

# **Chisum: Census** may shift power

#### **By NANCY YOUNG Managing Editor**

A shift of power in Texas politics will soon be taking place, State Representative Warren Chisum told Pampa Rotarians Wednesday.

"There will be more and more of a shift of power to the metropolitan areas from the rural areas with the release of the 2000 census results," he said. "These are changing times in Texas. Hopefully, it is for the better.'

The state representative said rural areas in the state traditionally held the power base until now. Rural residents are moving from small towns to Hartley, and Sherman—gained population in the the more metropolitan areas in search of employment, causing the shift in state and federal representation in Austin and Washington, D.C., he explained.

Chisum lost 25,000 constituents in the 88th District which he represents, according to the census figures releases. Redistricting occurs every 10 years following the release of the figures.

Rural counties are expected to be the losers due to the drastic population decline in the small counties.

Chisum isn't sure just who he will be representing in the next legislative session. Currently, he represents residents of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, Sherman and Wheeler counties.

Most of the eastern Panhandle counties lost population in the 2000 Census figures. Carson, Collingsworth, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Ochiltree, Roberts, and Wheeler.

Five counties— Childress, Dallam, Donley, latest census.

He said there is more than one redistricting plan being considered. Under one plan, Chisum could be representing residents as far east as Vernon and as far south as Abilene, and back to Dalhart in the Texas Panhandle.

A second plan that has been mentioned, he said, could extend his district to Paducah to the New Mexico state line.

## Hospital says patient deaths caused by illness, not flood

HOUSTON (AP)— Six patients at the Houston hospital hardest hit by Tropical Storm Allison's devastating flood waters died either on site while power was out or after being transferred to other facilities.

Officials at Memorial Hermann Hospital at the world-famous Texas Medical Center say those patients - five men and one infant — had illnesses so serious they weren't expected to survive, flood or no flood.

"Their deaths were not unexpected and we are confident that they are not attributable to the flood emergency," James Eastham, Hermann's chief executive officer, said Wednesday.

Allison is blamed for at least 20 deaths, with the cause of an additional death still under investigation, according to the Harris County Medical Examiner's office. About 20,000 homes and 5,000 other buildings in Southeast Texas were damaged, at a cost estimated to reach \$2 billion.

"This is clearly the most expensive, the most devastating disaster we've ever had," said Houston Mayor Lee Brown.

On Saturday, up to a dozen feet of water overwhelmed numerous flood retention doors installed at Hermann in 1999. Emergency generators at ground level weren't flooded, but flood (See DEATHS, Page 3)

## Officials confirm rabies - #10 Nine confirmed rabies within the Pampa city Another rabid skunk found

Rabies cases have reached double-digits in Pampa.

The deadly viral disease was confirmed in a 10th skunk found inside the Pampa city limits on Wednesday. A family dog was euthanized Wednesday because the pet had not received the rables vaccine.

Rabies affects the brain and nerves and is contracted from the bite or scratch of a rabid animal. A person, or another animal, may also be infected by getting a rabid animal's saliva in their eyes, nose, mouth or an open wound.

Animal Control Director Sandy Burns said the latest rabid skunk was killed by the pet cow dog when it entered the yard at the family residence. She said the skunk was dead when Animal Control officers arrived at the residence in the Coronado West Trailer Park, Kentucky and Price Road.

limits have been reported since March 23. The skunks were roaming in the middle of the day. The latest rabid skunk was also out in the middle of the day, said Burns, shortly after noon on June 9.


She reminds citizens it is cause for concern when nocturnal animals are out during daylight hours. Skunks who have been confirmed rabid have not been spraying on most occasions, she said.

The cow dog was euthanized Wednesday after having direct contact with the rabid skunk, said Burns. She said a second cow dog also owned by the family will also be euthanized.

The dogs' owners did not see the second dog have contact with the skunk on June 9, but the owners did not want to take a chance, said Burns. Another suspicious skunk has been sent to the

Texas Department of Health (TDH) laboratory earlier in the week, she said. She expects the testing results to be available in a few days. Burns said Animal Control only sends skunks or other animals to be tested which are extremely suspicious. Local animal control and TDH officials continue

HUNTSVILLE (AP) . Condemned murderer John Wheat apologized for killing three children he occasionally babysat, but insisted in the seconds before he was put to death that their murders in a Troiani, pleaded innocent to the charges on North Texas shooting rampage six years ago was

"I deeply regret what happened," Wheat, 57, said Wednesday evening while strapped to the Texas death chamber gurney. "I did not intentionally or knowingly harm anyone."

He uttered a word in Vietnamese that Texas prison officials said meant, "Let's get out of here," hen coughed and gasped and sputtered as the drugs began taking effect. Eight minutes later, he was pronounced dead.

The former church custodian, the eighth Texas inmate to be put to death this year, was convicted of killing a 20-month-old Fort Worth child, Lacev Anderson, in a shooting spree that also claimed the child's two older siblings, Eddie Ochoa, 8, and Ashley Ochoa, 6.

Four other people also were wounded, including the children's mother, Angela Anderson, and a Fort Worth police officer, Angela Jay.

That left ventilators, heart monitors and other critical equipment without power, forcing staff to evacuate patients to neighbor-ing hospitals, which faced less serious flood problems.

Nurses and other staff used hand-held ventilators to manually help patients breathe including three of the men and the infant who died - while all 540 of Hermann's patients were evacuated. The power outage, which continued Wednesday, forced Hermann to shut down for the first time in its 76-year histo-

Eastham said officials hoped Hermann would at least partially reopen by next week as crews worked to clean up mud and debris left on underground floors.

Three of the men and the infant died at Hermann Saturday within 15 hours of losing power. The other two men died after they were transferred to other hospitals.

Dr. Steve Allen, Hermann medical director, said none of the patients were expected to survive before the flooding. Those who died at Hermann were:

- A 63-year-old man whose condition hadn't improved after undergoing brain surgery for a head injury. Time of death: 3:15 a.m. Saturday.

A 72-year-old man whose lungs and kidneys weren't func-tioning properly because of massive internal infections. Time of death: 6 a.m. Saturday.

- An 88-year-old man with multiple internal organ failure who had been transferred to Hermann from another hospital. Time of death: 3:55 a.m. Saturday.

— A 7-month-old premature twin with underdeveloped lungs whose heart had stopped at least once and who had been hospitalized for six months. Time of death: 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

Allen couldn't say how many patients needed ventilators, but ne said no one was left without help to breathe. "Having enough people to hand ventilate the patients was not an issue," Allen said.

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) -Investigators on Thursday blamed the late Crown Prince Dipendra for the massacre of Nepal's royal family, saying he had drunk whiskey and smoked hashish before gunning down his parents and seven others.

The much-anticipated probe said that just before shooting his said that just before shooting his family, Dipendra spoke several times by mobile phone with the young woman he wanted to marry — but whom his parents, King Birendra and Queen Aiswarya, opposed.

The two-member probe released its report Thursday after Birendra's brother and successor, King Gyanendra, ordered it to provide an explanation for the killings to an outraged Nepalese public.



## CDC: Biotech corn not to blame for allergy attacks

After the CDC began investigating complaints about StarLink, the Food and Drug Administration developed a blood test that could tell whether someone was allergic to the Cry9C protein.

The 17 people who gave blood samples to CDC were among 24 people interviewed by investigators after reporting complaints.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The government has cleared biotech corn as the culprit in a rash of allergy attacks that were reported after discovery of the grain in taco shells spawned nationwide food recalls.

The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said Wednesday its investigation of the complaints "did not find any evidence that hypersensitivity" to a special protein in StarLink corn caused the reactions.

Blood samples were taken from 17 people and tested for sensitivity to the protein, known as Cry9C.

Critics of biotechnology say the CDC investigation was too limited. to conclude that the corn is safe. "This is a small piece of evidence," said Rebecca Goldburg, senior scientist with Environment Defense, an



advocacy group, "It's far from being definitive."

StarLink corn was only supposed to be used for animal feed or industrial purposes because of questions about whether it was a human allergen.

The Cry9C protein breaks down slowly in the digestive system, an indication that it might induce allergic reactions. However, scientists say people would have to be exposed to the protein repeatedly to become sensitive to it.

StarLink is one of several types of corn that have been genetically engineered to produce their own pesticides.

StarLink was withdrawn from the market last year but the grain has contaminated a significant portion of the nation's corn supply.

## Houston company hopes to sail messages, DNA into space

HOUSTON (AP) — California solar sail technology. businessman Dennis Tito paid up to \$20 million for an eight-day trip to space. Now, a Houston-based company can send you - well, part of you anyway — for \$50.

Encounter 2001 is working to build an unmanned spacecraft, fill it with DNA samples and messages from up to 4.5 million people, then blast it beyond the solar system. The company hopes to launch its spacecraft in late 2003.

"This is a chance for people to participate in a real space mission," said Charles Chafer, Encounter 2001 president. "Maybe one day it will be found."

For \$50, people can have their digitized photos and messages as well as hair samples placed on the spacecraft.

Encounter 2001 is the sister company of Celestis Inc., which in April 1997 began using commercial rockets to launch the cremated remains of people into space.

Encounter's spacecraft will be made up of a solar sail the size of a football field and a small container

The spacecraft, to be launched on an Ariane 5 rocket, will orbit Earth for three weeks so ground controllers can conduct system checks.

After the spacecraft leaves Earth orbit, it will deploy its solar sail and begin its journey.

It will take about 15 years for the spacecraft to fly past Pluto, the solar system's outermost planet. When the sailcraft leaves the solar system, it will be traveling at 7.8 miles per second. That compares with the space shuttle's on-orbit speed of 5 miles per second.

The spacecraft's imaging component is scheduled to be tested during space shuttle Endeavour's mission in late November.


Dustin Forney, Celanese right fielder, made a running catch of a line drive for the outstanding defensive play of the game for Celanese.


