Amarillo Man Is Shot to Death by Pioneer Realtor This Morning

John Dees Gives Up and Refuses to Talk

SHOOTING IS IN AN OFFICE

Collapse on Stairway

AMARILLO, Oct. 29. (A)-Shot five times with an automatic pistel. Finis Brown, mechanic, was killed instantly in an office building here today.

John Dees, wealthy pioneer real estate developer, surrendered to police and was lodged in the coun-

Dees refused to make any state-

Tenants of the building, attracted to the corridor by the shots, said they saw Brown run towards a stairway where he collapsed. His body was picked up half way down the stairs where it had rolled.

The shooting in Amarillo today of Finis Brown took place at the Fuqua building on Polk street, the News learned by telephone this afternoon.

John Dees, who surrendered to officers and made no statement other than that Brown had threatened him, was charged with murder and released under \$10,000 bond. No one in the Fugua building heard either man say a word, and the shooting took place soon after Brown went to Dees' office Brown, said to have been unmarried, was about 30 years old and a world war veteran.
