

COUNTY SHOWS HUGE OIL GAIN

Famous Pilots to Participate in Elks' Aerial Circus Here Today

STUNTS WILL BEGIN AT ONE O'CLOCK SHARP

Shifflet to Fly Upside Down Over Course Of 3 Miles

MANY PLANES ARRIVE EARLY

Local Members of B. P. O. E. Ready to Entertain Large Crowd

A dozen planes that comprise Ray Shifflet's aerial advertisers of Mangum, Okla., began arriving here early this morning for the first aerial circus in the Panhandle which will begin at one o'clock at the local airport. The Pampa Elks who are sponsors of the event, predict a huge crowd.

Thousands from Gray county and nearby towns are expected to be present when the performances start, as Shifflet Saturday, dropped bales of handbills, advertising the circus, over Wheeler, Shamrock, Sayre, Mangum and other Texas and Oklahoma towns. At the same time, Frank Shaw in his new American Eagle bi-plane was dropping handbills over White Deer, Panhandle and Borger. Today Shifflet will add Pampa to the long list of cities where his circus has been the major attraction of a season.

Shifflet, whose crew of stunt fliers have featured entertainment programs at state fairs in the middle west, has promised that his aviators will go thru the gamut of their performances with some added thrills, especially for people of the Panhandle.

The advertisers will not only take up passengers at reduced rates, but will give a program of thrilling stunts, smoke writing, wing walking, flying upside down for a distance of three miles. Shifflet himself will attempt the last named stunt. He is rated as one of the greatest stunt pilots in the U. S.

C. B. Akers, Rex theatre manager, announced yesterday that free tickets to the Rex Sunday-Monday-Tuesday attraction will be dropped in miniature parachutes from the planes.

The smoke plane will be piloted by Shifflet, and Paul Powell of Wichita Falls will do the wing walking. Upside down flying in formation and army maneuvers will be given by three American Eagle bi-planes. One of the planes will be piloted by Frank Shaw, local contractor.

Open planes and cabin planes will be on the field all afternoon to take up passengers at reduced rates. All proceeds from the aerial show will be used by the Elks to purchase an Elks home in Pampa.

Free parking space for 2,000 cars will be available, and an admission charge of 25 cents will be made at the gate. Names of the pilots will be announced as the take-offs are made.

Tex Thornton Adds Another Oil Well Fire to Long List

MCCAMEY, Aug. 17. (P)—Tex Thornton, famous oil well "shooter," had added another oil well fire to the long list of blazes he had extinguished.

During the early morning hours today, Thornton slid down a long cable to the Landreth Production company's University No. 1 well and set off explosives that put out a fire that had roared in the hole since it came in as a gasser Wednesday.

The flames were visible at night for many miles. The gas flow was estimated between 50,000,000 and 60,000,000 cubic feet. It is located in the NE 1/4 section 18, block 16 Taylor Link field, 25 miles southwest of here.

Leader or Follower—Which?

(An Editorial)

Pampa today is in position to become a real leader in the Panhandle. Why not? It has 80,000 acres of wheat in its trade territory, besides thousands of acres of other crops. It is the center of one of the largest oil fields in the Southwest, as well as the largest gas field in the country. Both gas and oil development, according to authorities, will cover a long period of years. Of course there will be times when this development will slow up, but it will be many years before drilling stops in this territory.

Besides the drilling, the presence of many gasoline and carbon black plants, means a real payroll for Pampa for more than a generation. The payroll of the carbon black plants, not counting construction, amounts to around \$50,000 per month, and this will be largely increased as the years go by.

In addition to the above, Pampa is about to become a railroad center. While no one can say, definitely the probabilities are that the Denver will be built into Pampa, and will later go north. This road in addition to the two Santa Fe lines will open up a fine trade territory for this city, and there is no question but that a number of jobbing houses will be located in Pampa because of these roads.

Endurance Plane Spokane Sun God Leaves Nebraska

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., Aug. 17. (P)—The endurance plane Spokane Sun God was being refueled for the last time here tonight before leaving for Cleveland where the next supply of gasoline will be taken on. Pilots Nick Namer and Art Walker indicated in notes dropped at the air field that they plan to reach Cleveland at day-break.

Three successful contacts have already been made by the refueling ship and the final contact will give the Sun God a full load of 400 gallons of gasoline, it was said.

Pilots Vernon Bookwalter and Neil O'Connell of the refueling plane will remain in North Platte overnight, taking off tomorrow morning for St. Paul, Minn., where they plan to await the return of the Sun God on its round trip transcontinental flight.

Difficulties encountered in refueling the endurance ship at high altitudes over Wyoming were not experienced here. The altitude at North Platte is approximately 2,000 feet lower than at Cheyenne.

In a late note dropped on the field, pilots Namer and Walker made an urgent request for eye wash.

No Solution Yet of Strange Case in Minneapolis

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 17. (P)—The funeral services were held today for Dorothy Aune, 12-year-old victim of a stranger assailant, police continued to check every possible angle of the case, but tonight apparently were far from a solution.

Thousands crowded the streets near the Lutheran church of Our Redeemer as Rev. Haldor intoned the last services for the little victim and more than a score of detectives mingled with them in the vain hope that the slayer might haunt the scene.

Great banks of flowers were piled high against the little casket during the services, many coming from strangers to the Aune family.

As Rev. Haldor pleaded for swift justice for the girl's slayer, analysis was being made of the latest clues unearthed, certain impressions, including a child's hand print, found in dust in the basement of a store undergoing repairs a short distance from Dorothy's home.

Police also were questioning two workmen who had been engaged in remodeling the store last Tuesday when the girl was kidnaped, attacked and slain and who were still at work when police took them into custody today.

Authorities also obtained their first definite description of the automobile from which the child's body is believed to have been thrown beside railroad tracks early Wednesday morning. Two railroad men said they saw the car, a faded blue sedan, turning around in the street near where the body was picked up just a few minutes before the slaying was reported.

Second Body Found in Lake Adds To Mysterious Deaths

BARBABOO, Wis., Aug. 17. (P)—Devil's Lake today gave up the body of James Parelo, missing assistant taxidermist of the field museum of Chicago but its discovery served only to deepen the mystery surrounding the death of his young bride. Her body was found in the lake yesterday.

Following an autopsy Madison, Wis., doctors were unable to say whether she died from external violence or drowning. Officials, however, expressed belief tonight, however, that both Mr. and Mrs. Parelo were victims of accidental drowning.

"Courtesy" Jitney With Tip Causes Great Controversy

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 17. (P)—The court fight over the operation of jitneys during the strike of union street car men over shadowed all else today in the controversy between the public service and the union which has experienced two major flares of violence since July 2.

To test the legality of the police action against operation of the "courtesy" jitney with a tip, counsel for Charles S. Upton, a driver obtained an order from Judge Mark M. Boatner in civil district court citing city officials to appear next Thursday and show cause why the jitneys should not continue. Acting Mayor T. Semmes Walmesley and Theodore Ray, superintendent of police were cited.

School Tax Yet Undetermined by Automatic Board

AUSTIN, Aug. 17. (P)—The automatic tax board agreed to levy 30 cents on the \$100 for ad valorem purpose today, and fixed the confederate pension allotment at seven cents, the constitutional limit, but failed to agree on a rate for school purposes.

The ad valorem rate for the past year was 22 cents, and the constitutional limit 35 cents. The levy for school purposes was 35 cents, the constitutional limit, making the rate 64 cents for the past year. Should the levy for school purposes be left at 35 cents, the rate for the year would be 72 cents.

It was not stated when the board would meet again to consider the levy for school purposes.

It was reported that Governor Moody contended for lowering the 25-cent school levy, arguing that the \$3,500,000 balance to the credit of the school fund would be more than enough with the 35 cents levy, to provide an appropriation of \$17.50.

The board of education failed to meet today as scheduled to fix the scholastic apportionment.

Expressing regret at the necessity of raising the ad valorem rate over last year's 22 cents, Governor Moody said he "disclaimed any responsibility" for the hike.

"The responsibility must rest with the legislature, where it properly belongs," Governor Moody said.

GIRL STRAPPED TO CHAIR NEAR OPEN GAS JET

Dies In Few Minutes After Found by Mother

POLICE SEARCH FOR SUSPECT

Note Found Is Only Clue Obtained So Far

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 17. (P)—A note reading: "If I can't have you, no one else will," furnished virtually the only clue the police had to work on today in trying to solve the death of Miss Mary Frances Morgan, 19, who was found in her Narberth home yesterday strapped to a chair near a gas range with opened jets.

The girl died a few minutes after she was found unconscious by her mother Mrs. Clarence Morgan. The note, lying on the kitchen table just back of where the girl was found, was signed with the initials "P. R."

Mrs. Morgan told police she knew no one with the initials "P. R." and that as far as she knew, her daughter had no love affairs.

Mrs. Robert Thompson, who lives nearby said she saw a well dressed young man drive up to the Morgan home about 4:30 p. m. Friday in a dark colored coupe and enter the house with a brief case. The girl was found unconscious at 5:30 p. m. Police sought him today.

Graf Zeppelin Message Picked Up by Tokyo

TOKYO, Aug. 17. (P)—The central wireless station here picked up a message from the Graf Zeppelin at 7:15 a. m., in which the dirigible reported its position as 62 degrees north latitude and 120 degrees east longitude.

TOKYO, Aug. 17. (P)—Thrilling the imaginations of the ancient orient and eating up the miles over the wilds of Siberia, the airliner Graf Zeppelin today for the first time got into touch with the goal of its perilous flight from Friedrichshafen to Tokyo.

Powerful Japanese wireless stations at 9:40 p. m., tonight (7:40 A. M. E. S. T.) picked up the position of the dirigible in the heart of Siberia rushing on to Tokyo with a following wind which enabled Dr. Hugo Eckener to cruise with three motors.

At that time, the Graf was estimated to be 2,730 miles from Tokyo, or three-fifths of her total run, a distance it could cover in 48 hours in maintaining a speed of 60 miles an hour.

At 9:40 p. m., the Graf reported to the government wireless station at Oobishi, Hokkaido, that she was in 63-30 latitude north and 107-30 longitude. This was about 750 miles from Yakut Siberia, over which Dr. Eckener was expected to pass on his course to Tokyo. From Yakutsk to the northern tip of Hondo Island, the principal part of Japan, by the western tip of Hondo Island and the sea of Okhotsk and the Island of Sakhalien, was roughly 1,600 miles.

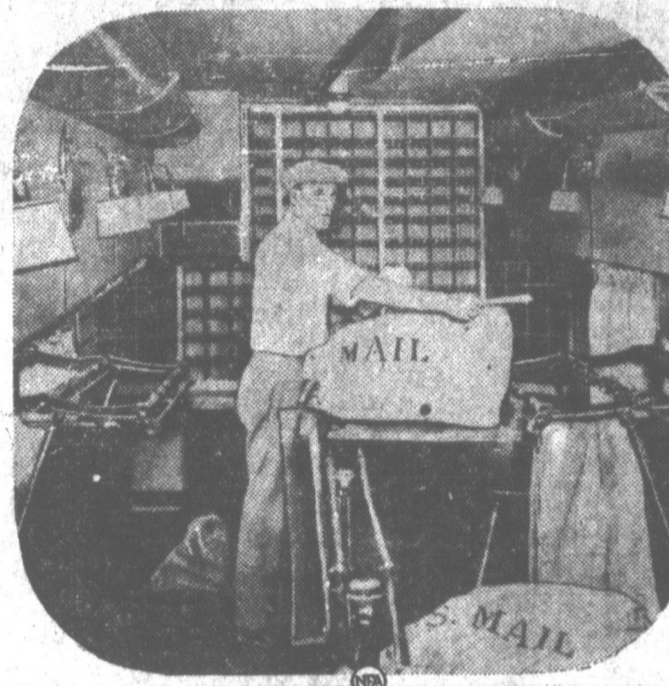
PYTHIANS TO BORGER

"Flying Postoffice" Is Next



This is how Uncle Sam's flying postoffice will look when clerks are carried on planes to sort airmail while the plane is en route. The Boeing Air Transport, operators of the San Francisco-Chicago route, is building a fleet of 18-passenger planes which can be converted into mail planes like this within 24 hours. The mail cabin is 19 1/2 feet long, five and one-half feet wide, and allows a clerk to stand upright while working. There is room for 280,000 letters.

No Trace Found of Men Believed Trapped by Fire

SEATTLE, Aug. 17. (P)—After anxious days and nights when the forest fire situation in the Pacific northwest and western Canada seemed to be growing steadily more critical, and federal troops were ordered to give assistance if necessary, late reports from the flaming fronts gave encouragement to forest service officials today.

Search for Douglas C. Ingraham, Portland, federal grazing inspector, and Eamannie St. Laise, Chelard youth, believed trapped by fire at McFarland creek in the Chelan national forest in Washington, continued unremittingly today but virtually no hope for their safety remained.

District Forester C. M. Granger of Portland, who flew over the fire area yesterday reported a slight improvement in the entire central Washington area.

Crews battling fires in Wenatchee national forest, reported considerable progress.

Conditions in British Columbia and Vancouver Island also were reported better and fire crews were being reduced in some localities.

Virtually all northern Idaho fires were reported under control.

Man Wanted For Theft of Checks Here Is Captured

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Aug. 17. (P)—E. E. Neil, alias Williams Petty, of Pampa, Texas, today waived extradition and will be returned Monday to Pampa where he is wanted for trial in connection with theft of \$2500 in travelers checks from Harry Clarkson.

Neither Harry Clarkson or the man being held in Oklahoma City are known to Sheriff E. S. Graves. The arrest was made thru the efforts of an insurance agency in Oklahoma City with whom the travelers checks were insured. The sheriff's officers have been working on the case for the last week.

Neal will be returned to Pampa immediately. Sheriff Graves said last night. An officer was to leave here today for Oklahoma City to return the man to await the action of the grand jury.

Theatre Magnate Is Charged With Criminal Attack

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 17. (P)—After filing a formal information charging Alexander Pantages, 54, theatre magnate, with criminal attack on Eunice Pringle, 17, Dancer, District Attorney Byron Fitts today announced that Roy Keene, an executive of the Pantages theatre system, had been taken into custody as a material witness in an alleged attempt to bribe witnesses to alter their testimony in the case.

Fitts said Keene made a statement that "puts the theatre magnate right on the spot." Keene was ordered held in jail pending investigation. He was named today by Fred Wise, a witness at Pantages' preliminary hearing, as the man who saw in Pantages' private office shortly after the alleged attack there on Miss Pringle on Friday, Aug. 9. Wise said Keene tried to bar him from the room whither Wise had gone when he heard the girl scream.

Keene was taken into custody shortly after Fitts had announced that two of the state's principal witnesses during Pantages' preliminary hearing had filed signed statements with him that "certain parties" had attempted to bribe them to change their testimony.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17. (P)—Failure of the refueling equipment to work during a 24-minute contact with his supply plane forced Donald A. Templeton, former army aviator, to abandon tonight his attempt for a solo refueling record here today.

GUSHERS HIKE PRODUCTION TO 85,813 BARRELS

Potter Is Only Other Panhandle County To Increase

OTHER TESTS DRILLING IN

County Is Near Major Pool Listed in Quantity

Gray county made the Panhandle field safer in the major field list last week with a daily increase of 11,631 barrels. The home county sent the Panhandle into the major pool list the previous week with an increase of 12,081 barrels. Potter county again came back into the production list to be the only other county in the field to show an increase.

The bringing in of four gushers by Texas company, one by Operators Oil company and several small producers again brought Gray county's production nearer the major pool recognition that is being looked forward to. Many tests are on top of the pay and this week is expected to bring an additional increase to the county's daily production.

Latest development in the field was by the Skelly Oil company. Skelly Oil company's No. 2 Jackson in the Bowers-McCee pool was drilled to 3,105 feet last week and began flowing about 250 barrels a day. Friday the hole was deepened to 3,146 feet and the first hour the test flowed 107 barrels. An increase was recorded until the twelfth hour when the flow was reported to be 350 barrels.

The first 24 hours the gusher flowed 7,000 barrels of high gravity oil.

There are wells in the Panhandle field producing 122,470 barrels of oil. Production by counties:

- Carson 178 wells, 9,428 barrels, decrease of 164 barrels.
- Gray—411 wells, 85,813 barrels, a gain of 11,631 barrels.
- Hutchinson—699 wells, 25,161 barrels, a decrease of 262 barrels.
- Moore—18 wells, 1,180 barrels, a decrease of 80 barrels.
- Potter—1 well, 56 barrels, a gain of 56 barrels.
- Wheeler—38 wells, 612 barrels, a decrease of 104 barrels.
- Total—1,645 wells, 122,470 barrels, a gain of 10,241 barrels.

Aged Man Shoots When Accused of Poisoning Dog

WACO, Aug. 17. (P)—Pleasant Vessels, 81, who yesterday shot and killed Joe Brown, 45, when Brown accused him of having poisoned his dog, expressed regret today over having been forced to kill a man. The aged slayer, penniless, told visitors that all his life he had sought to keep out of trouble but that Brown had threatened to "stamp his liver out." Then, he said, he got his shotgun and fired in self defense.

Vessels came to Texas from Alabama in 1868, traveling in an ox cart. He will be given a preliminary hearing Monday.

Therefore Pampa is in position to go forward. But its citizens must not be asleep to what the city should do to be prepared for this movement forward. That is why the proposed bond issue to be voted upon next Tuesday is so important. Should these issues be defeated the fact will do much to slow up Pampa's development. Outside people with money are looking towards Pampa. We all want more industries. But men behind the industries look farther than cheap gas and railroad facilities. One of the first things these men look at is the city itself—its housing facilities, its streets, its churches, schools, its amusements, in fact they want their factories placed in cities, other things being equal, where the living conditions are favorable. They want their employes contented.

Pampa has no parks and no playgrounds for the children. There is no place off the streets for the children of the employes to play. There are no recreation centers. Now is the time to start getting them.

Most of Pampa's streets are still unpaved. If a man lives off a paved street, what a time he has to get to and from his work when it rains!

One of the places to which the stranger goes for information is the city hall. The impression he gets when he visits the present city hall is not good.

Pampa's fire equipment is absolutely inadequate to take care of half the population. The industrial man, if he comes to Pampa, wants his property well protected.

All of the above matters are considered by the man who is looking for a location. Make your city attractive and livable, and you will attract the outside man with money.

Let us analyze these various issues. First, the city hall. When you go to the city hall on business, or when you go to cast your vote on Tuesday, take a look and see under what conditions do the city officials work, crowded some times three in a 10 by 12 foot room. Ask these officials where some of the records of the city are kept, and they will tell you that some of them are in the attic, because there is no other place for them.

The new city hall, from what can be learned, will be adequate for all city purposes. There will be ample office space. There will be ample vaults where the records will be safe from fire. There will be plenty of room for a real library; there will be room for the ladies in their meetings, and your rooms for our friends from the country, upon whom we depend for a part of our business. Where can the country or city women, for that matter, find a rest room today? There will be a small meeting room, as well as an auditorium.

Let's have a city hall of which we can be proud and one that will take care of all of the affairs of this section of the county.

Everyone who has made

himself acquainted with our present fire protection will certainly vote for this project. Pampa has been very lucky for several years. But men who know state that if we ever get a real fire started, it will be just too bad, for we have not enough equipment to handle a fire of much size. One of the trucks is a truck only in name and the chemical wagon is not much better. We haven't a ladder that would reach a three-story building.

Our apparatus, such as it is, crowded into a small space, confined in such a way that here is delay every time a fire alarm is sounded. Our firemen are all volunteers, except one. They are giving of their time, ruining their clothes, risking their lives for Pampa. Why not give them some equipment to fight our fires?

The proposed plan will provide ample space for the equipment, make room for the fire-boys, make it possible for some of the single men to sleep at the station, and be ready some morning about 2 o'clock to rush out and save your house. Some folks think that this hall could be placed in the proposed city hall. Considering the location of the proposed city hall, and what the city government plans to put in the building such a plan will not be practical. To build it into the city hall would take up too much room. It would be necessary to make a long runway from building unless the hall is placed near the curb. It would ruin the looks of the city hall, and would probably be more expensive than a separate building.

Besides, the proposed station will have to be enlarged in later years in keeping with the needs, and properly placed on the half block, far enough away from the present American Legion building, there will be room for a real fire station, as well as a small park.

And as to paving, the sooner we get our streets in a passable condition under all circumstances the sooner we will have a real city in which to live. Every time it rains, we

see a large number of cars in the ditches. The cost of pulling one car out, and perhaps repairing the damages, would more than pay the average owner's tax for all the improvements proposed in this bond issue.

If we are to have adequate free mail delivery, if we are to have free express delivery outside of the business section, we must have paving. It is understood that this issue when voted will pay the city's part of connecting with the county paving, and take care of the city's part of paving already paved for. The present paving when carried out will benefit most of the people within a short distance of paving and hundreds out of the mud.

As to parks, there is not a city of any size today but which is spending thousands and even millions to correct the mistakes of a few years ago. We all feel the lack of playgrounds for the children. People some times wonder what can be done to help the younger generation grow up in the way they should. Parks and playgrounds is a part of the answer. If Pampa waits for a few years to establish such advantages, the present generation of boys and girls will have lost that opportunity, and it will cost many times the present issue to find park locations.

No one cares to pay any more taxes than necessary. On the other hand, we can't have much of anything without paying for it. It is a question then of how to best spend the money. The writer believes that a few more dollars in tax at this time will be well spent. Pampa can become a real city, far beyond what it is at present. But it will require money and effort.

The present bond issues will cost the average man just about the price of a new casing on his car. We never hesitate to buy that casing if we have a blow out. Why not spend the price of a casing to help start this city along the way it should go. For mind you, if it will pay back many fold in money, and other advantages

that makes life worth living. If anyone wants Pampa to stand still and allow other places to go by us, let him stop all efforts and be satisfied with what we have.

TWINKLES

A visitor apologizes to us for probably wrecking our alleged train of thought. At the moment, however, we cannot recall that a train was scheduled. Sometimes we wonder if the service should not be discontinued altogether.

It isn't that we are pessimistic; rather, that we have been feigning a break down or something to make our vacation seem necessary at this busy period. Actually, we feel great after these cool Pampa days and cooler nights, and we believe we can even enjoy some of that Northern New Mexico climate.

But our vacation is already deteriorating in appeal. Just as we figured we had escaped all danger of meeting any acquaintances, we learn that some of our geologist friends are digging in the so-called oldest ruins in America, where we plan to sojourn.



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

Master Tacticians to Lecture Before Football Coaches

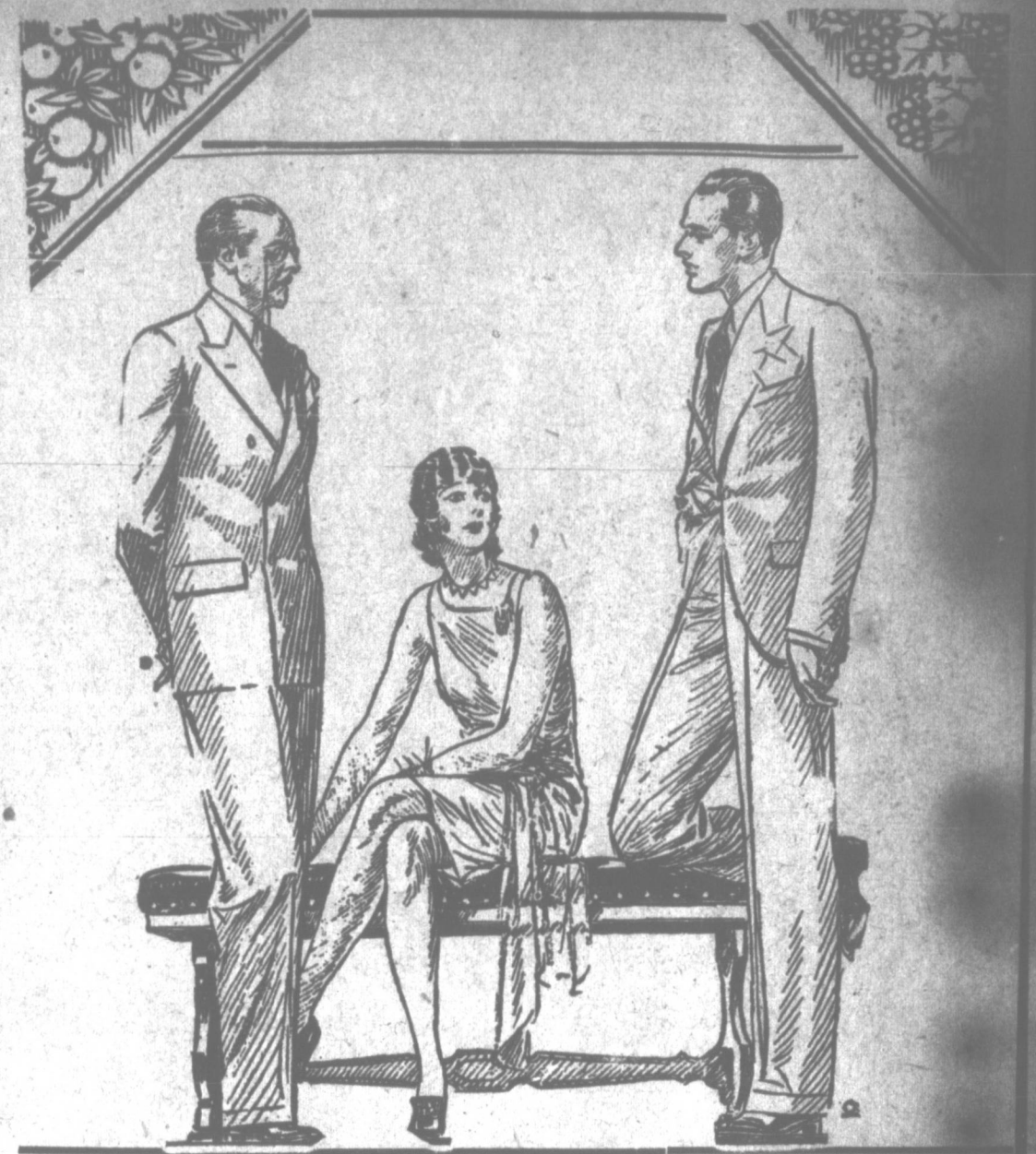
