa, several departments of the Empire Fuel and Gas company which were in Amarillo have been moved to Pampa to be near drilling activities.

C. S. Warren, general superintendent of the company, arrived yesterday and will make his headquarters at the Pampa camp. He will reside in the city temporarily.

Other officials who have moved to the Pampa office are John L. Mead, office manager; Roscoe Haskinson, field superintendent; W. C. Hutchinson, superintendent of drilling; Sam Harlan, production engineer and Charles Cobb, garage foreman.

The Empire Fuel and Gas company has made several new locations in the Gray county field and will commence extensive drilling operations immediately. The company is one of the largest lease holders in the Panhandle, which necessitates extensive drilling although activities have slackened during the winter months.

Many Political Meetings and Elections Are Scheduled

### CALENDAR OF EVENTS GIVEN

Pampa Committees Out to Make Big Vote Possible

The "Pay Your Poll Tax" campaign in this community is well under way now, with many committees beginning to see all individuals in their assigned territory.

Taxpayers who pay their poll taxes or secure exemption certificates by midnight of January 31 will have an opportunity to participate in a large number of political meetings and elections this year. The interest will be greater this year on account of the election of a president.

Dates on the political calendar are:

May 5—Precinct primaries to elect delegates to county conventions.  
May 8—County conventions for national delegates.

May 22—State convention to select delegates to national convention.

June 4—Candidates for party nomination and state offices must file applications with state chairmen, and candidates for nomination for district offices must file applications with district chairmen.

June 11—State executive committee meeting to select place for state convention.

June 16—Last day to get name on official ballot for county and precinct nominations.

June 18—County executive committee meets to determine order of names on ballot and estimate the amount each candidate is to pay on ballot and transact other business.

June 25—Candidates must pay assessment to get name on ballot.

July 28—First state primary.

August 1—Returns made to county chairmen.

August 4—County executive committee canvasses results.

August 20—State executive committee canvasses results.

August 25—Run-off primary. Precinct conventions.

August 29—Returns made to county chairmen.

September 11—State convention make nominations.

November 8—General election.

December 16—Result canvassed by state board.

Candidates for county and precinct offices will be especially interested in the date of Saturday, June 16. That is the first day any candidate may file precinct nominations.

### POLL TAX DRIVE TO BE STARTED

Directors Suggested by Nominating Committee Are Named

M. K. Brown, longtime resident of Pampa, is the new president of the local Chamber of Commerce, succeeding Chas. C. Cook, who has served for a few months more than a year. Mr. Brown, elected last week by the newly chosen directors for 1928, has been vice-president of the organization.

Curtis Clem, local lumber dealer and contractor, was elected, vice-president, and J. M. Dodson was re-elected treasurer. The directors also re-elected Scott Barcus as manager under the same terms that were made when he was employed March 10, 1927.

The new directors, suggested by a nominating committee composed of Chas. I. Hughes, W. R. Campbell, P. B. Carlson, A. F. Clark, and Roy McMillen, are the following: Chas. C. Cook, M. K. Brown, J. M. Dodson, F. P. Reid, Lynn Boyd, B. E. Finley, W. F. Clausing, Curtis Clem, Ivey Duncan, P. F. Smalling, Roy McMillen, and Olin E. Hinkle.

While he was in the chair, President Cook appointed a committee to urge the payment of poll taxes. Ivey Duncan is chairman, and other members of the committee are F. P. Reid, J. H. Lavender, W. B. Salsbury, and P. B. Carlson. These men will meet at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 7 p. m., this evening to plan their activities. It was the opinion of those present that an energetic campaign should be carried on during the rest of January.

L. W. Lowe of the Empire Gas company called attention to the favorable publicity that is being given Pampa through publications of his organization, and the Chamber voted its thanks for this service.

W. B. Salsbury expressed the opinion that a bridge over the North Fork would benefit Pampa as well as other parts of the county, through the opening of the new pool in southeast Gray county to travel from Pampa.

F. P. Reid said that a meeting was to be held at Laketon today to consider a bond issue in Precinct 1 to build such a bridge.

P. B. Mooney spoke in favor of immediate action on the revival of a fair here, and urged the building of a mile race track.

M. P. Downs suggested appointment of a committee to consult the Santa Fe regarding a sub-way at an appropriate place. A. H. Doucette, J. H. Lavender, and C. H. Sharp were appointed as a committee to open these negotiations.

After pointing out some of the accomplishments of the Chamber of Commerce in 1927, Mr. Cook as retiring president urged the members of the organization to be even more alert and aggressive this year. Mr. Brown, president-elect, could not be present last night.

The directors held a private session after the general meeting.

### Building Permits Mount Rapidly

Building permits for the month of January are expected to reach the \$100,000 mark. The first fifteen days of the month show a total of \$59,000, which includes two \$20,000 buildings being erected by the Charles H. Sharp Construction company.

Several large residences are being erected, and to commence in the near future. Local contractors are of the opinion that Pampa is on the verge of a large building program, especially of residences.

More than five blocks of paving is asked in the first petition presented to the city commission this year. The petition was given the commission Monday by Lee Banks, Joe Smith, and J. E. Murfee, Jr.

The paving asked is on Francis avenue, to connect with the present paving in front of Central high school at the west property line of Frost street, and would extend to a point 140 feet west of the property line of Purviance street.

Other paving is desired by many property owners, and it is considered likely that more paving will be asked soon. The commission went on record as acknowledging the request, and promised to give it first consideration whenever additional paving shall be deemed advisable.

Financially, the city has valuations to enable it to issue warrants for paving. Moreover, the new charter allows the use of the new state paving law, under which property owners bear more of the expense than has been done here in the recently completed program.

In addition to transacting routine business the commission last night appointed C. O. Busby as city recorder and judge of the corporation court. It thanked F. P. Reid for his services in being acting recorder since the change in administrations.

Work has commenced on the beautiful \$12,000 home and large brick garage in the East End addition for George Cox, W. E. Davis, local man, has the contract and states that the residence will be completed by March 1.

### HIGHER COURT KILLS "WITHIN" PART OF LAW

Hansford Wins Fight With Spearman in Decision

### ELECTION NOW EVERY 2 YEARS

Supreme Body Rules Against Absurdities of Statute

On the basis of a Supreme Court decision given last Wednesday, Gray county is now free to hold a county seat removal election at the will of the voters.

According to dispatches from Austin, "the Supreme Court held that the act of the Fortieth Legislature reduces from 5 to 2 years the minimum time within which county seat elections may be held and that it cannot be held at any time in less than two years, even though it is to move a county seat from a point off a railroad to a town on a railroad."

This decision reverses the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals in the Hansford county court house fight, which the town of Hansford has now won. A bill passed by the Fortieth legislature provided that in such instances a county seat election could be held "within two years," and the Amarillo court held that "within means within." The Supreme Court, however, ruled that "to hold that a commissioners' court can order an election at any time to move a county seat is placing an absurd construction on the statute," and would lead to absurd results out of harmony with the intent of the legislature.

It was stated in the opinion that any election held "within two years" after another is illegal and void, and thus Spearman's efforts at repeated votes were illegal.

Because LeFors is more than 5 miles from a railroad acting as a common carrier, and further because Gray county has not had a county seat removal election within the last two years, this county is again eligible to vote on the question if desired, and every two years or more changes the statute.

Because of the ambiguity of the amended statute, many counties have been awaiting its interpretation by the Supreme Court. Now that the meaning has been defined, a number of elections likely will be held over the state.

### Three Business Houses Suffer in Fire Saturday

Holsten's Lunch, the Superior Barber shop, and the Red Ball station suffered heavy smoke and water damage, and the building in which they are located were partly burned Saturday afternoon soon after 5 o'clock.

The fire evidently started back of a stove in the small cafe. Firemen were hampered by the dense smoke, but soon extinguished the blaze. The building, located on North Cuyler street, is owned by Ed Vicars, DeLea Vicars, Dr. A. R. Sawyer, and Lee Hanks.

### New Telephone Line To McLean and LeFors Is Opened

The Southwestern Bell Telephone company line to McLean and the county seat was completed Saturday and put into operation Monday. Manager K. S. Boehm reports fifty-seven miles in length, the line is newly constructed the entire distance.

It follows the Clarendon road south 25 miles, and then goes across country to McLean with a cut-off to LeFors, a distance of 7 miles. The line to McLean follows the Prairie Oil and Gas company's line but the branch to LeFors had to be added. There are two phones at LeFors.

NEW HOGS—While the official report is not available, preliminary estimates justify the belief that Texas farm statistics as of January 1 will show a scarcity of hogs in Texas

This scarcity is in comparison with the numbers of hogs in adjoining states, and in relation to the numbers of other farm animals. Statistics likely will show that this state leads the nation in the production of cattle, sheep, goats and mules, but is far behind in the production of hogs.

Cotton raising in the past has discouraged extensive swine production, and recent heavy shipping has offset the growing numbers of farms which have a few hogs. Moreover, present market conditions do not encourage hog raising, although this condition, in view of the numerical shortage, should be temporary. It is claimed that present hog prices result not so much from overproduction as from under demand. "Eat more ham" might be a suitable slogan in the Southwest. Beef is not only in great market demand and quotable at the highest peacetime prices on record, but the general condition of the industry is regarded as very encouraging.

Texas needs more hogs on more farms. Perhaps the most welcome immediate result would be brought about if every farmer raised his own meat. The amount of farm income spent for farm-raised products purchased indirectly from farmers of other sections is enormous. This applies to the Panhandle as to other sections.

gusto when it was proposed to light the city with gas. Pioneer Texans, despite their dreams for the Texas empire, would have been skeptical of predictions which would have indicated the present extent of gas lines.

Unusually rich in agricultural resources, Texas is doubly blessed in the possession of mineral resources. The Texas Public Service bureau is authority for the statement that more than 8,000 miles of main gas pipelines has been laid in this state. West Texas leads in recent pipeline building, with East Texas and South Texas sharing the activity. Billions of feet of gas is coursing along the network of lines to the principal cities of the Lone Star state.

Already famous for its potentialities, the Panhandle has been indelibly entered in the nation's journal of assets as a territory of unusual possibilities, and cities of adjoining states are tracing their fuel source to the Panhandle gas field, many of them to the Pampa pools.

Cities with gas want cheap rates; those who haven't it are eager to obtain the best franchises possible. With all this development, the Panhandle becomes the reservoir for a huge Southwestern empire. As the stores of gas become less, it may become necessary for this territory to fight for the fuel which, despite its proximity, may not be very accessible. That day is a long way off, but its meaning should be kept in mind.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — When Commander Leroy Reinberg of the coast guard, explaining why the Paulding rammed the submarine S-4, testified in Boston that the Paulding had

some 300 rum ships to watch out for, he caused a certain elevation of eyebrows among those who had understood that the rum fleet had been chased off the North Atlantic seaboard.

"Well?" your correspondent asked coast guard headquarters here with a half-suspicion that someone must have been fibbing.

"Well, replied the coast guard, "it's this way. There isn't really any rum fleet any more, but Commander Reinberg's division extends all the way from Halifax to Norfolk and he knows of three hundred questionable vessels which are to be viewed with suspicion and investigated when sighted or heard from."

All large vessels, or does that include motor boats and small craft?"

"All large, seagoing vessels, both trans-Atlantic and coastwise," replied the coast guard.

For more than a hundred years there have been protests against the increasing power of the president, but that power has continued to grow. Secretary Mellon's row with members of Congress over the extent to which taxes can be reduced without causing a treasury deficit illustrates the point.

The Department of Agriculture maintains a rigid inspection service which puts the inspection stamp "U. S. Insp'd & P's'd." on all wholesale cuts of inspected beef, veal, pork, lamb and mutton. Reports reached the department late last year that some dealers often cut the stamp off carcasses and retail cuts, whereupon it was pointed out that the stamp was quite harmless, the marking fluid being a vegetable coloring material.

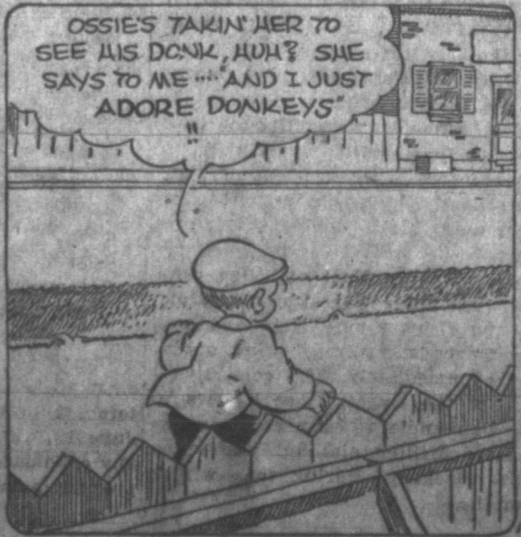

Mundy were elected captains of the respective groups.
