Texas history from a centruy ago and scenery shaped through the ages dominate the vacation opportunities of Far West Texas, that region rolling west of the Hill Country to El Paso.

And todays 55 mph speed limit stretches the fuel far enough to see it all: the Sonora Caverns, Langtry, Big Bend, Guadalupe National Park and El

These and more than five dozen travel stops are mentioned in the new 'Wonderful West Texas Fun and Adventure Map' says J. Fike Godfrey, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Sonora Caverns, best known of the Edwards Plateau caves, was discovered only in 1961. discovered only in 1961.

Langtry is the homee of Judge Roy Bean's frontier court and an attractive Texas Highway Department touristinformation center. It shares the Rio Grande region with Amistad (Friendship) Reservoir and the and the Texas-Mexico towns of Del Rio and Ciudad Acuna.


Up river is Big Bend, one of Texas two national parks, a blend of desert and mountains, horseback trails and house trailers, and the canyon waters of Santa Elena, Mariscal and Boquillas.

Plenteous air currents make Marfa the site in early summer of the national sail plane meet. Twenty-one miles north, 19th Centruy Fort Davis isn't far from the 20th Century's McDonald Observatory, both open to the public.

The Texas Highway Department also recommends a scenic 74 mile drive, looping through the Davis Mountains.

More mountains lie across Interstate 10 between Van Horn and Ysleta, location the Tigua Indian Reservation, the only one in West Texas.

Segments classified as water quality segments are defined as those segments in which the measured instream quality does not meet the Texas Water Quality Standards.

The Purpose of the Waste Load Evaluation is to define waste treatment levels that will result in the stream segment meeting applicable stream standards. Kikers Kolumn

BY EARNEST KIKER COUNTY AGENT

With increased production and harvesting costs for hay this year, producers in Borden County should do everything possible to make certain their hay is of high quality.

Earnest Kiker, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, lists two main factors for producing high quality hay: high rates of fertilization and harvesting at an early stage of growth.

Fertilizer is a major cost for producing high quality hay. Due to increased costs and limited supplies of fertilizer, each producer should make a special effort to utilize fertilizer efficiently by harvesting hay at the correct stage of growth.

As hay crops begin to mature, quality begins to decline, points out Kiker. Most hay crops should be harvested before seed heads begin to form. Plants like Coastal bermudagrass, which produce no seed heads, should be harvested at 28-30 days of growth.

Costs for fuel, equipment, wire, twine and other inputs have also increased considerably during the past year, thus raising harvest expenses. addition, many of these items are in limited supply. This makes it all the more important to harvest high quality hay, emphasizes Kiker.

Dr. Neal Pratt, Extension Forage Specialist offers this information for your use.

CROP REPORT

In early July, over 24,000 Texas famers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

Information from this survey wil' be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. There are 254 counties in Texas, and reports are needed from many farmers so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry-agriculture. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agricult-

SCREWWORMS

COLLEGE STATION -- Screwworm cases are continuing their The bride is employed in the northward trek across Texas, and producers are reminded to re-double their efforts against the costly livestock pest.

'Texas has just recorded 590 positive cases in May, or 67 per cent of the total cases it has experienced this year to date, says Dr. M.E. Meadows, Jr., veterinarian in charge of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program at Mission.

'With rains received over number of areas recently, the moisture is expected to increase the opportunities for more worm cases, unless producers really watch their animal and treat all wounds," Meadows says.

Until the beginning of May, only 282 of the flesh-eating worm cases had been identified in the Lone Star State.

Only 54 positive cases were reported by the Mission Lab in May, 1973.

With in the past several weeks, Cottle County, in the Rolling Plains area near the Oklahoma line, recorded two screwworm cases, first for the season there... New. cases also have been confirmed recently in El Paso, Reagan, Reeves and Crane Counties in the Trans-Pecos and far West Texas

Earlier, cases had moved north from the Hill Country to CConcho, Runnels, and Haskell Counties, which probably accounts for the cases now occurring in Cattle,' says Meadows.

Non-screwworm samples submitted by producers dipped so-mewhat in May.

With the Gulf Coast ticks excreate additional worm problems especially the southern portion of Texas, all producers should join in the battle against screwworms, adds Meadows.

To make the battle more effective, producers should carefully check animals regularly for wounds, submit samples from worms found in wounds, treat all wounds, and spray or dip livestock on a regular ba-

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

The Board of Trustees of the Borden County Independent School District convened in regular session on June 17, 1974. After approval of the minutes, bills and routine business, Superintendent McLeroy presented the year-to-date financial report.

The report on attendance for the 1973-74 school year was made by Superintendent Mc-Leroy. The final average daily attendance was 189.6 for grades Kindergarten through 12.

Superintendent McLeroy presented the proposed budget for the 1974-75 school year. After discussion of the budget, the board recommended that it be prepared as presented.

The board approved the pur-

chase of blazers for the band rather than new uniforms which had previously been approved.

The motion carried to appoint Joan Briggs as Authorized Representative for the U.S.D.A. commodities.


There being no further business to be brought before the board the meeting was adjourned.




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
