# McVeigh halts appeals; prepares to die

DENVER (AP) — Ending three weeks of legal turmoil, Timothy McVeigh has halted all further appeals and says he is prepared to die by lethal injection Monday morning for the Oklahoma City

McVeigh's decision, which clears the way for his execution, came Thursday minutes after a three-judge panel of the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals rejected his request for an execution delay.

He could have petitioned for the full appeals court to consider his request, taken the case to the U.S. Supreme Court or asked President Bush for clemency. Instead, McVeigh was prepared to die, said attorney Rob Nigh.

## Execution set for 7 a.m. Monday

"He has family and friends that he must say his goodbyes to, the kind of introspection and psychological preparation he has to go through only he can know and other people in his position can know," Nigh said outside the appeals

At the federal prison in Terre Haute, Ind., McVeigh could be moved as early as Friday from his cell to the execution building, a windowless, two-story brick structure surrounded by a fence topped with barbed wire. He would be the first federal prisoner executed since 1963.

In Oklahoma City, reaction was mixed among bombing victims' relatives and

"It's kind of like a burden lifted off my shoulders," said Paul Howell, whose daughter was killed in the bombing and who plans to witness the execution at the prison in Terre Haute. "I'm going to start preparing myself mentally for it now."

Jannie Coverdale, whose two grandsons were killed, wants McVeigh to remain alive because she does not believe the full truth has been told about the bombing. She plans to begin writing letters next week to Attorney General John Ashcroft, congressmen and McVeigh's attorneys to try to get copies of court doc-

But first she will go to her grandsons'

"I have to tell the boys the bad man is dead and he can't hurt anyone anymore,"

McVeigh was convicted of murder, conspiracy and mass weapons charges in the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. The blast killed 168 people and injured hundreds more.

He had stopped his appeals this year and was preparing for his May 16 execution when the Justice Department announced in early May that nearly 4,500 pages and 11 CDs of FBI material had been found that should have been given to his attorneys before his 1997 trial. Ashcroft ordered the execution delayed to give the defense time to review the mate-

## Texas round up

Baby killed, two other children wounded after abduction

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — A man shot and killed his 3-month-old son, and seriously wounded his 10-year-old daughter and 11-year-old stepdaughter Thursday night after abducting the children from his estranged wife, police said.

Samuel Torres Sr., 33, later died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

Sgt. Jeff Baker said Torres hid in Mary Lou Trujillo's van before she and her three children left a party about three blocks from their home. Torres forced Trujillo from the van and drove away with the children, returning to their home.

Sgt. Scott Farmer said Trujillo called police at 6:58 p.m. Two minutes later, police received calls from

neighbors about shots fired.

Farmer said 10-year-old Ana Isabel Torres ran from the house after the shooting. Her blood remained on the front door of the neighbor's home, where she went for help. She was shot in the head

SWAT teams members lobbed a percussion grenade into the home. Inside they found Samuel Torres Sr., 3-month-old Samuel Torres Jr. and 11year-old Samantha Perez on the floor of the living room. Both children had been shot in the head. Farmer said a medium caliber handgun was used in the shooting.

#### Allison continues to douse Texas

HOUSTON (AP) — The lingering leftovers of Tropical Storm Allison continued to threaten waterlogged East Texas with rain, often in the form of severe thunderstorms.

"We're not out of the woods yet," said Houston Mayor Lee Brown.

Between 5 and 11 inches of rain —remnants of the storm system — soaked southern and southwestern parts of the Houston area early Thursday

Although it's no longer a tropical storm, Allison continues to make its presence known.

The storm's remnants stayed centered around Lake Livingston most of Thursday as it drew moisture from the Gulf of Mexico and deluged the spend \$15 million on general renovations.

No relief was expected on Friday as more rain showers, some possibly heavy, were forecast for Houston as well as cities in the area to the north and south. Most of the area was under a flash flood watch Thursday.

Other cities throughout the area, including Beaumont, reported similar problems as street flooding disabled cars and lapped at doors in hardhit areas.

Prairie View, TSU to get more funds

HOUSTON (AP) — New academic programs and facilities are envisioned at Texas' two historically black public colleges, which will receive about \$50 million more in state funds over the next two years as part of a governmental agreement to address discrimination in the state's higher education system.

The money comes from an agreement then-Gov. George W. Bush signed last year with the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights. The agreement says the state pledges to spend an additional \$385 million on the two schools over 20

If Texas' Legislature funds the expenditures, the federal government has agreed to end a federal review of desegregation in the state's higher education system in 2010. The review began in 1981.

'We're very happy Prairie View is beginning to receive increased funding so we can do a better job and assist Texas in its mission to educate its people," said Prairie View President Charles Hines.

At Texas Southern, a new science building and child-care center are planned as well as an additional wing at the Thurgood Marshall School of

Hines said Prairie View administrators plan a \$26 million architecture and arts building a \$15 million juvenile justice building, a \$12 million electrical engineering facility, and as well as allow it to

noises and people. Prodding the raccoon with a stick, they got the animal out of the barn and "euthanized" it.

Concerned about the abnormal behavior of the animal, the men contacted authorities and submitted the raccoon for rabies testing, said Alexander.

"We're very glad these men contacted the authorities," said Alexander. "Some people could be euthanizing the animals themselves and not notifying authorities." He expressed concern area residents could be killing suspicious acting animals and not reporting it to authorities.

"These animals need to be test-

The number of rabies cases has tripled in the area since last year. In the Panhandle/South Plains Region, eight cases were reported to the Texas Department of Health at this time last year. He said 23 cases of rabies have been confirmed this year during the same time frame.

"The problem is definitely building on us," he said. He said all cases reported in the immediate region in 2001 have been of the skunk rabies variant. Alexander said 21 skunks, one horse and one raccoon have been

reported this year. Statewide there have been approximately 595 confirmed rabies cases since the beginning of 2001. "During 2000, there were 830 reported for the entire year," he said. "We're definitely going to

outdo last year." He said through June 5, 2000, there were 418 cases of rabies reported. "Of those, eight were in this region," he said.

Statewide there were 320 skunks, 29 foxes, 30 bats, two coyotes, six raccoons, 13 dogs, two cats, six cows, three horses, five bobcats, one sheep and one goat.

In Pampa, nine rabies cases have been confirmed since March 23. All rabid animals have been skunks. The skunks have been

In your opinion, who was the greatest "forgiver" of all time? Of all the humans who have ever inhabited the earth, who "forgave" better than everyone else? Most people respond, "Jesus Christ." I would completely agree. But would we really like to be as great a forgiver as Jesus was and is?

What is the secret to being a great "forgiver?" Ephesians 4:32 "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you." Colossians 3:13 "Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you."

The first key to being a great "forgiver" is "being forgiven." How can we extend what we have never experienced? God does not expect us to give an unknown, nebulous, vague gift to others. He gives the gift of forgiveness to us in all of its perfection and fullness and then asks us to extend that wellknown, specific, well-defined gift to others.

I am ashamed to say that I found myself filled with extreme anger within just a few moments which grew into bitterness within a couple of hours. I wish that I could tell you that I always made these kind of choices well, but if I tried to pass that one off as truthful, it would win the "World's Greatest Liar", competition held each year in November at the Bridge Inn in northern

I can't tell you how many times since then I have thanked God for leading me to forgiveness. It surely only happened by the power of the indwelling Holy Spirit. And that evening when I spoke from my heart the things that God had stirred-up in me, I felt like a million dollars and later slept like a baby.

Forgiveness! Try it. Not by your power or your might, but by the power and might of

Genesis 22: 1-2 "God tested Abraham, and said to him ... Take now your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering.

Imagine Abraham's feelings when the Lord told him to offer Isaac as a sacrifice. Think of what went through his mind when they climbed Mount Moriah and Isaac asked, "Where is the lamb?" Yet Abraham had faith that God would provide, and he assured Isaac of his confidence. He was right. God pointed out a ram in the thicket. We didn't lose a day for X-rays."

I can tell you that God's provisions are always greater than our problems!

### Suit says state violated separation law

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The Indiana Civil Liberties Union has filed a lawsuit accusing state officials of giving gambling proceeds to religious groups in violation of the constitutional separation of church and state.

The Build Indiana fund's records show \$50,000 was awarded to a Roman Catholic high school; \$125,000 to a private Catholic college; and \$25,000 to a group in Marion that stages an Easter pageant depicting the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, the civil liberties group said.


The Indiana Constitution prohibits state spending on "any religious or theological institution."

The lawsuit was filed last month in Marion Superior Court. State Rep. Eric Turner, a Marion Republican who obtained the

PARIS (AP) — Jennifer Capriati defeated Martina Hingis in straight sets in the semifinals of the French Open to move within reach of a second consecutive Grand Slam

Capriati, seeded fourth, overwhelmed her top-seeded opponent with powerful groundstrokes to take the match 6-4, 6-3.

She plays Belgium's Kim Clijsters in the final on Saturday.

the reigning Capriati, Australian Open champion, never before had reached the final of the French Open. She became the youngest Grand Slam semifinalist at Roland Garros in 1990 at 14 but had not advanced past the quarterfinals since.

Capriati will be the favorite to take the title when she plays Clijsters, the 12th-seeded player, who became the first Belgian to reach the final of a Grand Slam by beating countrywoman Justine Henin 2-6, 7-5, 6-3.

HOCKEY EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Adam Foote had a goal and two assists and Patrick Roy turned aside a flurry of early New Jersey shots as the Colorado Avalanche prevented the Devils from clinching the cup with a series-tying 4-0 victory.

The Avalanche's dominating effort forced the first Game 7 in the Stanley Cup finals since the New York Rangers beat the Vancouver Canucks in 1994 and only the fourth since 1967.

The Avalanche, also getting goals from Ville Nieminen, Chris Drury and Alex Tanguay, became the first team since the 1964 Toronto Maple Leafs to win a Game 6 on the road when trailing 3-2 in the finals.

DETROIT (AP) — Scotty Bowman, the NHL's winningest coach, is returning to the Detroit Red Wings for his 30th season behind the bench.

There had been speculation that the 67-year-old coach might retire after having knee-replacement surgery and an angioplasty that caused him to miss the early part of the 1998-99 season.

Bowman was named The Sporting News NHL Coach of the Year this season after leading the Red Wings to a 49-20-9-4 regular-season record for 111 points and the Central Division title.

He has coached 2,059 regular-season NHL games, won 1,193 of them and coached 330 Stanley Cup Playoff games with 207 wins. His eight Stanley Cups ties him with Montreal Canadiens legend, and Bowman's mentor, Toe Blake for the all-time record.

# Maybe Lakers' path to finals was too easy

"They've been beating up on everybody, sweeping guys," Iverson said Thursday. 'We've been going through wars every series, every game. I don't know if guys that they were playing were scared of

"I think we're all pinching ourselves this morning, to be honest," 76ers coach Larry Brown said with a straight face in reference to Wednesday night's Game 1 victo-

## College World Series begins today in Omaha

By DENNIS WASZAK Jr. **AP Sports Writer** 

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — The coaches of the eight College World Series teams didn't try to hide their excitement. They were just

happy to be in Omaha.
"This is the pinnacle," said Southern California coach Mike Gillespie, one of nine people to have played and coached in the College World Series. "It's been our experience that it's hard to get here. This is not a given. This is not easy. This is not to be taken for granted. This is special."

First-timers Nebraska and Tulane are trying to remain calm while taking in the experience.

"Our kids have as much preparation as they can have having not been here," Tulane coach Rick Jones said. "But we still have a camcorder club right now. They all want to pull out that camcorder for those first-time pictures. Any time you come for the first time, there are going to be things you haven't prepared for."

Cameras and video recorders were likely to be out in force as President Bush was scheduled to throw out the first pitch in Friday's CWS opener between Stanford (46-16) and Tulane (55-

Opening ceremonies and the home run challenge, won by Northern Iowa's Ryan Brunner, were held Thursday night.

Stanford, which had to win four elimination games during the first two rounds of the NCAA tournament, came into this season without its top three starting pitchers from a year ago and had no seniors on its roster.

"This is probably the biggest surprise that we've ended up in Omaha," coach Mark Marquess said. "It's the youngest team I've ever had in my 25 years at Stanford."

Tulane, the nation's winningest team, spoiled retiring Louisiana State coach Skip Bertman's bid for a sixth national title in 11 years by beating the Tigers in the super regionals.

The second game Friday night pits local favorite Nebraska (50-14) against Cal State-Fullerton (46-16), the tournament's top seed. Huskers fans created a sea of red T-shirts, hats and shorts in the ticket line outside Rosenblatt Stadium on Thursday. Nebraska's campus in Lincoln is located about 50 miles from Omaha, and the Huskers are in the College World Series for the first time in the program's history.

"We get to take this road to Omaha a lot, but it's usually to catch a plane to head south to play," Nebraska coach Dave Van Horn

The Titans, the tournament's top seed, started the season 8-8, but have gone 38-8 since. Right-hander Kirk Saarloos has won 15 straight decisions, struck out 150 and walked just 23 in 144 2-3 innings as the ace of the staff.

"I was kind of wondering if we'd even get to the playoffs," coach George Horton said. "But something happened with this group of young men. They got better, they got confident. But the one constant we've had is very solid pitching.

In Saturday's games, Southern California (44-17) plays Georgia (47-20), and Miami (49-12) takes on Tennessee (46-18).

Georgia coach Ron Polk is just the second coach in NCAA history to bring three schools to the CWS. He brought Georgia Southern to Omaha in 1973, Mississippi State five times and is back in only his second year at Georgia.

Polk retired from coaching after Mississippi State lost in the College World Series in 1997, but was convinced by Georgia's athletic department to give college coaching one more try.

"After we lost here at Omaha, I turned it over to my good friend

Pat McMahon, never dreaming that I would return as an active coach," Polk said. "But lo and behold, this team got here in two years time, not because of what I did, but because I inherited some very fine players who bought into a new plan and a new system."

The Trojans are no strangers to the Omaha. Their 21 appearances rank second to Texas' 28. Right-handers Mark Prior and Rik Currier give USC perhaps the best starting duo in the nation. Prior, the No. 2 pick by the Chicago Cubs in Tuesday's draft, is 14-1 with a 1.50 ERA and has a school and Pac-10 season record

189 strikeouts. Currier is 12-2 with a 2.39 ERA and is the school and conference leader with 444 career strikeouts. Miami enters the CWS riding a 13-game winning streak, longest

among all participants. The Hurricanes lead the country with 215 stolen bases, led by Javy Rodriguez's Division I-leading 66.





### Comptroller cuts revenue estimate by \$18 million

AUSTIN — Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton a decade that Texas Leading Economic Indicators Rylander today reduced the amount of money the Legislature has available to spend in the 2002-03 biennium by \$18 million because lawmakers were unwilling to clarify state tax law.

"The Legislature's failure to pass the tobacco products bill, which would have changed the way the state taxes smokeless tobacco, will cost the state another \$18 million in revenue over the next biennium," Rylander said. "That is money that could have gone to pay for much-needed services in an already tight budget."

She also said she could not increase the revenue estimate because franchise tax returns this past week were right on target and did not exceed the \$1 billion that was expected. As of Saturday, May 19, \$978.5 million had been reported.

"I applaud the accuracy of my revenue estimators, but there are no new dollars," Rylander said. The budget could have been even tighter, Rylander said, but the Legislature is expected to pass S.B. 1689, which clarified state law pertaining to franchise taxation and business loss carryforward. Failure to pass the measure would have resulted in a \$300 million loss of revenue during

In January, Rylander's Biennial Revenue Estimate gave the Legislature \$5.1 billion in new money to spend in the 2002-03 biennium, \$2.9 billion of which was surplus from the current biennium. However, the Legislature has already dipped into that amount when it passed the supplemental appropriations bill that earmarked \$361.2 million of the surplus to pay for higherthan-expected Medicaid and criminal justice

The Legislature could enact other changes in law this session that could further increase or decrease the available revenue.


"As I have said repeatedly, I'm not going to overshoot the runway," Rylander said. "At the beginning of this session, I said lawmakers had tough choices to make. Those tough choices are still there. There is no Christmas in May."
