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

Cyber Net Water expert: Lawmakers did well

WHITE DEER — The manager of Pampa's groundwater district said he thinks the Texas Legislature did well when it came to dealing with the needs of the state's underground water resources.

"I think overall it came out fairly well," said C.E. Williams, general manager of Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, headquartered in White Deer.

Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District covers all or parts of Gray, Wheeler, Carson, Roberts, Donley, Armstrong and Potter County. It was the third groundwater district established in the state, back in the 1950s.

One of the issues with which the Texas Legislature dealt during its biennial ses-

One of the most important sections of the water bill for this panhandle district dealt with export fees. One of the district's counties, Roberts County, is at the center of several water marketing plans that would include pumping the underground water out and sending it to areas outside the district.

sion this year was the establishment of groundwater districts. Groundwater districts have been the method through which previous sessions of the legislature wanted to deal with underground water issues. The reasoning in the past, according to state officials, has been that it gives local control to water resources in a state with widely variable

There were over 30 groundwater districts created this session if the Governor signs all the legislation, Williams said.

Williams said he wasn't that enthused when Senate Bill 2, the major water legislation for this year's session, was introduced in early March.

Williams had been on an advisory board for more than a year that worked to hammer out a consensus on various

water issues. The initial legislation introduced in the Senate did not appear to reflect many of the recommendations of the consensus board, but after some long, hard hours working with legislators, Williams said, the proposed legislation was changed to reflect the work that the advisory board had done.

The work done by Williams and others that were part of the consensus board changed the proposed water legislation.

While changes were made to the Senate's version of the proposed legislation, much of the final wording was taken from the House version of the bill. After two differing bills were passed by each chamber of the legislature, the bills went to a conference committee of Senate and House members to be reconciled before being sent on to the Governor's office.

Dad still jailed in case of home alone little girl

A Pampa father accused of leaving his toddler home alone remained in jail Monday morning in lieu of bond on an endangering a child charge, a felony, and child abandonment.

Matthew Lynn Schiffman, 37, was arrested Thursday night around midnight at a local bar after Gray County deputies found a 19month-old girl alone at 401 N. Banks at 10:15 p.m., according to Gray County Sheriff Deputy Randy Langwell.

Bond was set at \$1,000 on each charge by Precinct One Justice of the Peace Joe Martinez.

A divorce decree was granted to Schiffman and Alma Blanco Schiffman in the 223rd District Court on April 24, 2001, according to court records.

According to the decree, both parents, Matthew Lynn Schiffman and Alma Blanco Schiffman, were named joint conservators to a female child, born Sept. 19, 1999. The decree ordered that Matthew Lynn Schiffman "shall have exclusive right to establish the child's primary residence without regard to geographical location.' (See DAD, Page 3)

State officials say only three Texas doctors have been disciplined for their work prescribing pills via the Internet, and that two of them worked for Bill Stallknecht, owner of Pill Box Pharmacy.

One of them was Dr. David L. Bryson, who was offered work by Pill Box after losing his job at Kerrville State Hospital, being sued and filing for bankruptcy.

From' 1999 until February, Bryson says


he made as much as \$9,000 a week consulting with patients by phone from his Kerrville home and writing prescriptions for the San Antonio pharmacy to fill by mail. He said the job also initially involved writing prescriptions based on patients' answers to online question-

"I was very good-at it," Bryson, 63, said. "I was very successful."

The State Board of Medical Examiners, which considers remote consultations an improper medical practice, suspended Bryson's medical license in February.

"It is unprofessional conduct for a physician to initially prescribe any dangerous drugs or controlled substances

In the conference committee, Williams said about 90 percent of the House language was used.

One of the most important sections of the water bill for this panhandle district dealt with export fees. One of the district's counties, Roberts County, is at the center of several water marketing plans that would include pumping the underground water out and sending it to areas outside the district.

Since the areas receiving the water would not be subject to district taxes, the new legislation allows export fees so the districts will not lose any tax revenue.

"The export fee section was real important to us," Williams said.

It was important enough that Williams managed not only to shepherd that part of the water bill through the legislature, but he also managed to get a separate bill that dealt exclusively with export fees for his district.

"What happened, the governor's office really didn't want to sign my bill," Williams said. "Their main objection was I cut the deal with CRMWA. The Canadian River Municipal Water

Authority (CRWA), which provides water for

and South Plains including Pampa, agreed to an export fee that was lower than the one his neighbors, operating as Mesa Water Inc. allowed by the water bill. The reasoning, Williams explained, was that about 40 percent of the water CRMWA expects to pump will go to member cities within the district.

Astros fall in 10th inning

HOUSTON (AP) — It's happened so often recently, Los Angeles manager Jim Tracy

expects the Dodgers to rally.

Pinch-hitter Tim Bogar hit a homer in the 10th inning Sunday to give the Dodgers a 9-8 win over Houston in a game the Astros led by five runs.

"It was just a phenomenal performance by our entire baseball team," Tracy said. "After what had taken place here in the first two games of this series, to once again step back up and rally back from five runs down is just unbelievable."

The comeback was the third by the Dodgers in seven days. They beat the Astros with three runs in the bottom of the 12th for a 5-4 victory on May 27. The next night, they trailed Colorado 8-3 before winning 11-10 in 11 innings.

On Sunday, the Dodgers trailed 8-3 before battling back to tie the game on Tom Goodwin's infield RBI single in the eighth inning. Goodwin went a career-high 5-for-5.

Bogar, released in 2000 after four years with the Astros, delivered the first pinch homer of his career and his first hit of the season. He was on the disabled list from April 5 to May 28 with a

strained right hamstring. "I've never done that before," said Bogar, who batted for reliever Mike Fetters with two outs in the 10th. "I'm still not feeling 100 percent, but Tracy is using me in this role. Hopefully, I'll get this pinch-hitting thing down. It's just a good feeling to finally help out this team."

Bogar hit just .207 in 110 games with Houston last season. "I have a lot of friends over there and I had a lot of fun. But I have no regrets about leaving," he said. "It's just nice that I did it for

this team. I really have kind of felt

like dead weight."

Fetters (2-1) pitched 1 1-3 scoreless innings for the win. Jeff Shaw pitched the 10th inning and got his NL-leading 17th save in 18

"Our bullpen was unbelievable. I believe 7 2-3 innings scoreless," Tracy said. "That was the Mike Fetters we had seen prior to (his problems). The big key today was strike one. He was getting the ball over the plate early in the count which opened the plate up for him and allowed him to get to his other pitches."

Octavio Dotel (2-4) threw 1 2-3 innings and gave up Bogar's

Vinny Castilla hit two home runs, including a grand slam, and tied a career high with six RBI as Houston — which had won four straight games — built an 8-3 lead in the third inning.

In the fifth inning, Shawn Green's RBI single and Marquis Grissom's sacrifice fly drew the Dodgers within 8-5.



Supreme Court won't hear racial-profiling complaint four of five in 1985-86.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court refused to revive claims by a women's college basketball coach that Texas police arrested her and two others solely because they are black.

The court's action, taken without comment Monday, rejected arguments from Hampton University coach Patricia Bibbs that Lubbock police engaged in racial profiling when they zeroed in on her, her husband and the team's assistant coach in a Wal-Mart parking lot.

Lower federal courts threw out a \$30 million civil rights lawsuit on grounds that the officers had discretion to make the arrests and were immune from

"The reality is the stop was ordered because (Bibbs and then-assistant coach Vanetta Kelso) were the only blacks the officers saw," when they responded to a call at the store, lawyers for Bibbs wrote in an unsuccessful attempt to win Supreme Court review.

The case began in 1998 when a customer reported that a black woman approached her outside a Wal-Mart store, asking about a lost purse.

Another black woman, this one quite well-dressed, then joined the conversation, the shopper said.

Police suspected the two

women were con artists.

The women were eventually handcuffed, along with Bibbs' husband, Ezil, and held for several hours. Police later said security

tapes from the store showed the Bibbses and Kelso had no contact with the shopper. The three were released, and the mayor apologized for their treatment.

The Bibbses, Kelso and Hampton University sued in federal court, but the case was thrown out before trial in 1999. The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals rued the "unfortunate incident," but upheld the lower court last year.

The case is Bibbs v. Lubbock, 00-1550.
