OUR ROADS.

West Texas is largely an agricultural country and such being the case, everything that enhances the value of land enriches to that extent the people of this section and everything that adds to the convenience and profitable use of the farm increases proportionately its value. If a farm has no convenient outlet or if the road to market, school and post office is almost impassible, it is undesirable and should be considered of little value as a home. We dislike to speak disparagingly of the County of our adoption but its highways are in wretched condition and the attention of our people should be called to it and they should be made to consider what serious disadvantage they are suffering in this particular over other old settled counties of the State. Borden, tho organized 15 years ago, has not a single first class road, nor one that is clear of mesquite bushes, stumps or dog holes. Not one that a traveler can safely ride or drive over a dark night, even with gentle horses. They are little better than the blazed out roads of a pioneer's country. They need clearing, shrubbing and leveling, the deep ruts and washouts should be filled and the road beds graded. A trail through the forest, suffices the wants of a savage, but good roads are necessary to civilization, they bring the school house, market, church and post office within the farmers reach and render intercourse between different localities easy and convenient. They are a prime necessity of a civilized people, and it must be owing to a feeling of indifference or a lack of appreciation of their benefits that we do not have good roads in Borden County.

The law emphasizes their importance by imposing a tax, not only upon all residents 21 years of age, but even those under age if 15 years old and not over 45. It embraces all who in contemplation of law are physically capable of doing such work. And that class is subject to five days

labor each year on public highways. Discussing the road question last year, the Commissioners of our county expressed their willingness to supplement the road work, with the Road and Bridge funds, provided the five days work of those subject proved insufficient to keep our roads in good condition. We understand the road overseers are derelict in requiring the time of the road workers the law allows them and are doing but little work. Now, if from failure on the part of the overseer, the road becomes dangerous or impassible and the people who travel the roads do not make complaint to the county attorney of such failure, they themselves are to blame and deserve to suffer all the losses and inconveniences resulting from such failure. If citizens of the county realized how much good roads were worth to them, we believe they would see to it that the roads were kept in good condition. Our section is beginning to attract a great many prospectors for cheap homes from abroad but cheapness of land will not offset the disadvantage of bad roads, and many of them will be driven to seek homes in other localities. In Missouri many delegates of the Good Roads convention which met at Columbus about two weeks ago, favored a message to Gov. Folk asking him to call an extra session of the Legislature to vote Bonds for road building. A 30 cent road tax and a general appropriation of one half million dollars was suggested. The people in several counties of that state, notably in Boone have shown their liberality by building roads with private subscriptions, many of them running up to \$100.00 and several to \$1000.00. This was begun by first building one mile, the County Court subscribing half the amount, the adjacent property owners, put up the remainder. One man owning 60 acres gave \$100, and worked it out, he said the road added 25 per cent to the value of his land. Let us also wake up to a full realization of the great importance of good roads as a factor in building up our country, and making it what it should be, one of the most desirable localities to be found in the State.

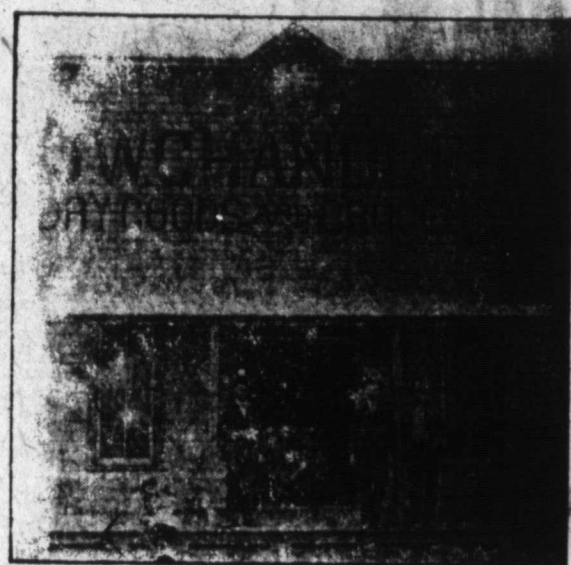

IT MAY DESTROY THE STATE COMMISSIONS.

The rate bill as it passed the Senate is said to be far superior to the original Hepburn bill, in that it restores the imprisonment penalty for common carriers convicted of giving rebates, makes the receiver of the rebate liable not only to a fine of \$20,000, but to an additional pecuniary penalty of three times the sum of the rebates, defines pipe lines, express companies and sleeping car companies as common carriers, holds the railroad companies responsible for the private car lines, makes clear the right of railroads as to a court review of the Commission's orders, and provides means for expediting appeals to the United States Supreme Court.—News.
