A railroad is regarded as a great boon, in furaishing a quiek meane of travel and transportation, and in bringing, as ic were, a market to the farmers door. This would hold good, if freight rates were cheap, but the cost of transportation often almost or quite equals the returns on shipments made, besides the products of other parts of, the couutry are brought in direct competition with our own and interferes with The home demand, by glutting the market. If a town secures the terminal of a road the beneficial effects are quickly seen in its growth and trade. On the other fland if it avoids the town, and I cuates rival towns of its own it often cuts off the trade of the cuuntry formerly tributary to the old town, anci robs it of its sup purt. Sowe can see that a rail ruad is not âlways a bonanza, tre disadvantages incidental to a r) sad sometimes equals or exceed ute advantages.
Improvement, howeyer, of the public roads is beneficial in any view we may take of it and the benefits accruing from expenditures we may make upon them are sure and certain, and will al"aysexceed the outlay, Improve went of the roads will make transportation to $a=d$ from the railroad easier, quicker and cheaper and travel pleasanter aud safer. It enhances the value of land and makes the country more inviting and hastens its s) utlement and consequent devel. openent. The public road is of almost daily use whilst that of the railroad is comparatively very rare. The value of a bome depends in a great measure upon its accessability to market, church ashool, post office and to the homes of our neighbors. If it is isolated, having no outlet, but surrounded and hemmed in by other farms, it is undesirasle and of but little value. Let us then devote our labor and means unstintingly to the attainment of good roads first and other improvements are sure to follow. Nuw when lands are cheap and bun little improved is the time to make the roads straight as the expense will be light. So long as we neglect our public roads our improvement will be slow aud our neighboring counties will vutstrip in the march of progress.

##  Conctitution Pixing Salarle

House Jomt Resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the state of Texas of a proposed amendmeat of Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the state of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others by members of the Legislature, of free passes, franks, rebates, privileges or udvantages from certain persons and corporations.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That at the next general election uf the 8tate of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Govarnor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Artiole 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall resd as follows:

Sec. 24. The members of the Legislatureshall receive from the public treasury such compensa. tign for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, net exceeding one thousend dollars for the years succeeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of Janusry, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day foreach day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entithed to mileage going to and returning from the seat of goyernment, which mileage shall not exseed three cents per mile, the distence to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regarilless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to esch county seat, now or heresfter to be establiehed, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall te entitled, to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjcurnment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any free trans. portation over any railway line or lines in this State, and any member of the Legislature violat. ing the provisions of this Act

prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, reseive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for them. sélves or any otber person, any free pass, frank, rebate, privilege or adventage not accord ed to the general public from any railrond company, telegraph company, telephnne company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons, firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this State. Any member of the Legisiature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article.

Propesed amendment to the Siato Constitution Authortung the Lovy of a Tax to pay

## surors.

Jourr Rssolution amending seetion 9, of Articie 8, of the Conatitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding filteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.

Sectran 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Artiole 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereatter read as follows:
Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public freeschools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on theone hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy morethan twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1888, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers. water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twen: ty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year. and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads: provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen. cents un the one hundred dollars valuation of the croperty subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessa-1 ry proclamation for spbmitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, ${ }^{1} 1906$, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots. "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voters opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against theamend ment to anthorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Rolating to Cortain Eomptions from Taxation.

Joint Resolution to amend section 2 o Article VIII of the constitution of the state of Texas, relating to certain exemption from taxation.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:
Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to wit:
"All ocoupation taxes shell be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildinge used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and relig. ion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested iu bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to a satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages: that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institution and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting prop erty from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The Governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County offices.
Section 3. The qualiffed electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vots upon this amendment on the - day of —, at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot as follows: "Eor amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation enduwment funds used exclusively for schoul purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Againstamendment to Section 2, Article 8, of the Constitution exempting from taxation encowment funds used exclusively for school purposes, Section 4. The sum of $\$ 5000$
or so much thereof as may be
necessary is hereoy a ppropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of sugh publication, proclamatinn, and election. [A true copy.] O K. Shannon. 101 - Secretary of State.
