Corpus Christi Caller-Times on victory for free press:

Justices had misgivings about airing of taped phone conversation, but acted correctly in ruling for news organizations

When a newspaper applauds a court decision as a victory for press freedom, there may be a suspicion in some quarters that such expressions of gratification are a bit self-serving.

That's hardly surprising. When such a ruling comes down - and especially when it comes down from the nation's highest court — it makes life easier for those who collect, report, interpret and publish the news.

There is, however, a home truth to which we must cling: When the free press wins a round, it wins not only for itself, but for those it serves.

Such was the case last week when a divided U.S. Supreme Court found the public's right to know should under certain circumstances take precedence over personal privacy.

This case was not a free-press slam-dunk, as indicated by the 6-3 vote on the case. It was shot through with tones of gray rather than stark blacks and whites.

The case came from Pennsylvania, where a cell phone con

versation between two Philadelphia teachers' union officials involved in contentious labor negotiations was intercepted and taped by an unknown party. Copies of that tape found their way to newspapers and radio stations, and were subsequently made public.

The two parties to the call brought suit, claiming the recording of their conversation and the publishing thereof violated the federal wiretap statute. That law criminalizes the release of information gleaned from illegally taped conversations.

It was a tough call. For the majority, Justice John Paul Stevens wrote that the case embodied a clash between "the interest in full and free dissemination of information concerning public issues" and individuals' right to privacy.

Stevens pointed out that the framers of the Constitution could not have anticipated the technologies that made possible the recording of this material. And, he continued, in this instance a finding for the plaintiffs would have imposed "sanctions on the publication of truthful information of public concern.'

This did not, then, represent carte blanche for news operations. It was a close call, and two justices from the majority - Stephen G. Breyer and Sandra Day O'Connor - hinted that had the facts been slightly different, they might have voted the other way.

On balance, though, this was an important victory for the media and the public. At the end of the day, the justice system must be very, very wary of tampering with the free flow of information and the free expression of opinions: That is what the Supreme Court affirmed in an admirable, fairminded decision.

Education can be defined by its content


In all the hoopla and babble about education these days, the single most important point is being completely ignored.

That's content. Education is good or evil depending on the content. An educational system designed to graduate semiliterate, young socialists who are atheistic and hostile to their own country, to capitalism and to liberty is not a system sensible Americans would want their children involved in.

Let's do a bit of clarifying on this subject.

Slate-controlled education is a high priority of every totalitarian state now or in the past. V.I. Lenin said it plainly: "Give me four years to teach the children, and the seed I have sown will never be uprooted." In fact, even democracies and liberal monarchies saw public schools as a means of indoctrinating and training citizens. The point is simply this: Government schools are by design established and run to serve government purposes. These purposes will change as the people who control the government change.

Though France set up the first central education system, the model most admired and adopted in America was the Prussian one. In 19th-century America, there were many bitter battles fought as government-education proponents sought to impose a system incorporating three points: tax-supported, government-controlled, and the absence of all religious instruction.



As opponents of the government school system argued in the 1800s, if you remove Christianity from the schools, then inevitably it will be replaced by the state religion of secular humanism. History has proven them correct.

So it's important to remember that education is not a synonym for the government's educational system. There are many ways to educate children. The government-funded, government-controlled secular system is only one of them.

And whether you wish your children to be a part of that government system should depend on what it is teaching as well as its ability to provide a healthy and safe environment. Good luck trying to find out. Most educational bureaucrats take the position that they are the high priests and that peasant parents should not interfere or ask too many questions. Just supply kids and money and keep your mouth shut.

this government system, I think all who can should withdraw their children and their support from it. I recognize, of course, that with 15,000 separate school districts, there are some government schools that do a good job. My own children attended public schools. Still, the trend is toward even more indoctrination rather than true education, and if I had to start over today, I'd find a way to keep them in private schools.

In 19th-century America, education was targeted, as it ought to be, to fit the needs of the people. There was no need for a young man who intended to be a blacksmith to learn Greek and Latin. He was apprenticed to a blacksmith and taught enough reading and arithmetic to run his business. Franklin received no more than two years of formal schooling, but at an age when Americans today are graduating from high school, Franklin was already successful and well-established in his chosen field.

To pad their own jobs, the government bureaucrats have stretched the length of time required to earn education certificates. A young American today has already wasted nearly a third or more of his life sitting in government institutions before he can even begin his voca-

ZAMBOANGA, Philippines AP) — Muslim rebels claimed Tuesday that they beheaded one of three American hostages and threatened to kill more of their captives on a jungle-covered island despite a concession by the Philippine government. Abu Sabaya, the leader of the Abu Sayyaf separatist group, said the rebels killed Guillermo Sobero, of Corona, Calif., because they doubted the sincerity of a government offer to give in to the single demand they have made during a violent hostage crisis now in its third week. "We've chopped off his head because we ... can see that the government wants to outsmart us with these negotiators. What are we; stupid?" Sabaya said over Radio Mindanao Network. "So we've cut off negotiations. We will call again when we've beheaded another to let them know." Military officials at first expressed doubt that Sabaya was telling the truth. But Chief of Staff Diomedio Villanueva said later Tuesday that military intelligence reports suggested Sobero was killed.
