No Jones Law Review

CHALLENGE IS AN ATTEMPT TO FREE PAIR

Illegal Delegation of Power to Judges Claimed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. (AP)—The Supreme Court today refused to pass on the constitutionality of the Jones law providing heavy maximum penalty for prohibition violations.

Validity of the law was challenged by Hugh McElvogue and William J. Brown, who had been convicted of violating the dry laws at St. Joseph, Mo.

Rioting Breaks Out In Berlin

BERLIN, Oct. 13. (AP)—Wild rioting in the famous Tiergarten today accompanied the opening of the Reichstag. Mobs of thousands of persons clashed with heavy police guards.

Hundreds of police had been marshaled around the Reichstag building as a precaution against disorders. These officers were keeping the crowds back to a respectful distance, but when a portion of the throng was forced rearward to the edge of the wooded Tiergarten, rioting suddenly broke loose and the police were engulfed in masses of struggling humanity.

Corn and Hay Burn

CORSICANA, Oct. 13. (AP)—Two thousand bushels of corn and 2,500 bales of hay were destroyed by fire last night when a large barn on the Fortson ranch, near Rice, in Navarro county, burned. The loss was estimated at several thousand dollars.

Primary Is Upheld

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 13. (AP)—Constitutionality of the Oklahoma runoff primary law was upheld for a second time today by the State Supreme Court which denied a writ of mandamus asked by Judge James M. Hays, Okmulgee, who challenged results of the Aug. 12 primary.

PRORATION COMMITTEE IS TO MEET TO DISCUSS SHORTAGE OF PIPELINE CONNECTIONS IN AREA

The Panhandle proration committee will meet in Amarillo tomorrow to consider means to take care of the production of the many wells in Gray county which are without pipeline connections, according to an announcement made yesterday. The committee will also announce the pipeline nominations for the two-week period beginning Oct. 16, when the new proration schedule is due to be issued.

CRIME COMMISSION HEAD IS SUGGESTING USE OF "CAT" IN DEALING WITH GANGSTER CLAN

Floggings With the "Cat" Might Prove Effective Against Those Who Defy the Law

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Oct. 13. (AP)—The American Prison association conference here today had before it a suggestion from George W. Wickersham, chairman of President Hoover's law enforcement commission, that "a careful inquiry into the results of flogging as a punishment may well be made to determine the desirability of employing it in the war against banditry and racketeers."

"PUBLIC ENEMY NO. 1," AL CAPONE, ESCAPING EFFORTS TO FIND HIM

CHICAGO, Oct. 13. (AP)—The "No. 1 public enemy," Alphonse (Scarface) Capone, continues despite the snares set for him, to elude the law. A surprise raid on Cicero, the suburb that acquired an "unenvied name as the haunt of the Capone "mob," failed to flush the gang leader yesterday, but it was not entirely a lost effort. Twenty-nine men and a woman were arrested, and among them were three somebodies of the gang business—William (three-fingered Jack) White, George (Red) Barker, and Claude Maddox. White and Barker are "public enemies." Maddox has been hunted for many weeks for questioning in connection with the murder of Alfred (Jake) Lingle, Tribune reporter.

Pat Roche, special investigator for the state's attorney, led the raid, which was directed against the Western hotel which was presumed to be the hideout of Capone. He is hunted on a vagrancy warrant, the same as were sworn out on all 28 of the men listed by the Chicago crime commission as "public enemies."

The woman and 26 men arrested at the hotel faced arraignment today on disorderly conduct charges. They also were to be questioned in the hope they might have some word to offer that will aid in the continuing hunt for Capone.

White, Barker and Maddox were charged with carrying concealed weapons. When policemen approached the automobile in which they were seated, White poked a pistol in their faces, dropping the weapon only when he realized he was being approached by "law."

PROPOSE COTTON PLAN

HOPE, Ark., Oct. 13. (AP)—As a means of stabilizing cotton prices and at the same time stimulating automobile purchases, five American automobile companies were asked in a telegram sent from here today by six associated Arkansas newspapers to accept a bale of cotton as a part payment on all motor car purchases in the south.

LAKE IS SPREADING

Lake Wichita and Holiday Creek at Wichita Falls were flooding a section of the city, it being necessary for about 75 families in the southern part of the city to move out.

It was the worst flood there in 15 years, the Wichita river leaving its banks for the first time since Lake Kemp dam was built. Groceries and supplies were being delivered to some parts of the city in motor boats.

Two and one half inches of rain had fallen at Wichita Falls to bring the total to 8.64 inches in 10 days.

Water came within 100 yards of the business district but was receding.

Houses were washed from two tourist camps and the Baptist encampment grounds were under several feet of water. The river was reported 900 feet wide.

San Angelo received two inches of rain over the week-end and other West Texas points, including Ballinger, where the Colorado river threatened to leave its banks, got as much as six inches.

Three hundred feet of track were reported washed out on the Santa Fe between Valera and Talpa.

Rio de Janeiro dispatches, quoting the minister of justice, gave an entirely different version of the encounters, saying 2,000 insurgents had been repulsed at Ponto Ribera and Itarare. It also claimed that in fighting at Jacarezinho a federal column of 2,000 volunteers had repulsed a rebel attack and had begun a march into the interior of Parana toward Colonia Mineira.

But from the statements from both quarters it was believed here that the federal and insurgent armies were in actual contact over a 200-mile front in an engagement which may mean a decisive rebel advantage, or prolongation of the conflict while federal columns carry the conflict into the wilds of Rio Grande do Sul.

Dr. Getulio Vargas, president of Rio Grande do Sul, left Porto Alegre yesterday to assume entire charge of the revolutionary forces, probably making his headquarters at Curitiba, capital of Parana.

THOSE LEGISLATIVE AMENDMENTS

Statesmen and newspaper writers of Texas are rallying to the support of the constitutional amendments to be voted upon at the time of the general election. The radio stations will be extensively used.

One of the amendments provides that the Supreme Court shall be in session throughout the year, instead of nine months as the law now provides. The amendment would not prevent necessary vacations of the justices, but would require that the court be open for business at all times. This amendment would add to the usefulness of the court, and we see no objections to it.

A very important constitutional change is that providing for the taxation for county purposes of lands belonging to the University of Texas. This is only fair to those counties whose domain includes much of this land. It is not fair to penalize a county simply because the state owns a big part of its values. The state, under such circumstances, should contribute to the building of roads, schools, and to other county projects. The state pays taxes on county farms—why not also on university lands? West Texans should readily see the point of justice in this amendment.

Another is intended to enlarge the field for investment of permanent University funds. Now only state or national bonds may be purchased. There are no state bonds on the market, and the national paper pays on the average only a little more than three per cent. Great loss of interest results in the severe constitutional restriction. The proposed change would allow investment in county, municipal, and other safe bonds paying a higher rate of interest. The amendment would help the bond situation in Texas with respect to municipal bonds.

The other amendments, sometimes discussed as one, concern the organization of the legislature and the compensation of members. The length of the present regular session is 60 days. Under the proposed change it would be lengthened to 120 days. The first 30 days would be devoted to introduction of bills, the second 30 days to consideration of these bills by committees, and the remainder of the session would be open to consideration of the measures. The legislature, by a four-fifths vote could change this order of things.

On the average, the legislature has been in session 137 days in each two-year period. The short terms are clearly too brief, for numerous special sessions and unnecessary expense have resulted. It is necessary to reintroduce bills at each session, and this means much waste of time. The amendment would be valuable in adjusting the state body to present day needs. There is no logic in perpetuating machinery built for a government of frontier days.

The plan to increase the legislative pay from \$5.00 per day to \$10.00 would not "double" the compensation of the public servants. At the same time it decreases the mileage allowance from 20 cents to 10 cents per mile. By doing away with the special sessions and repeated trips, the mileage expense would practically offset the increase in per diem compensation.

All of the amendments are meritorious and should be adopted.

Preacher Jailed When He Defies Police Order

CARROLLTON, Mo., Oct. 13. (AP)—A Baptist minister was in jail here today as one result of a clash between science and religion.

The prisoner, the Rev. W. W. Woodson, 50, proclaiming the end of the world was at hand, defied medical science in the form of a city-wide infantile paralysis quarantine yesterday in conducting parades with a "surrendered band."

He was taken from the pulpit to the county jail building wherein Bonnie Jean Schnapp, 8-year-old daughter of sheriff O. B. Schnapp, died Saturday of infantile paralysis. The services went on in private last night at the church parsonage.

Mr. Woodson's followers, a group of fifty in his congregation of 800 left the church only after Ralph Lozier, representative in congress, presented an appeal on behalf of the children. The same appeal was rejected, however, by the pastor when Representative Lozier, acting as a friend interviewed him at the jail.

"The world is coming to an end," the prisoner said, "and I must prepare my flock. I cannot cease my meetings until released by the Lord."

Proration Meeting Is Resumed Today

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 13. (AP)—The oil proration hearing before the Oklahoma Corporation Commission was resumed here today with attorneys for oil concerns seeking to break the curtailment agreement seeking to show that its terms were dictated by major companies, who favor the program of minimum production.

E. B. Reeser, president of the Barnsdall corporation and of the American Petroleum Institute was closely questioned by Bert M. Parmenter, attorney for the group seeking to lift the lid from the Oklahoma fields. Inferences pointing

at New York and Standard Oil in establishment of the curtailment regulations were made by Parmenter. Reeser refused to verify his questions' implications that Standard Oil dictates how much crude this state can produce.

Under questioning of Parmenter, Reeser stuck to his original testimony that each state determines its own demands for crude, asking all purchasers in advance and then prorating production to that figure; and reiterated that the price has nothing to do with the amount to be produced, and that the price is never mentioned in any of the operators' committees.

WOMAN SHOTS HUSBAND—SORRY AIM IS POOR

MARYSVILLE, Calif., Oct. 13. (AP)—While L. R. "Red" Shaffer, 31, lay seriously wounded in a hospital here refusing to reveal the identity of the person who shot him, his wife, a former motion picture actress, admitted the shooting, officers said, and declared she was sorry her husband would live. Mrs. Shaffer, formerly Delores Duncan, film actress of a decade ago, told Sheriff C. J. McCoy she shot her husband yesterday to save herself from being choked to death. Her face, bruised and cut, testified to a terrible beating, McCoy said. She was not arrested.

FEMININE FANCIES

Where is the hiding place of this thing called happiness? We seek it in wealth, but we find it is not there. We seek it in power, but it is still missing. Yet we find some who are happy either in poverty or wealth, in power or obscurity. So perhaps the thing that determines whether we will be happy or dissatisfied lies within our own hearts and minds.

Yesterday I read two stories told for the truth. Both were of dissatisfied nagging wives, and the dissatisfaction was caused, it appeared, by exactly opposite conditions.

One story written by Elizabeth Fairfield and published in Psychology, told of a woman whose husband had not come up to her expectations in the business world. She saw other men promoted above her husband and this lowered him in her opinion. Hence, the dissatisfaction and the nagging.

The other story, written by Kathleen Norris for newspaper publication, was of a woman whose husband is an outstanding success in Hollywood. The wife is actually jealous of her husband because of the praise he receives on every hand and asks everyone who will listen, "Do you call it fair?"

She never lets him forget that he was penniless when they were married. Yet there is another little lady in Hollywood—a scenario writer with her big gray eyes on Jim—who is telling him what he likes better to hear, that he is nice, that he is fun, that he is marvelous. Consequently, we find more dissatisfaction and more nagging on the part of the wife.

One wife is unhappy because her husband does not succeed. Another is unhappy because hers does.

What could be more ridiculous on the part of a woman than jealousy because of praise received by her husband? A man does not expect his wife to be famous, else there would not be so many millionaires who marry their stenographers. Would the wife of a famous man receive more praise for herself if her husband were less successful? I think not. And would she herself accomplish more with a less famous husband? The odds are against it.

Regardless of any situation, however, nagging only makes it worse. It not only makes hopeless the condition it was meant to remedy, but

HARVESTERS GET NEEDED REST OVER THEIR OPEN DATE

PLAINVIEW TO PLAY HERE IN TWO WEEKS

The Pampa Harvesters, scrubbed and freshly attired following their 2-0 loss in the mud puddle at Butler field in Amarillo Saturday, today were given several days respite by Coach Odus Mitchell.

The team has played six games and the coach figured that a rest was necessary to prevent staleness. Unless a practice game is scheduled for the reserves, there will be no game here Saturday. The next conference tilt will be with Plainview here Oct. 25. Plainview will play Amarillo this week, and local fans will then have a comparison with a bearing on the engagement here. Coach Mitchell, however, will be casting an eye on Electra, which sprang a surprise by beating Wichita Falls, whose team had previously held Lubbock to a 13-10 score in the mud. Pampa beat Electra once without difficulty, but it may not be so easy at Electra Nov. 8.

Lubbock showed considerable form in defeating Childress 21 to 0 on a muddy field Saturday. Whether Lubbock can beat Amarillo three weeks hence is the chief debating subject now in District 1. The Sandies head the percentage column, while Lubbock's record is marred by her loss to Pampa.

The Harvesters need some conference games to boost their percentage about the .500 mark, which does reflect their comparative strength in the district. Several other teams have lost one game and won several. Should Lubbock defeat Amarillo and throw the race into a mathematical tie with a play-off in prospect, Pampa would be in a strategic position. Having played both other contenders away from home, the Harvesters would play hosts during the play-off.

Wichita Falls plays at Quanah this week, and Lubbock at Electra. Pampa's only casualty in the Amarillo game, Center Poe, was recovering from a knee injury today.

Miss Collett Defends Title In Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13. (AP)—Queen Glenna Collett with four championships to her credit since her first appearance in national play in 1919, today came to the defense of her American title over the menacing Los Angeles Country club golf course against a field of 99 aspirants.

One of the greatest shot makers in the feminine ranks, the New York woman will seek her fifth crown in a dozen years, with three former champions, nine international team members, and the runnerup to her 1929 title among the contenders.

With only one of the entrants, Miss Marion Hollins of Santa Cruz, Cal., able to break through the women's par of 81 in practice rounds, scores in the low nineties were anticipated among the 32 qualifiers in today's medal round of 18 holes.

Miss Hollins, a former women's national champion, has found the severe course, 6,635 yards in length, suited to her hand driving game, and has been frequently mentioned as the woman to beat.

GLENNA COLLETT TO DEFEND TITLE ON 6,600-YARD CALIFORNIA COURSE

LOS ANGELES (AP)—More than 6,600 yards of rugged fairways with a woman's par of 80, is the battle ground where Oct. 13 to 18 the 34th women's amateur golf championship will be fought.

Two six par holes, and eight requiring five strokes to equal perfect figures, mark the tough spots of the hazard ridden Los Angeles Country club course over which Glenna Collett of Del Monte, Cal., defending champion, and four times winner, will make her stand.

The course will put a premium on a good driving game, with nine of the 18 holes 400 or more yards long. Only four par 3s are included, with the shortest of these 140 yards. The longest of the 6s reaches 530 yards.

A sparkling list of entries, becoming a national championship, has been turned in, including besides the defender, Mrs. Dorothy Campbell Hurd, Pittsburgh, three times a title holder, Mrs. Helen B. Stetson, Philadelphia, winner in 1926, Mrs. Leona Pressler, San Gabriel, Cal., runner up to Miss Collett last year on the Oakland Hills course, Birmingham, Mich., will try again.

Among the other national stars who have signified their intentions of being present are Miss Helen Hicks of New York and Miss Virginia Van Wie, who tied for the low medal score of 79.

BAYLOR AND MUSTANGS TO BE WATCHED

DALLAS, Oct. 13. (AP)—Two veteran eleven, Baylor university and Southern Methodist, ranking contenders for the Southwest conference football flag, will clash Saturday at Waco in a bout that not only headlines the week's sectional program but possibly will go a long way toward foretelling the outcome of the 1930 scramble.

Two other conference tilts are scheduled, but neither assumes the importance of the conflict at Carroll field. Texas Christian, as a result of its crushing 40 to 0 win over Arkansas, may be expected to subdue the Aggies at College Station, while the Rice Owls will be favored to score their first conference victory in some two years at the expense of Arkansas.

The Mustangs and Bears will occupy the spotlight, with the Methodists perhaps a slight favorite to win. It will be the first championship test for both after compiling brilliant preliminary records. The loser will be all but eliminated from the race before it is well under way; the winner automatically will establish itself a prime contender for the title now held by the Frogs.

Regarded rather lightly up to a fortnight ago, Baylor suggested it might have been overlooked when it held the powerful Purdue eleven to a 20 to 7 score and then proved its point by overwhelming Trinity university, 54 to 0, Saturday. There has never been any doubt of Southern Methodist's punch, even before its sensational performance against Notre Dame.

Rivaling the tilt at Waco as a spectacle, but with no bearing on the championship, is the twenty-fifth meeting between the Universities of Texas and Oklahoma carded at the new state fair bowl at Dallas Saturday. The Longhorns will be seeking their sixteenth victory of the long rivalry, the Sooners their eighth.

Texas' crushing victory over Oklahoma last year is not likely to be repeated. Coach Littlefield's machine is not the powerful one it

was this time a year ago, while the Sooners' 20 to 7 triumph over Nebraska in their last appearance was impressive. The Longhorns displayed improvement in humbling Howard Payne college, 26 to 0, Saturday, after being held for a half.

The outstanding feature of the last week's warfare was the explosive running attack unveiled by the champion T. C. U. Frogs in their conference opener with Arkansas. If the Christians miss the superb generalship of Howard Grubbs, last year's quarterback, it was not apparent as they mowed down the red-jerseyed lads from the Ozarks. With Hinton, Leland, Griffith, Dennis, Oliver and Spearman all carrying the ball brilliantly and the Frog forwards functioning almost perfectly, the champs appeared every bit as dangerous as in mid-October last year.

Southern Methodist, incidentally, demonstrated a similar plentitude of reserve power in crushing Austin college, 34 to 0, on Friday. The Rice Owls continued to encourage their followers by the business like manner in which they polished off the University of Arizona, 21 to 0.

Unless they take a decided brace, the Aggies will have little hope of stopping the Frogs Saturday, even if they do play at Kyle field. Tulane, with a strong running attack, beat the Farmer line down to a whisper in winning their engagement here, 19 to 9, and it is doubtful the Green Wave can muster a greater set of gallopers or better blockers than Texas Christian displayed against Arkansas.

Gangster May Recover From Bullet Wounds

NEW YORK, Oct. 13. (AP)—Jack "Legs" Diamond, gangster and racketeer, rallied today in polyclinic hospital from five bullet wounds inflicted yesterday by would-be assassins who burst into his room in a West Side hotel, fired on him and fled.

Doctors, who at first believed the gangster chief to be dying reported when he awoke this morning from four hours' sleep, that he had a fair chance to recover, and they regarded his condition as so much improved that they held in abeyance plans for a blood transfusion.

Fevered and weak from the loss of blood, his frame already weakened by tuberculosis and stomach ulcers and bearing the scars of five other bullet wounds received several years ago when "Little Augie" Organ was shot down by his side, Diamond awoke today, glancing wanly at the headlines about the shooting in the morning papers, and murmured to the patrolman on guard at his hospital door, "Oh, are you still there?"

Dallas Youth Has Disappeared

DALLAS, Oct. 13. (AP)—Fear that his son, Ray James Chandler, 14, who disappeared from a Dallas school Oct. 2, may have met with foul play was expressed today by the boy's father, C. H. Chandler. He said he knew of no cause for the boy to run away from home.

Chandler weighs about 130 pounds, is 5 feet three inches high, has blue eyes, sandy hair, chubby-faced and his little finger on his right hand is crooked.

Texan Gets Honor

EL PASO, Oct. 13. (AP)—First Texan ever to receive the decoration, Joseph Ignatius Driscoll of El Paso yesterday was invested with the order of St. Gregory the great at St. Patrick's cathedral here, in the first such ceremony ever performed in Texas.

High churchmen from all sections of the state, headed by Archbishop A. J. Drossaerts of San Antonio, were here for the event.

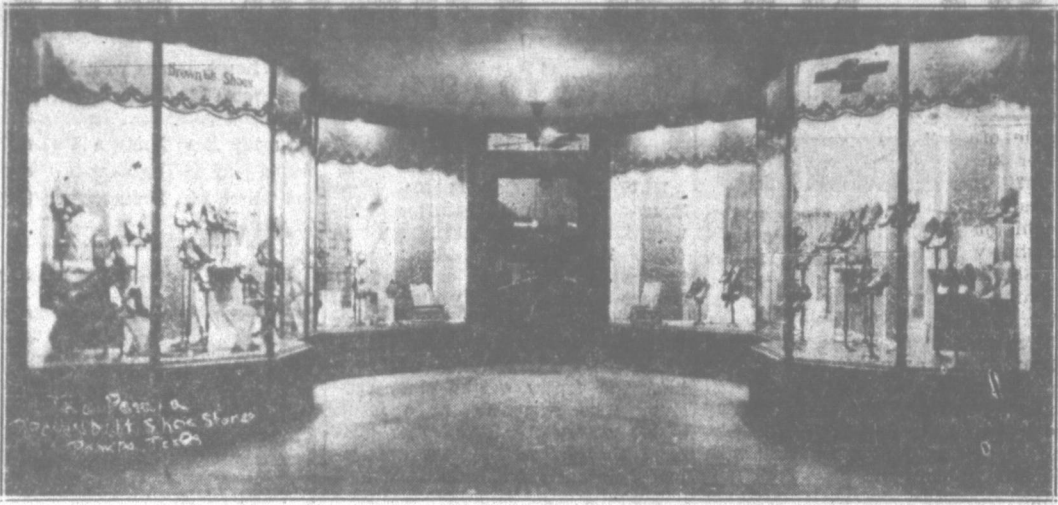

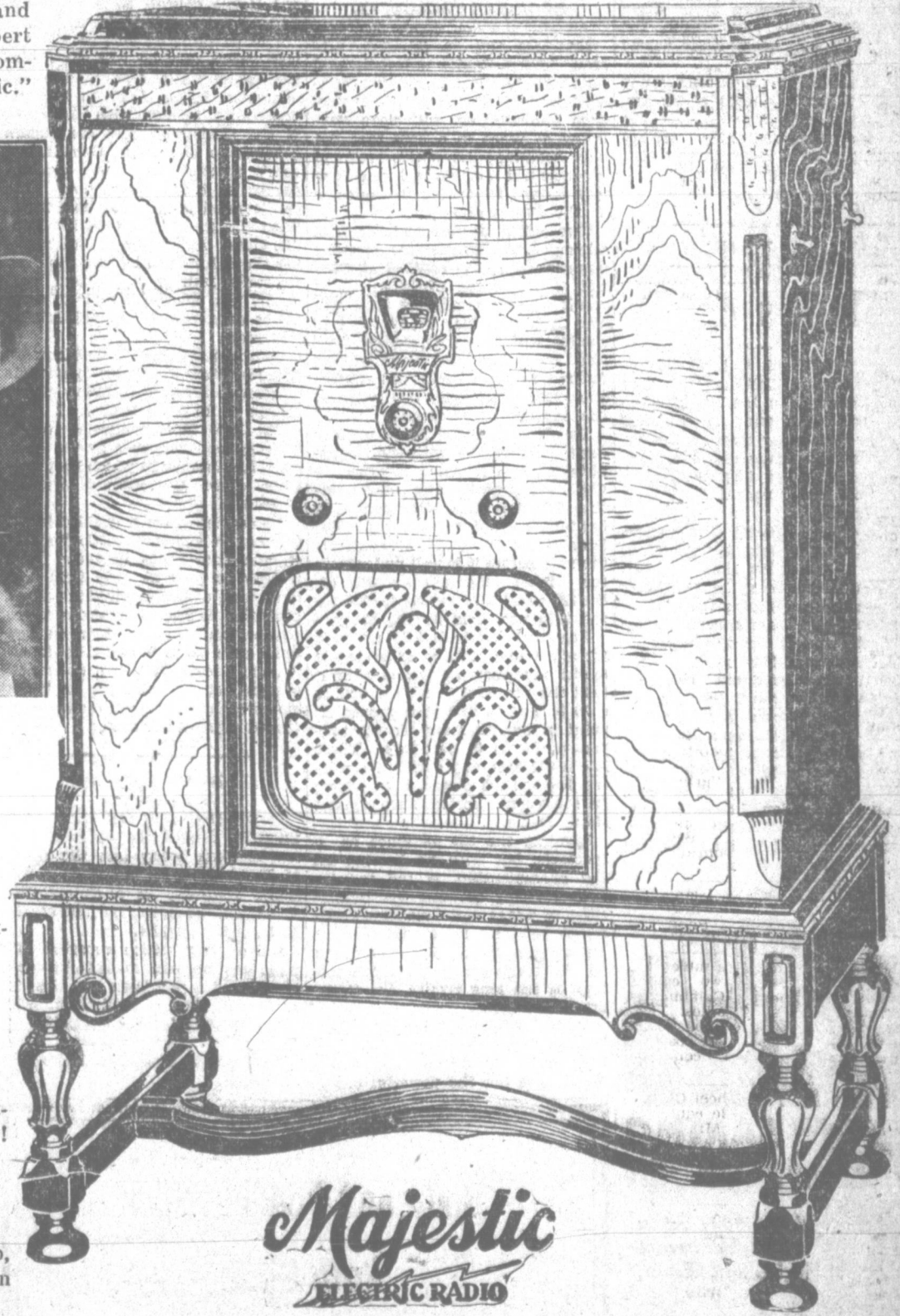



invited to join the West Texas Chamber.

Officials here for that meeting, in addition to the West Texas representatives, were Guy Blount, president, and Hubert Harrison, manager of the East Texas Chamber, and Ray Leeman, manager of the South Texas Chamber. Grady Kinsolving, president of the South Texas Chamber, was not present.

A brief had been prepared for presentation to the board, citing statements in three texts used in public schools, used from the third to the seventh grades. The third grade geography was said to be acceptable but the other two were said to be "not acceptable."

Some of the criticisms made were:

In the fourth and fifth grade geographies, numerous illustrations are used, but nowhere a picture from Texas. In the section devoted to southern states, nineteen pages, but twelve sentences are devoted to Texas. In the list of geographies at the end of the section, it would be possible for the pupil to answer all questions correctly and not even mention Texas, except in connection with other states.

"We look in vain," the brief said, "for such questions as: Name the largest state? What state leads in value of agricultural products, in number of cattle, in production of oil and sulphur, etc.?"

Lindbergh Buys Eastern Home

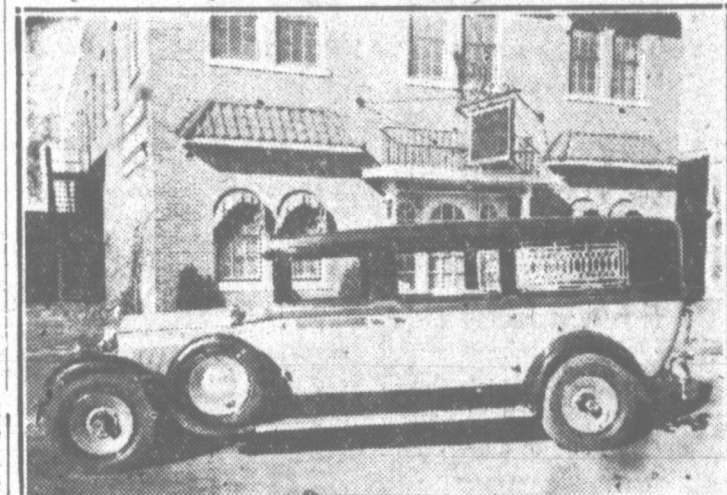
