FORT WORTH, May 25 (A)-The monoplane Fort Worth in which R. L. Robbins and James Kelly today surpassed the record for sustained flight passed its 153rd hour in the air hovering over Love field, Dallas, tonight dodging a rain and electrical storm which swept Fort Worth from the west.





The building is to be 75 feet by 125 of brick and tile construction with stucco finish, and is to have a 25 by 50 foot basement. It will be set back fifteen feet from the street.
