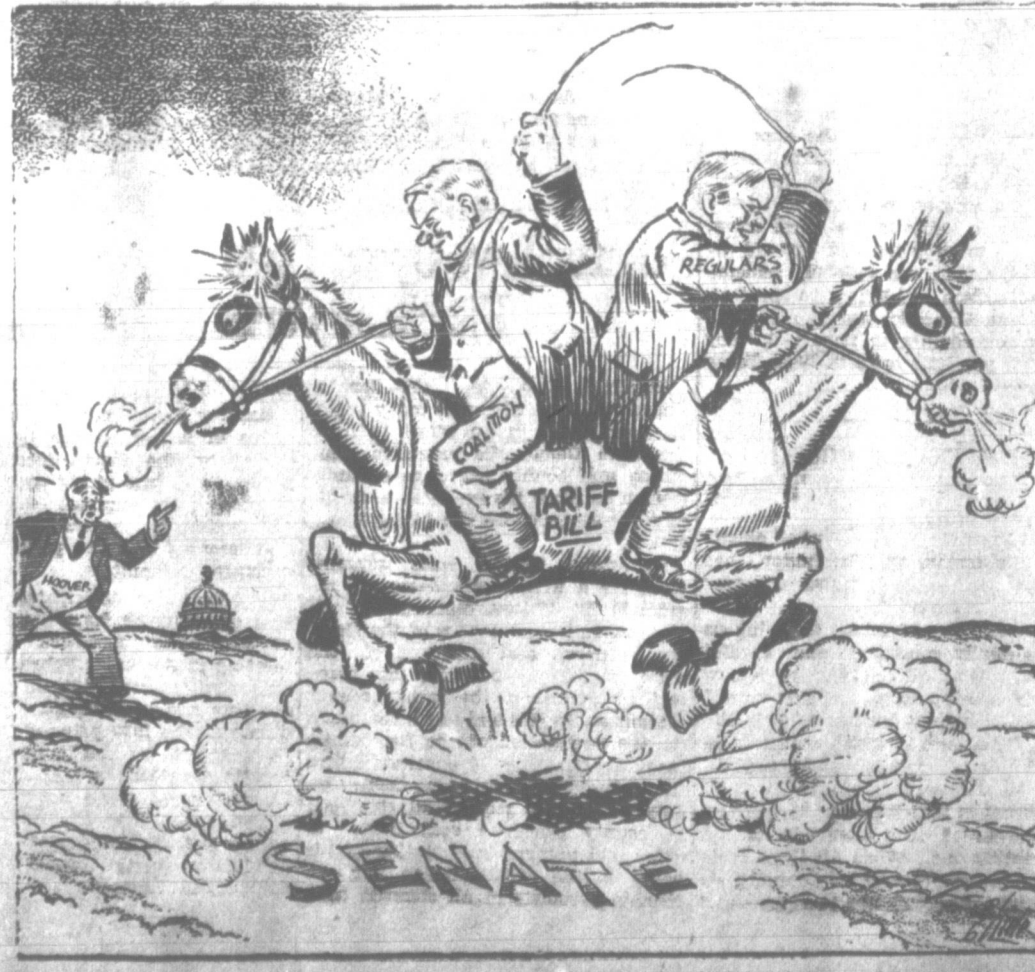

# With District Staff Complete, Federation President Directs Attention to Convention Plans

SNYDER, Texas, Feb. 20.—It is neither a small honor nor a small task to function as president of the Seventh District of Texas Federation of Women's clubs. Mrs. J. T. Whitmore has been quite busy these opening months of her administration selecting capable women and those peculiarly fitted for the lines of work which have been assigned them, exercising care to introduce new material wherever practicable and to give representation to every part of the district.

Seventh District, with its forty-nine counties, outnumbers them all. It takes in the Panhandle section of the state and extends southward to the tier of counties which Soury is one, as its southern boundary.

The district meeting will be held in Pampa on April 23, 24, and 25. Mrs. Whitmore will leave for that place tomorrow to plan, with the ladies of Pampa, for this meeting. While on this trip she will visit Amarillo and other neighboring towns, where she has speaking dates.

Mrs. Whitmore is stressing the importance of law observance and the organizing of junior clubs. It is also her aim to organize many new clubs and bring them into the Federation during her two-year term of office. Eight counties in the district do not now have representation in the federation.

 tend school will further increase the enrollment by 250, based on figures taken from the last school census report.  
 May Use Auditorium  
 "It is very doubtful if we'll have enough room next year. It is possible that we won't be able to lend the auditorium to anybody next year—we may have to use it for school rooms," the superintendent stated. "The new additions and the new ward bulking may take care of the increase next year but that's all," he said.  
 Mr. Fisher said that the enrollment on the central campus at present, including the enrollment of the Lamar, Central high and Junior high schools, is 1,400. The other three ward schools have a total enrollment of 1,000. He pointed out that there is now no playground space on the central campus as

all the space is taken up with cottages and bus sheds.  
 The Baker school has 14 teachers and a principal, one new teacher being added the other day. A primary grade is being taught in the office. "We may be teaching in the yard before the school year is over," he said.  
 The Lamar school has 13 teachers and a principal.  
 The East ward school has eight teachers and a principal, the West ward school, 18 teachers and a principal, the Junior high, 16 teachers and a principal, the central high, 23 teachers and 500 pupils, Kingsmill, two teachers and 50 pupils, Hoover, one teacher and 17 pupils, the negro school, one teacher and 15 pupils.  
 Mr. Buckler said that in calling the board issue, the school board had in mind to move the frame buildings from the central campus and to take the pupils out of the Lamar building, using it for music, etc.  
 Another purpose in calling the election was to move the small children from the central campus, on account of the present congestion and the traffic. He said that should the bonds be voted, no pupils under the fifth grade would attend school at the central group.  
 The board proposes to add six rooms to Baker school, two each on west and east ward, build a new building in the north part of town with not less than ten rooms, and add 12 rooms to the high school building.  
 He said the present valuation of this district is \$5 million dollars with a bonded indebtedness of \$374,000. The increase in valuation of buildings and all property would care for the bonds and the interest, with \$9,000 annually for maintenance. The board does not propose to increase the valuation of farm land, he said.
