Energy Crisis Bringing 'Bitter' Policy Struggles

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Nixon's energy adviser, John A. Love, and his deputy have both resigned in an apparently bitter bureaucratic strugle over how to deal with the energy crisis.

The administration was expected to announce today formation of a new federal energy administration to take charge of its energy programs. It will be headed by William E. Simon, now deputy secretary of the Treasury.

Love's supporters privately told newsmen the former Colorado governor lost out in a power struggle with Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz. They said Love favored immediate gasoline rationing but Shultz did not-and Shultz

One Love backer said attempts were made "to muzzle Love" and that the plan for the new agency was put together "behind Love's back." Shultz's supporters said rationing wasn't the

issue. One official said Simon was chosen for the new agency because Love wasn't "getting action" and "just didn't do the job. Resignations Become Final

Resignations of Love and his deputy, Charles G. DiBona, became final Monday after several days of reports they were in the works. President Nixon accepted Love's resignation saying Love "has done an outstanding job under difficult circumstances.

Sources said Love was offered a post within the

Canada. But Love, who resigned as Colorado governor last July to become Nixon's "energy czar," said he will return to his home state and practice law.

He said in a statement: "I fully agree that the time has come for creation of a new structure to deal with the energy crisis." He told CBS news: "I'm wishing Mr. Simon well." In a more revealing interview copyrighted in the Denver Post, he said of his troubles: "To be honest, it's been difficult to try to do anything meaningful and even get the attention of the President.

Isolated Reports -The Agriculture Department said it has received isolated reports of farmers running out of diesel fuel or gasoline for brief periods in California, Texas, Nebraska, Tennessee, Alabama, Louisiana, Florida, South Carolina

The House Commerce Committee, which is studying emergency fuels legislation, debated for two hours whether to ban gasoline for school buses used for desegregation, then postponed a vote on that indefinitely.

Liberals Abandon **Efforts**

Faced with a filibuster they could not break. Senate liberals have abandoned efforts to pass legislation this year to finance presidential elections from the public treasury.

Given assurances that the issue would come to a vote early next year, they allowed the campaign spending amendment to be stripped from a bill increasing the limit on the national debt to \$475.7 billion.

President Nixon then quickly signed the debt bill into law, averting a fiscal crisis that had threatened to leave the government unable to pay its debts or its employes after Thursday.

A filibuster by Sen. James B. Allen, D-Ala., aimed at killing the campaign spending measure had allowed the debt ceiling to fall automatically Friday from its old level of \$465 billion to \$400 billion. This left the government legally overdrawn and unable to borrow money.

The liberals gave up after they failed for a second time to invoke cloture and cut off the Communists last month. debate. A Sunday vote fell seven Government troops have since was 49 to 39 in favor of halting the filibuster-10 votes shy of the necessary two-thirds

majority. A motion by Allen to drop the campaign spending amendment from the debt bill then failed by only one vote-42 to 43-making it clear that the liberals were

A compromise was then arranged in which Rules Committee Chairman Howard Cannon, D-Nev., promised to report out a campaign spending bill within 30 days after the Senate convenes next year Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott, R-Pa., a co-sponsor of the campaign reform bill. then re-offered the Allen motion which then carried 48 to 36.

"We are not hurting each other so much as we are hurting the country," Scott said.

The vote was a victory for Allen and for the White House and conservative Republicans who had supported him. It was a decided defeat for Sens. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass. Russell Long, D-La.; Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., and Walter Mondale, D-Minn, who led the fight for the amendment

Egypt warned Monday it will not participate in the Geneva talks unless Israeli troops withdraw to the Oct. 22 ceasefire lines before the meeting begins. Israel wants to put off serious negotiations until after its Dec. 31 elections.

Pioneer 10 Heads Past Big Jupiter

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (UPI) - Pioneer 10, with a narrow escape from Jupiter's deadly radiation belt, soared away from the giant planet today, transmitting information which could shed light on the creation of the solar system.

The 570-pound, unmanned spacecraft accomplished an historic rendezvous the Jupiter Monday night after a 21-month 620 million-mile space odyssey Pioneer reached its target point 81,000 miles above the planet and then swerved away to continue its voyage

Scientists at the Ames Research Center of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the closer Pioneer got to Jupiter the stronger the radiation belt became and the craft pulled away just in time. A spokesman said it had passed to a point of "near saturation" with radiation

The radiation levels were hundreds of times stronger than could be tolerated by man. And scientists had said there was danger it could damage or ruin Pioneer

Tire \$50 million craft approached the planet at 68,000 miles per hour and, at one point, reached 82,000 m.p.h. The speeds were faster than any

Maid, Manager Claim Money Found In Room

AUSTIN (UPI)- Esther Marie Bellard, a \$52.50 a week motel maid, found \$10,000 in hundred dollar bills in a cellophane bag beneath a mattress in a room she was cleaning last month

She turned the money over to the motel manager who called

Now both the maid and the manager have claimed the money and assistant city attorney Jerry Harris says there may still be others who want to claim it although the last persons to occupy the motel room said they knew nothing about it

Harris turned the money over to a district court Monday and said a judge will decide who gets the money two days before Christmas. At this time we only know of

two possible claimants," Harris said. "We told the court about these two possible claims on the money, and we're not in a position to determine who has a right to the money: Those people will be notified, and they may come in and tell the court why they think they should have a right to the money, or they may disclaim it.

We have had no one contact us stating that they were the true owner of the money. If nothing else happens, someone will have to decide who has the right to possession.

After passing Jupiter, Pioneer headed into the planet's shadow, using Jupiter's gravity for a "slingshot effect" boost to propel itself.

Pioneer sent back thousands of pieces of data which scientists will study in hopes of learning more about the creation of the solar system and the earth itself.

President Nixon wired Mission Control saying Pioneer 'has demonstrated that man's ability to explore the heavens is on the threshold of the infinite."

Tom Hehrels, a University of Arizona scientist who helped in the design of Pioneer's 10 instruments, said the craft took a final picture of Jupiter's mysterious "red spot" and this showed it to be "a towering cloud mass." But other members of Mission Control said the spot might be a giant shadow created by the clouds surrounding the planet.

Pioneer's speed was dropping steadily today as it continued its voyage. Latest reports showed it to be traveling 25,000 m.p.h. Pioneer will cross the orbits of Saturn, Neptune, Uranus and Pluto before finally escaping the solar system in 1986. Its

radio will die in 1977. Other information from the spacecraft will be used to shape the voyage of its sister ship, Pioneer 11, which in August entered the dangerous asteroid

When Pioneer 10 leaves the solar system, it will travel in space for eternity.

Ceausescu Visits USA

WASHINGTON (UPI) -President Nixon plans to discuss the oil crisis and Mideast situation during meetings here with Romanian President Nicolae Ceausescu. according to administration Ceausescu arrived late Mon-

day and spent the night at Camp David. Nixon planned to receive him formally at the White House this morning.

Ceausescu seeks stronger economic ties, including joint ventures with American petrochemical and manufacturing firms, to finance a foreign policy independent of the Soviet Union, according to Romanian sources. He also wants most favored nation trade status for The meetings between Nixon

and Ceausescu occur at a time when there are reports Romania might increase its oil exports to the United States from 200,000 to 700,000 tons annually

U.S. officials believe Romania, one of the few East European countries to recognize Israel, has a balanced Mideast policy. Ceausescu officially received Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban last month. On his way here he visited Algeria, scene of a recent Arab chiefs of state meeting

Besides meeting Nixon, Ceausescu will confer with Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger who is scheduled to leave Saturday on a European and Mideast tour

On Wednesday the Romanian leader will confer with Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz and Commerce Secretary Frederick B. Dent and congressional leaders.

During his weeklong U.S. visit. Ceausescu will visit the General Electric Nuclear Center in Wilmington, N.C., and meet American businessmen in Cleveland, Houston, New Orleans, Cape Canaveral, Hartford, and New York.



"Texas is a vast wasteland in mushroom literature," Michael D. Ellis, director of the University of Texas Poison Control center, said Monday. "Even if the mushrooms here

'Hot Spots' HOUSTON (UPI) - The Skylab 3 astronauts help mankind's search for new sources of energy today taking pictures of so called "hot spots" during a photographic sweep of

the American Southwest. Flight controllers had to determine how much stabilization gas that keeps the lab steady in orbit would be used to accurately photograph the targets before approving today's

Gerald P. Carr, Edward G. Gibson and William R. Pogue also tested their ability to live in zero gravity.

Two picture-taking sweeps across the United States Monday used up 22 per cent more of the vital stabilizing gas than expected. A photo pass Sunday took almost four times as much fuel as planned so controllers think they're learning how to manage its usage. Today's photo targets includ-

Ellis said teen-agers have learned that mushrooms that produce hallucinogenic effects grow in cow or horse manure and turn blue or purple if their caps or stems are buised.

"That's a true statement," he said. "But it's also true that about 90 varieties or more are deadly poison.

He said six youths from Dickinson and Hitchcock were hospitalized during the last few months because they ate poisoned mushrooms. Three of them came in the

same night," he said. "They all recovered, but they were mighty sick. He said the most recent vic-

tim of poisoned mushrooms was a 19-year-old youth admitted to a Galveston hospital last week. 'He said a friend of his brewed some mushroom tea,'

Ellis said. "He's in one of our

psychiatric units, hallucinating badly and very sick. "All we can do is induce vomiting, flush out his stomach and hope for the best," he said. "We don't know what kind of mushroom he got hold of."

Ellis said three of the six youths reported buying mushrooms from a seller in "the Alvin-Angleton area.

A problem in treatment is that doctors must be able to identify what kind of mushroom was consumed before treatment can begin. Ellis said it took two days to identify the mushroom eaten by a Houston girl admitted to the hospital last week.

'We had to grow spores from it to definitely identify it and found it was toxic but not deadly." Ellis said.

TV In Review

By RICK DU BROW HOLLYWOOD (UPI) + Remember the old radio quiz shows when contestants would get a burst of audience applause if they said they were from Brooklyn?

As I recall, there would be the same kind of audience applause complete with cheers, whistles and hurrahs-if contestants said they were from

Those were the days when Hollywood still depicted New York City as the glamorous epitome of success ("This town can be yours, kid, if you play ball'). The National League went as far west as St. Louis. Brooklyn had a zany baseball team, now domesticated in Los Angeles as part of the smoothly respectable suburban atmos-

In those radio heydays, Hollywood's outlook also had much more in common with Texas-style tradition than it doestoday

At any rate, the Brooklyn-Texe; axis was a formidable one imposed by the entertainment media on the national mentality. Maybe it was partly because many Hollywood writers had migrated west from New York. And maybe it was partly because the controlling Business: Seasonal Operated Hollywood echelon at that time of booming movietown success felt a certain camaraderie with the larger-than-life image that Texas seemed to project through its disciples, its wealth and its tales of the Old West.

The western has been Hollywood's major staple over the years, and no place is more identified with cowboy films

Now, I'm getting around to something about television today, so bear with me for another moment. I have an image fixed in my mind that in those so-called golden days of filmtown there were plenty of skinny, pale guys with eyeglasses from New York sitting in cramped little offices in Hollywood turning out, on order, horse operas set in

And then there were those movies at the time about World War II, with Hollywood's composition of an infantry unit invariably predictable. I mean, it seemed that in almost every infantry unit there was a colorful guy from Brooklyn and a colorful guy from Texas. We all knew who won World War II for us-John Wayne and 12 other guys from Brooklyn and Texas, right?

All right. 1973. The country is a lot more sophisticated. And a lot of attitudes have changed. But every Monday night on television during the fall, there is an enormously successful approximation of the old Brooklyn-Texas axis that proves the magic of that tandem still has show business

clout, and that its appeal still is imbedded deep in the national psyche. I am talking about the two colorful star announcers of ABC-TV's Monday pro football games-Howard Cosell, who has a Brooklyn flavor, and Don Meredith, with his Texas-style

Cosell, the Erich Von Stroheim of sportscasting, is without question the overriding star of the Monday football video outings. In fact, ABC-TV just recently gave him eight 90-minute shows on its latenight "Wide World of Entertainment" series in 1974: When he appeared on that series as the target of a banquet comedy "roast" earlier this year, the program earned remarkably high ratings.

And the latest national ratings indicate the audience pull of the Monday games and the commentary team of Cosell and Meredith, along with playby-play man Frank Gifford. For in the rankings of programs for the week ending Nov. 25, the ABC-TV gridiron contest between Minnesota and Atlanta came in a somewhat startling fifth among all listed telecasts. That is nothing less than a super rating for a weekly sports

It's true, of course, that the audience pull of ABC-TV's Monday football games varies with the quality of the teams involved and the importance and excitement of the contests. And it's also true that you can interpret the Cosell-Meredith repartee as simply a unique variation on the old crowdpleasing matchup of the fancytalking city boy and the sardonic, understated country

Observers of human action will have an excellent opportunity to examine one of the principal weaknesses of political government during the days ahead as we try to cope with fuel and energy shortages.

The greatest problem. created by the fact that politicians have power over so many aspects of individual life. is that uncertainty exists as to which way they will act. In some industries already.

there is panic. Plans for expansion have been shelved and cutbacks have been ordered or are at least being contemplated

We are fully aware that there is no such thing as complete security in one's job or business, and that a wise course of action always is to have some contingency plans

The natural action of the market place makes it possible for individuals and businesses to move in different directions from time to time when there is a disruption in their individual economy. This is true because there seldom is a wholesale collarse of all the economy or ever .. great portion of it.

But because political government can move against all business and all workers in a single piece of legislation of bureaucratic edict, it can be easily seen that a disruption of normal activity would be of such magnitude as to create a wholesale depression.

The fact that panic and uncertainty exist can be measured by the activity of the stock market in recent days as those investors in businesses more quickly affected by fuel and energy crises attempt to salvage some of their capital.

WARNING TO CASTRO Despite continuing attempts by left - siders around the world to portray Chile's Marxist former president, Salvador Allende, as a martyr for "democracy." the facts that are emerging from his overthrow in Chile and the new political alignments resulting from it are changing Fidel Castro from guerrilla aggressor to one whose own power is seriously There can now be no

reasonable doubt that Castro was working with Allende to make Chile a virtual carbon copy of his own wasted. tyrannized and suffering nation. Cuban officers manned the defenses around Allende's residence, where guerrilla schools graduated 150 revolutionaries every three months. Shortly before Allende's overthrow, Castro's chief of intelligence. Manuel 'Red Beard' Pineiro, who happens to be a graduate of Columbia University, went to Chile to make final plans for the complete communist takeover. The present Chilean government estimates that the Red takeover would have come within one or two months had the military not moved first.

As a result of these, revelations, most Latin American nations are finally turning a cold shoulder to Castro. Few are any longer called for diplomatic recognition of communist Cuba. Most significantly, there are reports that Cuba's new professional army, though communist - armed and trained, has been impressed by what their fellow soldiers in Chile did. Chile's military men are said to have planted some of the seeds of their own courageous independence among the Cuban officers. Castro may have lost more than a new conquest in the fall of Allende. It could lead to his own overthrow. There are brave men in Cuba who will not endure communist slavery

And in his closet is an oversized Icelandic sweater The ex-Marine, who is President Nixon's globe . trotting braintruster, puts more faith in the sweater than in the document

The Treasury study is characteristic of the hysteria now sweeping the nation terrorized by reports of gas gaps, oil shortages and petroleum products scarcities. So help me, one bright governmental chap said the other day there'll be so much unemployment, there'll be riots, rebellion and mobilized troops in the streets because of looming crunches and oblessness

The confidential staff report to Shultz sees a possible 7 to 9 million unemployed by 1975. Its author predicts the Arab oil boycott will run well over a year. Another federal official opines three years. The memorandum sees no relief not enough available coal, nor land on which to pile it, nor money sufficiently economical to reconvert boilers to coal, nor even stokers, no longer produced in the U.S.

So it goes everywhere - or paper. Hysteria has bred hoarding. Fuel black marketeers have shown up in and around Kansas City, Mo., it is reported. Responsible executives of heavy industries have been forced to warn that, for example, some 60,000 jobs will be lost in the steel industry if it is held down to the fuel level of 1972. The heavy construction contractors are complaining of lack of propane gas and diesel

But a hard-nosed count I've made with the aid of veteran government specialists indicates that there are fewer than 25,000 now jobless or temporarily laid off across the U.S. for lack of fuel.

There is no solid information on the oil and gas gap - induced unemployment. There is one solid figure - some 86 million people are working.



Watergate: odds are we'll never know

WASHINGTON (NEA) -The magic Watergate words these days are "full disclosure." Top Republicans say if President Nixon will just give them and. the nation an open accounting. he can begin to regain credibility and get on with the job. But they are asking for Mars.

In all gravity, it has to be said that there is no likelihood the President will offer Republicans or anybody else anything approaching full disclosure, and very probably no way the courts, the Senate, the special prosecutor or any other agency can extract it There was a time when many

Americans, including some sophisticated inquisitors. thought the celebrated White House tapes would provide the basis for a pretty accurate determination of Watergate and coverup events. They were understood to be a nearly complete record of what the President and his key aides said and did about the scandals.

Today, even before U.S. Judge John Sirica and his battery of electronic experts have heard a line of taped conversation, it is fair to say they are compromised and discredited

By White House word, we know they are incomplete, not covering key conversations and thus incapable of clearing up serious conflicts of testimony before the Ervin Committee.

We have been told, too, that portions of conversations are unaccountably missing, that other parts are inaudible, etc.

Beyond the tape matter, we have been further informed that certain backup materials (like the President's alleged dictated recollection of his June 20 telephone chat with former Attorney General John Mitchell) are not to be found.

Furthermore, no one has in fact impeached the word of former special prosecutor Archibald Cox that important documentary evidence pertaining to key Nixon aides was not turned over to investigators with the aides' files but sluiced out and tucked securely in the President's privileged files.

On top of all this, we have from Mr. Nixon himself a long series of public and private but partly leaked utterances on subjects ranging from the Watergate break-in to the coverup, the milk fund deal, the financial aspects of his house purchases, which taken together comprise the most mystifying melange of 'explanatory facts' ever offered the public in defense of the conduct of so high a public official

The Ervin committee has computerized all of its lengthy testimony, and can presumably pinpoint conflicts almost instantly. It is highly doubtful if there exists anywhere, however, a complete "central bank" of testimony and utterances from which diligent investigators could at least make a chart of the known, the unknown, and the conflicting aspects of Watergate.

It is dream stuff, then, to imagine that the President, for his own gain and that of worried Republicans (not to mention the country), is going to stir this weird brew of baffling ingredients and come up with a
