Byrd Being Sure of Rescue—Danger Is Not Yet Real

NEW YORK, Jan. 24. (AP)—Captain H. H. Bailey, personal representative of Admiral Richard E. Byrd, today said that although an ice pack barred ships of the expedition from reaching the base on the Antarctic ice barrier, Admiral Byrd and his men faced no immediate food shortage.

While it is true that the expedition is not fully equipped to spend another winter in the Antarctic, there is no immediate shortage of the food supply.

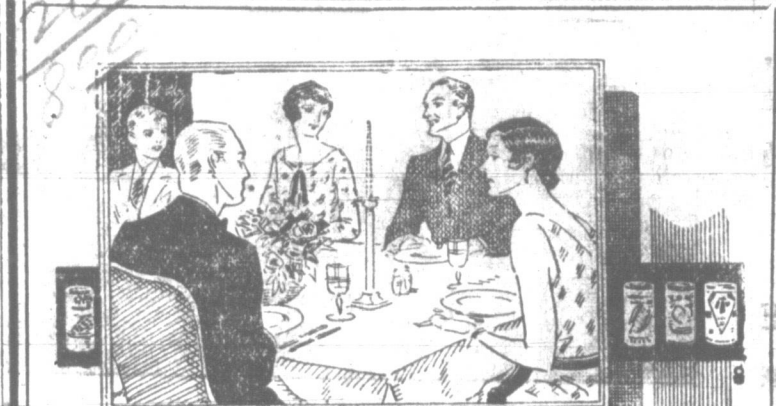

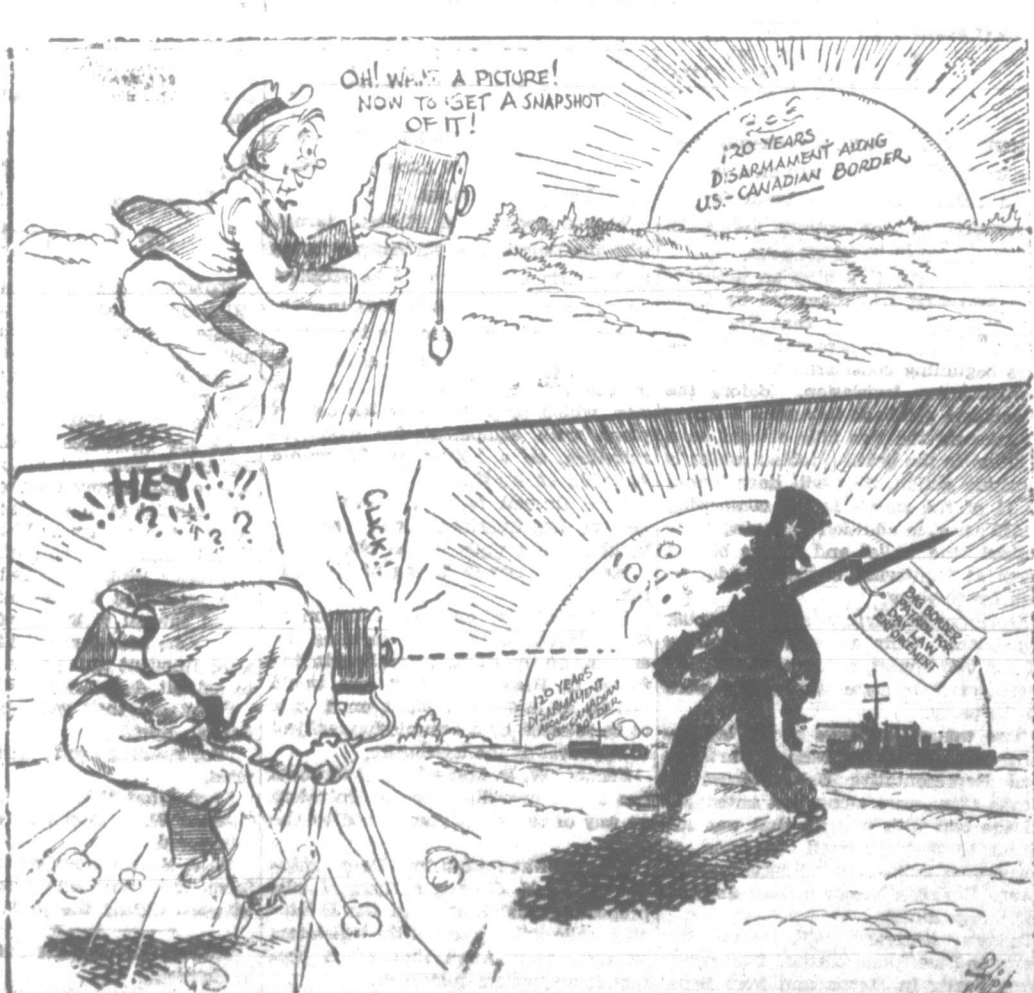

Planes to Carry Food to Stricken Folk in Flood

VINCENNES, Ind., Jan. 24. (AP)—Plans for carrying supplies by airplane to flood-marooned families in Griffin, Ind., and other Southern Indiana communities went forward today, while a seven mile ice gorge at Riverton, north of here, presented a new threat to that community.

Giant Searchlight Spots Rum Runners

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 24. (AP)—A 2,500,000 candle power searchlight installed by the local coast guard glares forth a new defiance to rum smugglers.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 24. (AP)—Rescue crews began hacking their way through frozen flood waters in Northeast Arkansas today in an effort to bring relief to 200 cold and hungry families marooned in the Big Lake area.

In boats built to battle the floods of the stricken region, rescuers pushed slowly forward through openings made in the ice with axes. Food, medicine and fuel were aboard.

Only ten such lights would be required to place one to each mile from the mouth of the Niagara river to Grand Island, Lieutenant M. W. Rasmussen, coastguard commandant, explained. This would permit coast guardsmen to spot liquor boats over a ten-mile stretch in a territory where most of the liquor smuggling is now conducted.

Although the situation was most acute in the Big Lake area where ten levees broke and flooded thousands of acres, it continued serious down the St. Francis river basin where hundreds of livestock froze to death or drowned.

Can't Agree on Recount WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP)—After an extended executive session today the house elections committee considering the Harry M. Wurzbach-Augustus McCloskey contest for the seat from the fourteenth Texas district, failed to agree on whether the ballots would be counted.

Negro Woman Electrocutted MONTGOMERY, Ala., Jan. 24. (AP)—Silena Gilmore, negro, first woman to be electrocuted in Alabama, was put to death in the electric chair at Kilby prison today. The woman was convicted in Jefferson county for the murder of Horace Johnson, Birmingham restaurant operator, last June. She shot him when he requested her to leave his restaurant.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP)—After declining twice to approve tariffs on hides above the 10 per cent ad valorem duty carried in the Hawley-Smoot bill the senate today voted to keep hides, leather and shoes on the free list.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP)—The house today adopted the Parker resolution authorizing the interstate commerce committee to investigate railroad holding companies.

TAX COLLECTIONS BIGGER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP)—An increase of \$189,264,985 in taxes collected by the government in the first six months of the fiscal year as compared with the first half of the 1929 fiscal year was shown today in figures announced by the internal revenue bureau.

FAVOR MORE ROAD AID

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24. (AP)—The house bill proposing an increase in the annual federal appropriation for road building from \$75,000,000 to \$125,000,000 for the next three years was reported favorably to the senate today by its post roads committee.

OUTLIVED HIS CHILDREN

ADA, Okla., Jan. 24. (AP)—The body of J. C. Hill, who died near here Wednesday at the age of 102, was sent to Slidell, Texas, for burial. Having outlived his children, he had made his home in recent years with grandchildren. Hill, native of Tennessee, spent most of his life in Texas and Oklahoma.

Birthday to Mean Less to William II on Next Monday

DOORN, Holland, Jan. 24. (AP)—The seventy-first birthday anniversary of William II, former German emperor, on Monday, promises to be a quiet one compared with that of a year ago. Then on the occasion there gathered at Doorn the largest aggregation of Hohenzollerns seen together in one place since the fall of the German monarchy.

Few of the more distant relatives are expected this year. As usual, former Crown Prince William has arranged to come. He probably will be accompanied by former Crown Princess Cecile, as the former kaiser's second wife, Hermine, and Cecile have patched up differences.

Of the other children of the former ruler, his only daughter, Princess Victoria Louise, is certain to come with her husband, Duke Ernest August of Brunswick and Lüneburg. It is not yet certain whether all of the other sons of William II, Eitel Friedrich, Adalbert, August Wilhelm, and Oscar can come, but Baron Ulrich von Sell, personal aide to His Majesty, said one or two of them surely would be there.

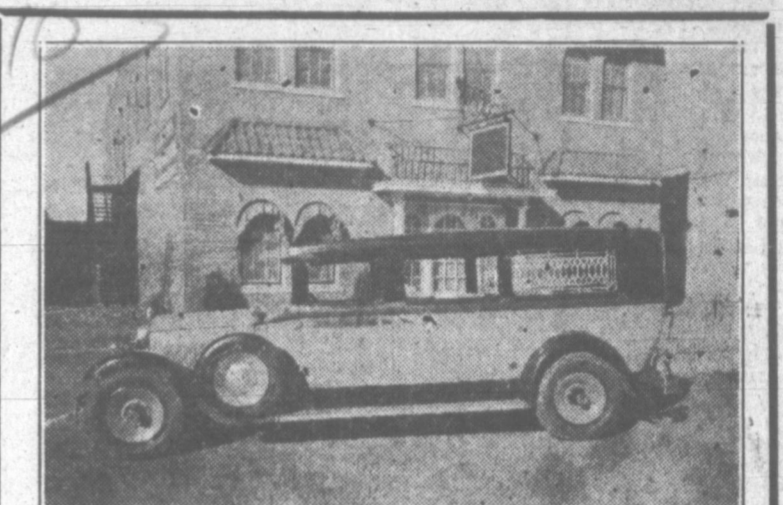

International Sunday School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic—Standards of the Kingdom.
Scripture Lesson—Matt. 5:3-9, 17-20, 43-48.

3. Blessed are the poor in spirit; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
4. Blessed are they that mourn; for they shall be comforted.
5. Blessed are the meek; for they shall inherit the earth.
6. Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after righteousness; for they shall be filled.
7. Blessed are the merciful; for they shall obtain mercy.
8. Blessed are the pure in heart; for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers; for they shall be called sons of God.
17. Think not that I came to destroy the law or the prophets; I came not to destroy, but to fulfill.
18. Verily I say unto you, Till heaven and earth pass away, one jot or one tittle shall in no wise pass away from the law, till all things be accomplished.

19. Whosoever therefore shall break one of these least commandments, and shall teach men, so shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whosoever shall do and teach them, he shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven.
20. For I say unto you, that except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no wise enter into the kingdom of heaven.

Golden Text—Blessed are the pure in heart; for they shall see God.—Matt. 5:8.
Time—The sermon on the Mount was spoken in midsummer of A. D. 28, the second year of Christ's ministry.
Place—The "Horns of Hattin."

INTRODUCTION
"The Beatitudes are the Gate Beautiful to the Temple of Holiness. They are the seven-fold rainbow that over-arches the throne of God."

Following a night of solitary prayer (Luke 6:12), our Lord made formal choice of his twelve disciples (Luke 6:13-16; Matt. 10:1-4), and then addressed to them and to the multitude that had gathered, the ever-memorable discourse which is called the Sermon on the Mount and is reported fully in the three chapters of Matthew, 5-7, and also in shortened form in Luke 6:20-49. This wonderful address will be our study for three weeks.

Mount of Beatitudes
The mount on which it was delivered was, according to tradition, a square-shaped hill called the Horns of Hattin; or Mount of Beatitudes. It is about sixty feet high, has two tops, and is situated on the west side of the Sea of Galilee, two or three miles from the lake and seven southwest of Capernaum.

Sermon on the Mount
"What is the Sermon on the Mount? It is the moral law of the kingdom of Christ, or in other words it occupies in the New Testament the place which in the Old Testament is occupied by the Ten Commandments."—Bishop Charles Gore. "Of all the teachings of the New Testament the sayings of this Sermon on the Mount have perhaps carried the most universal conviction with them."—Prof. George F. Genung.

"This Sermon was the inaugural address of the King. It was a pronouncement of the rules and regulations which were to control the lives of his subjects."—David James Burrell.

The Beatitudes
It is an evidence of the love of God that this great sermon of the Son of God should open with an account of true happiness. "Blessed" might well be "happy" in our translation of the Beatitudes. Christ makes His followers happy, but with a happiness so different in its origin and nature from the happiness of worldlings that the translators thought they must have another word for it, "blessed." "The members of the kingdom are men to be happy, but they are made happy by conditions that no one else can remove."

They That Mourn
"Blessed are they that mourn; for they shall be comforted." Every man who passes through the first Beatitude finds himself knocking at the door of the second. Only the poor in spirit are blessed when they mourn. And the mourning which the Master had primarily in mind is not the sorrow because of bereavement or the pain of physical suffering. It is the grief of soul in the consciousness of sin, and the sense of self-condemnation before the eye of God. Christ has reference to that pain of heart which an honest man knows because his life is so full of sin and self, and so barren of usefulness. Evidently only the poor in spirit can be truly blessed when they mourn.—Rev. Howard Agnew Johnston, D. D.

"The Merciful"
"Blessed are the merciful; for they shall obtain mercy." There must be in some faint measure at least, a corresponding spirit in us to receive any gift or blessing from God. It is true, therefore, in relation to God, that the merciful shall obtain mercy, and the unmerciful shall find no mercy. This is taught in the petition, "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors." Thus divine mercy and human mercy are linked together. But the same is true in our relations with our fellow-men—the merciful obtain mercy and the unmerciful find no pity. The unmerciful find only coldness and ungentleness, while the merciful obtain mercy.—J. R. Miller.

"The Peacemaker"
In worldly kingdoms highest honor is bestowed upon warriors, captains, generals; but not in Christ's kingdom. There those who bring about peace between enemies shall be distinguished with the exalted title, "sons of God." "There is no more Godlike work to be done in the world than peacemaking" (Broadus). "To be a peacemaker is the climax of Christian character" (Maclaren). This, of course does not imply that Christ's followers are to make peace with evil. We must first get things where peace is possible (Matt. 10:34).

Salt and Light
Men and women, boys and girls, of the kind described in the Beatitudes are compared by Christ to salt. Salt seasons food, makes it tasty; salt purifies and salt preserves. Christians do all these things for the society in which they mingle. But salt that loses its saltiness is good for nothing, and is thrown out into the street; so with a Christian who loses touch with Christ.

People of the Beatitudes are also like lights. Cities in Palestine were often conspicuous, built on hills for health and protection; so also must a light be set on a lampstand whence its rays may go into all the room, and not under the common wooden peck measure. Even thus must Christians let their light shine, make their characters and works manifest, not that men may praise them, but that men may glorify the heavenly Father who is humbly acknowledged as the Source of all goodness, the Power enabling the Christian to do any worthy deed. Such is Christ's beautiful picture of the kind of life his followers are to lead, the

citizens of the kingdom of heaven.

Laws of the Kingdom

Every kingdom must have laws, and it might have been expected that Christ's new kingdom would have new laws; but instead of new laws Christ put a new spirit into the old laws. He was the completion of the old laws. His kingdom was that to which the old laws pointed, his dispensation was the fulfillment of the Mosaic dispensation, the New Testament is reared on the foundation of the Old Testament.

Law and the Prophets

"Think not that I came to destroy the law or the prophets." The Jews regarded the five books of Moses, the Pentateuch, as the Law, and the remainder of the Old Testament, including the historical writings, as the Prophets. They added the poetical books,

calling them "Sacred Writings," Hagiographa. Christ's teachings were so revolutionary that the stricter Jews, the scribes and Pharisees, had already accused him of seeking to destroy the old religion, so dear to the nation (Mark 2:24; John 5:16, 18). "I came

not to destroy, but to fulfill." Matthew's Gospel is mainly devoted to an exposition of this sentence of Christ's, placing the Savior's life and teachings alongside the Old Testament and showing how the Old Testament is fulfilled (See LESSON, page 10).

Race Question Is Still Issue in Santa Clara Area

WATSONVILLE, Calif., Jan. 24. (AP)—Racial hatred, inflamed by employment of white dancing girls in a Filipino club here, seethed again in the Santa Clara valley today as the result of two clashes at San Jose in which one white man was stabbed and four Filipinos badly beaten.

The outbreak at San Jose last night came while armed patrols were guarding streets and highways here to prevent recurrence of fighting which has raged intermittently for five days, resulting in the death of one Filipino, the flogging of several others, and the arrest of seven white men.

Alfred Johnson, 22, was stabbed twice in the back and critically wounded while he was watching a clash between Filipinos and whites at San Jose. There were two fights, two Filipinos having been beaten in each. Police said white men were aggressors in each case.

Discovery of an alleged Filipino pamphlet called "The Torch," to which was attributed the statement that "Filipinos have as much right to American girls as Americans," was reported to peace officers.

Chicago Citizens to Buy Warrants to Solve Dilemma

CHICAGO, Jan. 24. (AP)—A civic pool was being formed by leading business interests today on which to float the city, the county, and the school board from their "no funds" dilemma.

The pool will be for the purpose of buying \$50,000,000 in tax anticipation warrants, and this sum will be enough, according to officials, to run the local governmental bodies until the reassessment is completed and 1928 tax bills collected. The citizens' relief committee, under the chairmanship of St. Las H. Strawn, is organizing the pool.

Mr. Strawn explained that large businesses, public utilities, and railroads have on deposit in the banks large sums of money to meet the 1928 tax roll. It is planned to use this money in the purchase of the anticipation warrants which later can be redeemed by the several concerns, in the paying of their taxes. The present estimate is that the 1928 tax will not be collectable before May 1.

The cash shortage already has forced postponement of the pay of more than 40,000 city, county and school employes. Coal companies announced yesterday that unless past due bills were paid, it would be necessary to withhold further deliveries to school buildings.
