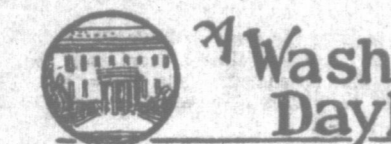

Grundy Admitted to Senate—Status Still in Doubt

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13. (AP)—Joseph R. Grundy, who never had any objection to being termed a lobbyist, today was a member of the senate, privileged to use both vote and voice in advancing the cause which lies closest to his heart—the enactment of high tariff legislation.

A resolution to eject the veteran Pennsylvania politician from the senate seat which he assumed only yesterday awaited disposition by a perplexed senate elections committee, the chairman of which, throughout the debate on Grundy's admittance, repeatedly asked what he was expected to do with the measure.

Appointed by Governor Fisher of Pennsylvania to the seat left vacant by William S. Vare, Grundy received the oath of office last night at dusk.

His qualifications for office were challenged by Senator Kys of North Dakota, an independent Republican, with the introduction of a resolution, but at the close of nearly four hours of debate, the senate, with a thunderous chorus of "ayes," admitted the Pennsylvania to its ranks and sent the Nye proposal to the elections committee.

Christmas Boxes Free With Each Purchase

No Corruption Found in Hidalgo County by Jury

BROWNSVILLE, Dec. 12. (AP)—Investigators of alleged election irregularities in Hidalgo county in November, 1928, apparently were up a blind alley today, with the federal grand jury reporting "no evidence of fraud."

The special grand jury was dismissed yesterday by Federal Judge J. C. Hutcheson of Houston after it had reported to him it found no evidence of fraud in the election.

Scores of witnesses were called before the jury, asked to look into an election which drew the attention of state and National authorities and politicians. Attention was called to the alleged irregularities in Hidalgo by an Independent Republican faction which charged the election was to be "stolen" by Democratic and Republican regulars. This faction asked President Coolidge to intervene, and the request was turned over to the department of justice.

Another development in local politics found a Republican, R. B. Renfro, a relative of Creager, in the Brownsville mayor's chair today. He is the first Republican ever elected in Brownsville.

Filling Places in I. C. C. Gives Hoover Much Trouble

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12. (AP)—President Hoover is finding selection of two Democrats as members of the Interstate Commerce Commission anything but an easy task.

While the consensus of those close to the White House is that Joseph B. Eastman of Boston will be reappointed, strong opposing influences are at work, these including some leaders of the Republican party as well as railroad interests.

The chief executive is fully aware that should he remove Mr. Eastman from the commission his appointee would face formidable opposition in the senate, especially from the Republican Independents of the Northwest who hold the balance of power.

One basis for opposition to the Boston Democrat is that he favors government operation of the carriers and frequently disagrees with his colleagues on matters of major policy. However, close friends of the president say he holds strongly to the opinion that dissenters perform an extremely useful function in Federal affairs.

It seems to be fairly well established that Richard V. Taylor of Mobile, Alabama, will not be reappointed to the commission and there is a real race among Southern Democrats for this place. Every southern state except Louisiana has at least one candidate, and some have several.

Some administration officers look upon A. J. Maxwell, internal revenue commissioner of North Carolina, as the most likely choice, although they insist Mr. Hoover has not definitely made up his mind. Dr. Maxwell, formerly a member of the North Carolina state corporation commission, has many endorsements, including that of Senator Simmons, whose influence was regarded as a potent factor in the Hoover victory in that state in 1928.

MANY POPULAR IDOLS HAVE BEEN FELLEED IN RECENT YEARS. BEN B. LINDSEY, IF HE HAS NOT FALLEN, IS BADLY BENT.

First, Lindsey was ousted as judge of the juvenile court, where he made an international reputation. His companionate marriage arguments cost him many friends, and alienated even some of those whom he had greatly helped by his kindly counsel and great understanding of human tendencies.

There were many, however, who saw in Lindsey's marriage

views sincere efforts to help young people. Attacks upon his integrity were more or less futile.

But now Lindsey has been disbarred by the Supreme Court of Colorado for allegedly taking a fee while acting as judge. "Its sole purpose was revenge" declared Judge Lindsey in a statement issued just after his disbarment.

Judge Lindsey claims that the fee in dispute was a gift in token of appreciation of his advice, and was never intended as a bribe. There is a broad distinction between bribery, as such, and the so-called gift made with no consideration of court action, past or expected.

In reply to the charge that he had acted as attorney while also a judge, Mr. Lindsey replied that he had appeared before the Supreme Court in behalf of many mothers who came before his department.

Lindsey's court was always more than a court; it was an oracle, a welfare office, a place to seek and obtain advice in human tragedies. It was perhaps extra-legal in the sense that Lindsey used powers that abstract statutes did not delegate, but which perhaps should have incorporated. His enemies find him technically, if not morally at fault.

For the benefit of those who trusted him, it is to be hoped that, if he is innocent, he shall be proved so promptly.

BONDS WINS IN SIXTH ROUND ON LOW BLOW

A physician's diagnosis that Cyclone Bonds was hit low in the last of the sixth round, gave him the decision over Luther Platter at the Pampa last night. The fighters had arranged before the fight that if one were hit low he would take his count and remain in the ring to be examined by a physician. Platter gave Bonds' head a severe mauling just before he dropped him in the corner. Scarcely more than a dozen blows landed in the six-round sparring contest between K. O. Kitchens and Pug Grubbs, and Kitchens struck just enough of them to give him a decision over Grubbs. Each took turn about missing the other. Grubbs delivered one good blow during the fight and it closed Kitchens' right eye in the sixth round. K. O. was in the worst shape when the fight ended, but he had hit Pug more times than he had been hit. However, Grubbs' wallop has three times as much punch as Kitchens. K. O. was given the first, fourth and fifth rounds; Pug, the third and sixth, while the second was a draw.

The main event came to an end after Bonds had decisively won five of the six rounds of a scheduled 10-round bout. The Cyclone showed apparent signs of weakening in the fourth round, but he again started the onslaught in the fifth round with such vehemence he dispelled any notions that he was becoming fagged. Platter struck his best blows of the fight just before Bonds sank into the corner for the count. The Cyclone was the aggressor in the fight from the first round and he repeatedly had Platter against the ropes where he did his best to knock him out by way of the solar plexus. However, his blows did very little harm to Platter, who seemed as fresh at the end of the sixth round as at the beginning. In the fifth round Platter took his 'roll of blood from Cyclone's nose, while Luther himself was plenty red at the mouth, nose and forehead. Sammy Squires had effectively whipped Gene Meroney before he was hit low in the second of a four-round fight. Red Michael and Tommy Riley tussled with each other on the mat for 25 exasperating minutes before Doc Denebeim stopped the match, declaring, "they'd wrestle all night." Michael had the upper hand of Riley and executed most of the holds during the match but he was unable to complete any of them for a fall.
