"For duye it was a common sight to see these bewildered dogs, hungry and neglected, ri. mainingelose to some pile of ruins looking up to beg whinningly for comfort as some passerby approached. Nearly all re. m ained at their poste without food or drink until privation or soldiers' bullets ended their lives.
"Large numbers of cate al90 perished. Canaries and parrote fared better, Mapy women could be seen during the first few daye carrying nothing but cagee with frightened canaries.
"The sparrows fared not so well. As the fires advance3, a perfect shower of singed and gasping eparrows fell to die amidit the flamee or in the atreete One may go to-day for miles in the midet of the ruins without hearing a single chirrup.
"There was great excitement among the enimale of Golden Gate Park. Deer bounded about, seeking some place where the earth would not shake them. Buffaloes charged on the fences which confined them and the beare sought to beat down the bare
"It was three days before it ocourred to any one that the grizzlies were so fiercely restless because they had not been fed. But relief was furnished for the hungry animale as well as for the human beinge, and today the deer are hearding quietly, the grizalies lie in comfort and the ugly brown buttaloen crouched in their onclosure are chowing their euds in peace."-Our Dumb Animale.

Proposed Aimendment to the state Constitution Relating to Certaln Eemptions from Taxation.

Joint Resolution to amend section 2 of Article VIII of the constitution of the state of Texas, relating to certain exemption frum taxation.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to wit:
"All occupation taxes shell be egual and uniform upon thesame class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persins for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested iu bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or murtgages: that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institution and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting prop erty from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The Governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County offices.
Section 3. The qualiffed electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas ahall vote upon this amendment on the - day of —, at which election all persons favoring said amend--ment shall have written or printed on their ballot as follows: "For amendment to eection 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for sehoul purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 2, Article 8, of the Constitution exempting from taxation encowment funds used exclusively for school purposes., Section 4. The sum of $\$ 5000$
jor so much thereof as may be necessary is hereoy a ppropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamatinn, and election.

After the close of the war with Great Brittain, callod the Revolutionary war, it was seen that a stronger government was necesary than that of the "Articles of Confederation" under which the war had been carried on. Hence the Corstitution was framed and ratified by all the States of the Union. It was adopted as the foundation, upon Which a federal government should be establshed. It was long regarded a3 the embodiment of wisdom and statesmanship, and respected and revered almust as a sacred instrument. It has been jealously guarded and strictly adhered to, and any departure from it has been condemned as a menace to the rights and liherties of the people, Of late years our law makers seem to have regarded it with but little respect or veneration, and of no binding force in cases whera expedieney or commercial advantag were at stake. That instrument declares that all law rests upon the consent of the goveraed In express violation of this clause we set up a government over the Phillipines of our own choice, and in the making of which they had no voice, and we made them our subjecte, and still we claim that ours is a Republican form of government. Having cut loose the cables that bind us to the Constitution, we are steadily, but surely drifting towards Imperialism. Following in the foot steps of the monarchies of Europe, we are holding a conquered people in subjection by military foree, and exploiting the subjugated country, for our own gain. We have a country so situated, and so rich in resources as to almost defy invasion, and yet, we keep our army and navy on a war footing, in a time of profound peace, at an enormous expense, The simplicity of our Republican government, as compared to the extravagancee of the despotisms of Europe, are no longer in such striking contrast. The rule of economy in the administration of public affairs has been deliberate. ly laid aside, and the people's money is spent with a lavish hund The expense of the last administration foots up to the enormous sum of two billion dollars, more than double that of any previuus administration. It is recorded in history that more internal improvements were inaugurated

during the administration of J . $Q$, Adams than in any previous one. Among these were three canals, and the appropriations for that purpose bnly amounted to $\$ 17,000,000$.
An allowance of $\$ 25,000$ per annum has been allowed the president, for traveling expenses, although the Cunstitution express ly forbids any increase of salary during a presidents term of office It is said that his salary and allowances now, aggregate $\$ 325,000$, The reply of Waehington, when notified of his appointment as commander in chief of the army, at a monthly salary of $\$ 500$, contrasts strangely with the action of public offioials of the present age. "I beg leave to assure the Congressthat as no pecuniary consideration could have tempted meto accept this arduous employ. ment, at the expense of my domestic happiness, I do not wish to make any profit from it. I will keep an exact account of my expences. Those I doubt not, they will discharge; and that is all I desire."
Jefferson requested that the ceremonies of his inauguration ohould be few and simple, and it is related of him, that "his dresa on that occasion was of plain cloth and that he rode on horseback to the Capitol, dismounted without assistance, and hitc his horse to the palisades." By the practice of self danial
and submitting to the most rig. orous discipline, hardships and privations, the Romans became a nation of hardy warriors and conquerors of the World. But when they exchanged a life of simplicity and self sacrifice for one of luxury and ease, its military power was weakened and the destruction of the empire soon followed. So the stability of our government depends upon an honest and economical administration of affairs.

House Joint Resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of the peopleot the state of Teras of a proposed amend ment of Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the state of Texas, fixing the salaries and mileage of members of the Legislature, and preventing the acceptance, for themselves or for others, by members of the Legislature, of free passes, franks, rebate, privileges or advantages from certain'persons and corporations.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That at the next genersl election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Govarint for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Seccion 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intendad to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, 80 that the said Section shall read as follows:
Sec. 24. The members of the Legislatureshall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, net exceeding one thousend dollars for the years slicceeding their election, payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the jear succeeding their election, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exseed three cents, per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regarilless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances'to each county seat, now or hereafter to be establiehed, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall le entitled to mileage for any extra session

Jonst Resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the levying of a tax of not exceeding fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, to pay jurors.
Seciron 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:
Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on theone hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy morethan twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges, and not. exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets; sewers. water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twen-ty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads : provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents un the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.
Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, ${ }^{4} 1906$, at which elec tion all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots. "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voters opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amend ment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."
