ATTORNEYS SIGN FOR HIS LIBERTY

Wife, Daughter, and Son With Him at Decision

AMARILLO, May 25.—(P)—Aided by the testimony of the 17-year-old daughter he widowed, R. H. Hamilton, former Texas high court official, today was released from jail on \$20,000 bail to await trial for the slaying of Tom Walton, Jr., 21.

Walton, bridegroom of but a few weeks, was shot to death in the office of former Judge Hamilton three weeks ago today when he went there to talk over the new marital relations with his father-in-law.

In admitting the former jurist to bail, Judge Henry S. Bishop rendered no formal opinion other than that the case was hallable under new statutes.

Free State Plan To Make Lawyers Use Irish Tongue

DUBLIN.—(AP)—The legal profession in the Free State is indignant at the decision of the government to make future lawyers speak the Irish language. The government's bill which has the cordial support of the official opposition, Eamon de Valera's party, provides that all persons now under 15 years of age who desire to become solicitors must satisfy the chief justice that they can conduct business in the Irish tongue.

The measure has aroused much opposition, and many members of the government party are refusing to support it. Irish is compulsory in the schools now, and it is argued by the bill's supporters that future lawyers now in school have ample opportunity to comply with the proposed act without hardship.

The opposition of the proposal contended that there is at present no legal text book in Irish, that technical law terms are lacking in that language, and that litigants will suffer increased expense in paying for interpreters.

HUMANIAN PREMIER IN PLAN TO REFORM ARMY

BUCHAREST.—(AP)—Premier Iuliu Maniu has decided to reorganise the Rumanian army and to create a special department in the government concerned with military affairs alone. The technical chief of the new department probably will be General Brankovitch, one of the premier's personal friends.

M. Maniu will place before parliament the draft of a new law which will include provisions for conscription, decentralization, garrisoning, a new system of promoting officers, and an entirely new course in strategy and tactics.

"It's Like This"

THE RAILROAD WAR IS ON.

Recently the Rock Island railroad filed an application for a permit to build a 108-mile extension south from Shamrock to Quanah by way of Wellington.

The Fort Worth & Denver Northern, a new corporation, has forwarded an application for a 110-mile line from Childress north to Pampa by way of Wellington and Shamrock.

The territory to be served is rich agriculturally, and, if it comes on up through Gray county, the road built will tap the richest oil territory of the Panhandle as well.

Three cities involved have no choice in their positions. These are Pampa, Childress and Quanah. Only the Denver promises a line to Pampa and from Childress as terminals.

Shamrock and Wellington would be served by either road, and one would think they would be slow in taking a third road and either way Shamrock, of course, is already served by the Rock Island and would lean that way were other things equal.

Wellington is understood to have pledged right-of-way for the Rock Island through that county, but that is no reason why similar guarantees should not be given the Denver.

Similarly, it is to be expected that Shamrock will welcome the Denver once it becomes clear that that road has the best claim.

Here is what the Shamrock

Pexan says about the matter: "Shamrock chamber of commerce recently voted to donate the right-of-way in Wheeler county to the Rock Island as an expression of preference for that road.

"Shamrock, Wellington, and Quanah have thrown in with the Rock Island, believing that company's project would mean more to the upbuilding of the Eastern Panhandle, and it is understood that Amarillo is also favorable to this project."

"Geographical factors and self-interest put Fort Worth behind the Pampa-Shamrock-Wellington-Childress line of the Fort Worth and Denver, and Dallas is likewise favorable because of the need of a shorter route to the North Plains.

It will not profit Amarillo to incur the ill will of Pampa, Childress, and intermediate residents to be served by the proposed Denver line.

This railroad drama, however, will not be without between act performances, and John S. ... will furnish this

part of the program. The Santa Fe, in fact, raised the curtain by asking a permit to build a spur line from a point 8 miles east of Pampa (Heaton) on the G. & O. W. to a point about 2 1/2 miles east of LeFors.

The Interstate Commerce Commission therefore has before it the entire question of rail service for the territory south of Pampa.

It appears to The News that the solution would lie in granting the Fort Worth and Denver Northern a certificate of public necessity and convenience to come northward from Childress, thereby serving Wellington, Shamrock and Pampa and the oil territory, besides opening up further possibilities for railroad building on the plains north of Pampa.

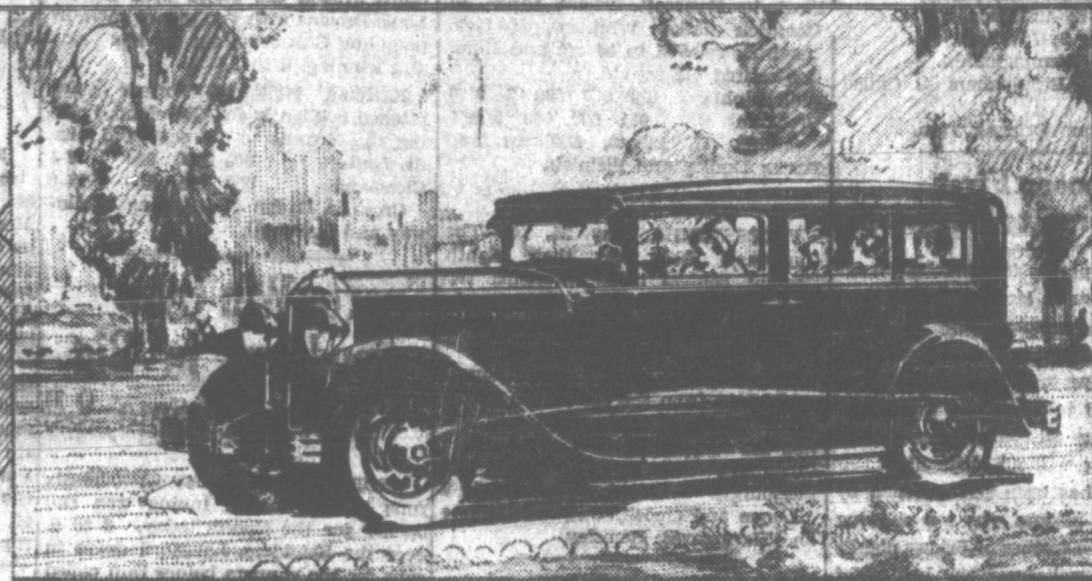

### Work on Canadian City Hall Starts

CANADIAN, May 25—Work on Canadian's new \$35,000 city hall and municipal auditorium has started, and it is expected that the building will be completed by Sept. 1. The building is to be 75 feet by 125 of brick and tile construction with stucco finish, and is to have a 25 by 50 foot basement. It will be set back fifteen feet from the street.

The city hall, which is to occupy the front part of the building, will be in two stories. It will provide, in addition to offices for city officials, a fire station, club rooms for firemen, and the front part of the building will be in charge of the station.

The auditorium, which is to be of one story with a balcony, will have a seating capacity of 1,300. It will have a flat concrete floor.

Canadian will be represented at the national convention of the Great Plains Highway association at North Platte, Neb., June 5 and 6. It was decided by the Chamber of Commerce at a recent session.

At the same meeting, members of the Chamber of Commerce discussed plans for holding a series of entertainments to raise funds for the Hemp Hill Country Fair, which is held annually in the fall.

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
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
