

Construction **Is Continuing**

As roadwork on SH214 of Muleshoe north continues, the contractor is at work preparing new base for asphalt surfacing on the highway from US70 to the Parmer County line, Rhea E. Bradley, supervising resident engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, of Littlefield, announced late last week.

He said it is expected that asphalt surfacing will begin in the near future.

Bradley reminds the public to watch for warning signs and to drive slowly through the project.

STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS: In homes: The corner of the basement toward the tornado usually offers greatest safety, particularly in frame houses. People in houses without basements can sometimes be protected by taking cover under heavy furniture against inside walls. Doors and windows on the sides of the houses away from the tornado may be opened to help reduce damage to the building. Standing against the inside wall or a lower floor of an office building offers some

AUDITORIUMS AVOID AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly supported roofs! In rural schools that do not have strongly reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

5. IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS: On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for moving workers to sections of the plant offering the

greatest protection. Keep calm. It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Even though a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. Tornados cover such a small zone, as a rule, that relatively only a few places in a warned area are directly affected. You should know about tornados, though, 'just in case.'

able for high yields are also necessary. If weeds are present, they must be controlled, since they use available water and nitrogen needed to produce high grass yields.

Research and demonstration data show that nitrogen fertilization is more efficient in the spring, probably due to better moisture and general growing conditions, says Tanksley. For example, average results of nitrogen rate studies at four locations show that a ton of hay can be produced for each 30 to 40 pounds of nitrogen in the spring, while 50 to 60 pounds are needed late in the season. This means that higher rates of nitrogen can be used in the spring. It may be desirable to apply 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre in the spring and drop to 60 pounds in late summer unless available moisture is

unusually good. Under grazing management, apply nitrogen fertilizer at rates and at the best Con't On Page 6, Col. 3
